Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Midland Valley High School is located in Graniteville, South Carolina with an enrollment of 1200 students. Our mission is to promote academic success, respect, lifelong learning, and citizenship. Our stakeholders have made a commitment to provide the most relevant educational opportunities to our students.

Our school has a history of high academic standards, extracurricular involvement, and service to the community. During the 2012 - 2013 academic year sixty seniors graduated with honors, fourteen seniors were named Palmetto Fellows, and one hundred and six students were eligible for Life Scholarships. We received the SCDE Award for High ACT Improvement, and the Class of 2013 was awarded over \$9.2 million dollars in scholarships. Our ESEA Federal Accountability Rating was a B (83.2).

Our students excelled in local, regional, state, and national competitions. In athletics, three students participated in the North/South All-Star baseball, soccer or softball games. Five students were named to the All-State football, softball, or baseball teams. One coach was selected to coach the North/South Soccer Game. Our first ever Science Olympiad Team placed 10th in the state and the NJROTC rifle team finished 9th in the nation.

Community service is a vital component in the education of our students. Four hundred and fifty students volunteered at events that included Special Olympics, Relay for Life, American Heart Association, and the Marine Corps Toys for Tots. Our faculty and staff modeled the importance of community through their charitable donations to Relay for Life, The United Way of Aiken, The Debbie Knight Fund, and other organizations in the amount of \$6300. Staff members also contributed \$1200 to an area elementary school for our Operation Feed a Kid Program.

We are fortunate to have the support of our School Improvement Council, composed of parents, students, teachers, and community representatives. Stakeholder involvement has directly impacted our ability to make a difference in the lives of our students. Our goal is to build upon the many successes and to continue to provide the best possible educational experiences for our students.

In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
