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## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Blacksburg High School continues to set high standards, and our students, teachers, staff, and administration work to achieve them in academics, athletics, and the arts. Academically, we earned national recognition by attaining a Bronze Award from US News and World Report magazine. This national ranking was based on student test scores and improvements. We had an 82.4% graduation rate and our seniors were offered over 2.4 million dollars in scholarships.

Students competed successfully in local, district, and region writing contests. In athletics, we had students earn region and state recognition in football, baseball, softball, and track. One student earned a spot in the prestigious North-South All-Stars Football Game. Our girls' varsity basketball team won the Region II-A championship. A female player from that team won Region Player of the Year. A male basketball player earned several awards, including Region II-A Player of the Year. In the arts, students performed two plays as well as giving public performances for ensembles. Five band students earned All-Region Honors. Art is exhibited in the hallways and at BHS performances. Art students won contests at the district level. The marching band continues to perform well, competing at both upper state and state this year.

We are in our sixth year as a High Schools That Work (HSTW) program, which is paying dividends by focusing our goals: to increase parent communication, to recognize and encourage reading, to increase student and teacher recognition, and to incorporate numeracy. Our Advisory program, also part of HSTW, provides students with teacher advocates. Despite ongoing budget concerns, we have made strides to increase dual credit offerings, as well as continue a successful credit recovery program for students who are not successful in core classes.

Students are involved in the community, and seniors spend a minimum of ten hours with a mentor as part of their Senior Projects. The Student Council sponsors four Blood Connection Drives at BHS each year, as well as collecting funds for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation and delivering Meals on Wheels. The Beta Club requires community service to remain an active club member. The History Club hosted the Region History Bowl and Bee Competition, and earned a spot in the Top Ten National History Clubs ranking.

BHS seeks to increase course offerings and rigor as we look to the future. We added AP Calculus, AP Art and Personal Finance to our course offerings, as well as other dual credit options. Our district is implementing Common Core Standards, and BHS is embracing the changes in curriculum. We have a total of four National Board Certified Teachers.

Overall, BHS continues to meet its challenges and seek excellence in academics, athletics, and the arts.

In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
