Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating

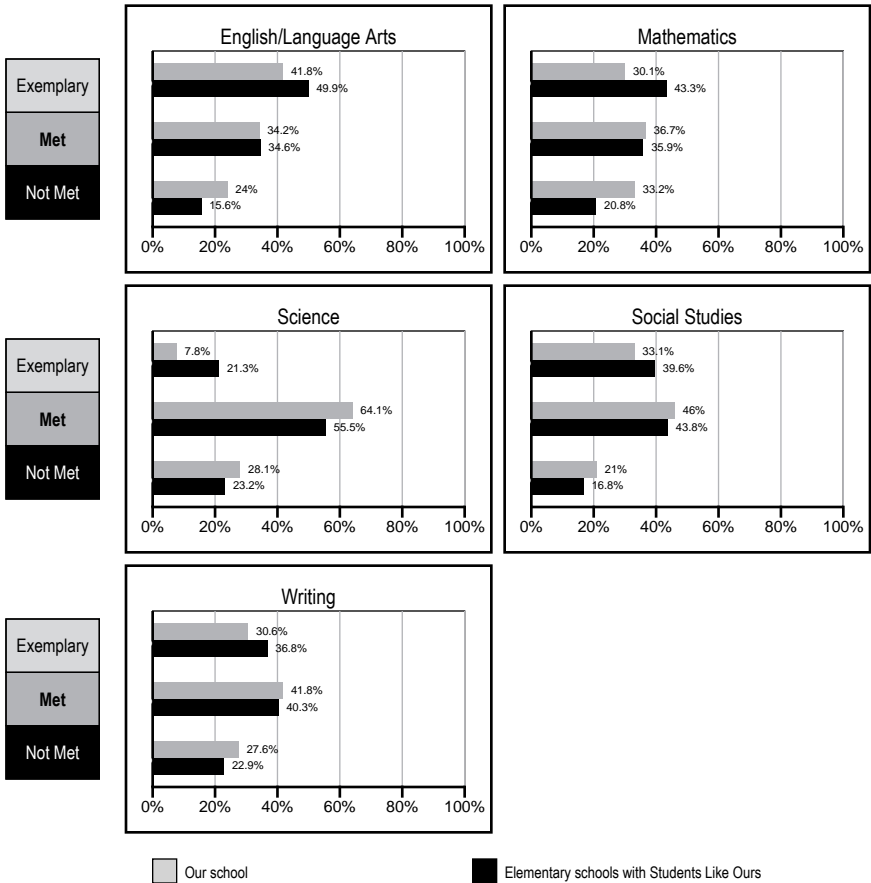

Our school was awarded the Palmetto Silver award from the South Carolina Department of Education for attaining a high level of absolute performance or growth on the Palmetto Assessment of State Standards. 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ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System

In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
