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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

This year Conway High School built upon success from the previous year extending the work of school improvement teams to further enhance critical elements in the school's learning community. The SIC met its goals of focusing on improving attendance, advancing interest on character development and introducing new initiatives to support positive behavior.

A new teacher-student advisory program was started at the beginning of the school year. Small groups of students meet with teachers and administrators discussing important challenges facing youth, especially in the school community. The program builds student-adult relationships and personalizes the school for students.

The first cohort from Conway High's AVID program graduated in 2013. More than 85% of the graduates were accepted into post secondary colleges and universities. This program has grown in breadth and depth. More teachers have received AVID training and hundreds of students are now enrolled in AVID the program.

The fine arts department continues its high level of achievement with 17 members selected for all-county choir and six members receiving All State honors. The group also earned five superior and two excellent ratings in solo and ensemble competition.

A Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program was initiated in the fall. Students earn opportunities, rewards and recognition for demonstrating responsible and productive behavior. Hundreds of students participated in "no referral" parties held at the close of each semester.

A collaborative effort between Teachscape and Conway High School lead to a focus on productive classroom instructional techniques. Administrators and teachers used these tools to align instructional goals and increase student achievement.

Our FFA efforts lead to state competition and earned the superior chapter award from the South Carolina association. During Legislation Day, the school's FFA received recognition from both the House and Senate and donated bedding plants for the State House grounds.

Our athletic teams placed state qualifiers in competitive cheer, volleyball, football, wrestling, baseball, softball, boys' golf, and girls' & boys' tennis. Additionally, CHS had lower state qualifiers in both boys' and girls' track & field.

Conway High School continued its history of philanthropy bringing together the SCA, Interact Club, Yearbook Department, and Key Club to the Rivertown Christmas program sponsored by the school's choral department. The annual event amplified community awareness and recognition while providing an excellent seasonal venue to highlight a season of giving.

In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
