Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating

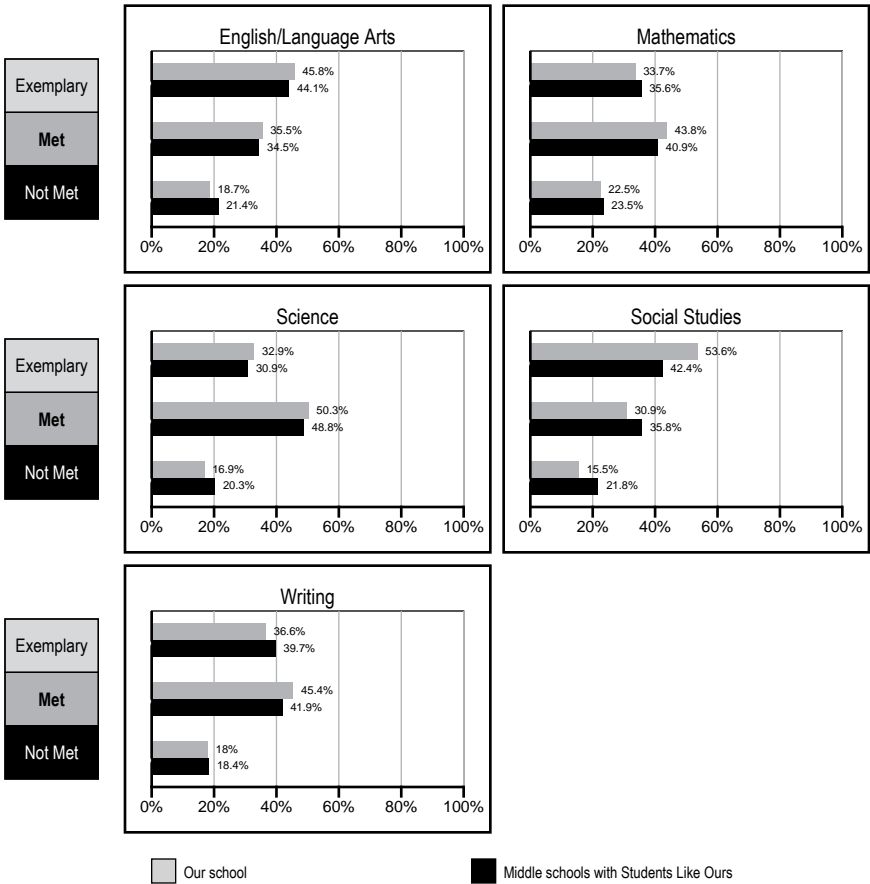

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

The faculty and staff at Westview Middle School continue to make teaching and student learning our number one priority and to equip them with twenty-first century skills so that they can be successful in a highly competitive world. During the 2012-2013 school years, Westview Middle School's Professional Learning Communities worked diligently to build positive relationships with students to create a culture of learning where students want to come to school.

To maintain our focus on teaching and learning, Westview Middle School's Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) continued to concentrate its improvement efforts in the areas of assessment, differentiated instruction, Response to Intervention, a school-wide Literacy Program, and Making Middle Schools Work key practices. The PLCs continued to implement a school-wide Literacy Plan that helped promote reading and writing across the curriculum and increased the number of students meeting their reading goals. Our teachers continued to offer extra help during and after school to students through many venues, such as, Friday School, Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude (PSAT) and End-of-Course Examination Program (EOCEP) forums, and the Intervention Plus Program. We continued a Lunch Buddies program in which community members mentored at-risk students. Westview Middle School's PLCs concentrated on the improvement of student achievement for underperforming student groups, such as, male students and at-risk students. Finally, our guidance department hosted career fairs, Individual Graduation Plan (IGP) meetings and a Warrior Wisdom Advisory Program to get students and parents interested in career, college, and life.

As a result, our students' academic achievement and extracurricular achievements continue to be among the highest in Berkeley County School District and the state. At Westview Middle School, two hundred eighty four students passed one of the following five high school credit courses: Algebra I, English I, French I, and Keyboarding and Computer Applications. Thirty-six eighth grade students qualified as Junior Scholars and five seventh grade students were recognized as Duke Tip Scholars. Fifty-five eighth grade students were recognized with the Presidential Awards for Educational Excellence, Achievement, or Citizenship. Several of our students participated in the following academic competitions: the Lego-League State Competition, the Regional Mock Trial, the Quiz Bowl, the Regional Spelling Bee, the Geography Bee, the Quest Academic Competition, and the Young Writers' Conference. Westview Middle School students proudly accepted multiple awards for demonstrating excellence in the performing arts. The Westview Middle School Band received a superior rating at the South Carolina Concert Festival and had forty all-county band participants, twenty-one regional band participants, and three all-state band participants. The Westview Middle School Chorus and Orchestra programs had sixteen students qualify for all-county chorus and fourteen students recognized for all-county orchestra. At Westview Middle School, we take great pride in the strength and diversity of our programs, the quality of teachers, the accomplishments of students, and participation of parents. We have initiated the implementation of the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) for English Language Arts and Mathematics. We will continue to use innovative ideas to accelerate beyond the state average, pushing to achieve our goal of reaching and surpassing the national average.

In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
