**Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating**

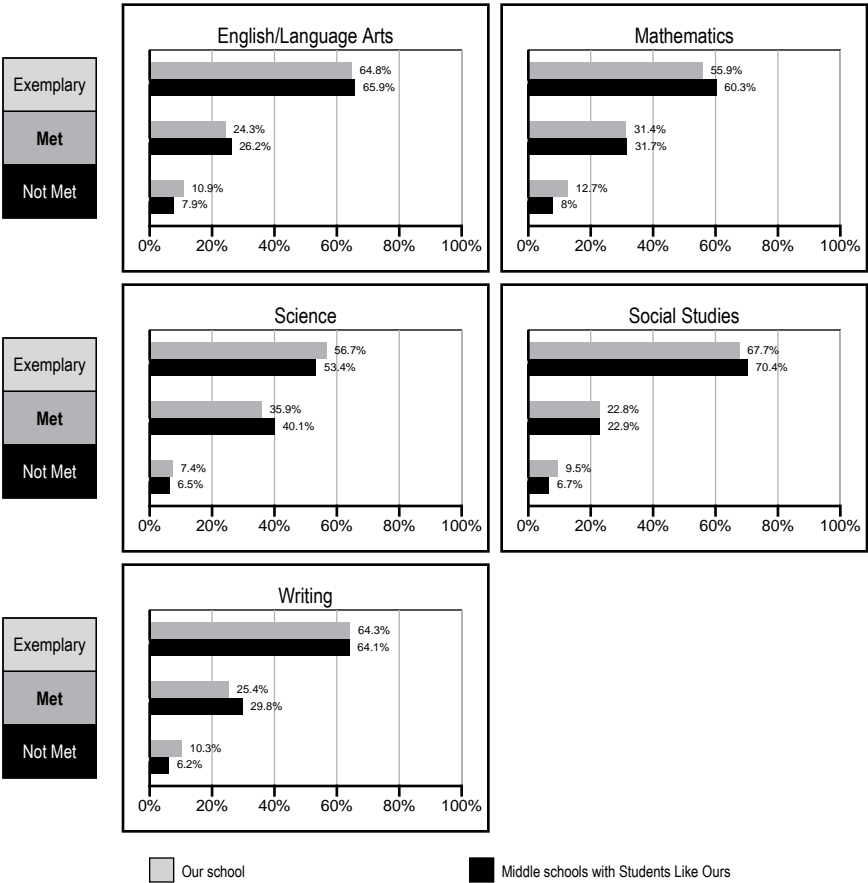

## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Daniel Island School continues to make great progress toward our vision: "To challenge and empower students to be successful in a highly competitive world". We are focused on the implementation of Common Core State Standards (CCSS). The purpose of this initiative is to ensure that our students receive a world-class education and the preparation necessary to succeed in the 21st century global market place. To help students prepare for the future, we must offer rigorous and meaningful curriculum and challenge ourselves to provide engaging lessons.

Daniel Island students are all about learning. We had 20 Junior Scholars and 100% passing rate for students who took the Algebra 1 and English 1 End of Course exams in the middle school. Our 7th grade students piloted a technology initiative that integrated iPads in the classroom. As we add more mobile devices to our inventory next school year we will be able to continue to work on our school-wide project based learning initiative. Along with our academic program we offer many related arts and extra-curricular activities. Our classes include choir, art, Spanish, Gateway to Technology (GTT), PE, journalism/yearbook and drama. Students are active in Student Council, BETA club, chess club, Taiko drum class, glee club, the school musical and a variety of other after school opportunities.

As a learning community, we also focus on the art of social interaction. As students venture through their developmental stages, focus is placed on contributing to a safe and caring community. Our Counseling Program focuses on characteristics that promote getting along with others, managing friendships and developing self-awareness. Learning self-control and the power of positive choices is foundational to establishing a productive path for the future. At DIS we plan for success of all students.

In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
