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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Marlboro County High School continued to show progress in a variety of areas for the 2012/2013 school year. This past year our "Freshman Academy" was instituted to provide extra opportunities for some of our at-risk students. This allowed smaller classes for freshmen and more computer time. We also instituted The Read 180 program and were very excited in our increase of lexile scores. Additionally, the Freshman Academy instituted the use of Khan Academy in some of our Algebra classes. The result of the Freshman Academy was a substantial increase in the End-of-Course exam scores in English 1 and Algebra 1. Additionally, our US History End-of-Course scores showed a marked increase. Our graduating class of 2013 was awarded more than six million dollars in scholarships. This is the second consecutive year that Marlboro County High School has exceeded the six million dollar barrier. Our staff worked diligently to increase our graduation rate this school year and again were rewarded with a substantial increase from the year before. During the school year we were able to offer after-school tutoring, as well as HSAP tutoring, to prepare students for the High School Exit Exam and End-of-Course exams. We continue to track student performance and offer interventions as quickly as we can. The Marlboro County High School guidance department hosted parent nights for all grade levels during the year. During these meetings, counselors, administrators and teachers discussed interventions available to our students for academic success. Additionally, an "Academic Guide to Success" brochure was distributed during these meetings. Marlboro County High School had over sixty five students score Bronze or better on the Work Keys test. Our PBIS program continues to improve as students recognize the rewards of good behavior. In an effort to improve SAT scores, we now offer SAT classes in math and English. Marlboro County High School continues to offer dual credit courses through our partnership with Northeastern Technical College. This allows our students to receive college credit while still in high school. Our athletic teams continue to excel with appearances in the playoffs in football, women's basketball and baseball and soccer. Although we have shown progress during the 2012-2013 school year, we anticipate greater growth for the ensuing school term.

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ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System

In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
