## REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

The theme for Clinton Elementary this school year was "Sailing Into Excellence." The staff, students, parents, and community focused on providing a positive and safe environment for all and promoting high academic standards and expectations for all students. Clinton Elementary is committed to preparing students to become ethical and productive citizens by achieving excellence, embracing innovation, and forging new traditions.

Faculty and staff focused on providing each student an optimal learning environment, focusing on positive relationships and quality instruction. Individual learning needs are determined using data-driven decisions. Teachers secure data from the utilization of Dominie assessments, Palmetto Assessment of State Standards (PASS), Measures of Academic Progress (MAP), benchmark testing, and formative assessments.

The community is a vital part of the educational program at Clinton Elementary. This year, Clinton Elementary partnered with the Clinton Coalition for Youth Empowerment (CC4Y) to provide an after-school program for students. Students were involved in tutoring and recreational activities. A summer program is also available for students. The partnership with Presbyterian College continued as PC students provided learning experiences for students. Area businesses and organizations donated incentives for children based on academic performance and character development. Local businesses and individuals participated in Career Day. Students donated to the United Way, United Ministries, and the American Cancer Society.

The arts program at Clinton Elementary continues to offer students an array of opportunities to develop and expand their talents. Honors Choir and Drum Corps represented our school at community functions. Students participated in Art Club and furnished murals throughout the school.

Students had the opportunity to learn beyond the walls of Clinton Elementary through field experiences. Field experiences included: Jekyll Island (5th grade), Musgrove Mill (4th grade), State House and Charleston (3rd grade), Abney Cultural Center at Lander University (1st, 2nd, and 4th grades), and Callahan Farms and the Columbia Zoo (5K). Students enjoyed local trips to the Joe Adair Science Center, Presbyterian College, Bell Street Middle School, and Pine Street Park.

Clinton Elementary will continue to provide the highest quality of education and be an advocate for all students by preparing them for future learning. We will garner support through a culture of continuous improvement driven by integrity, teamwork, and perseverance.
