**Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating**

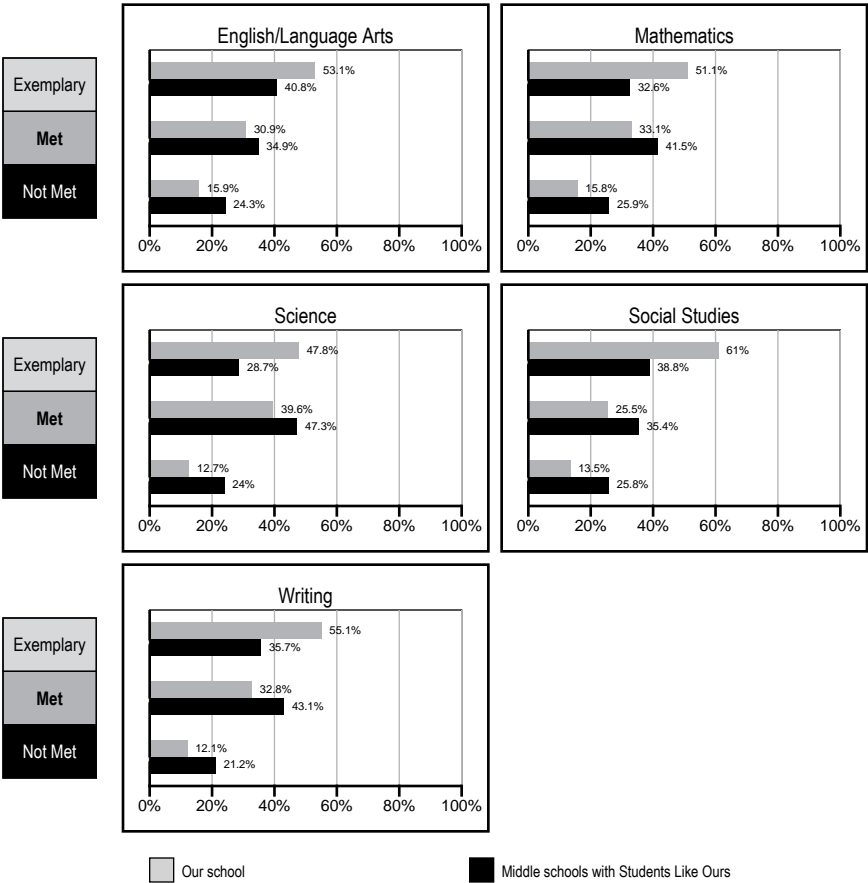

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## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

"One Team...One Dream!" was our school wide theme. Our first staff day focused on "team building and team relationships." We played off the dramatic Summer Olympics in London where our assistant principals dressed as "Royal Guards" to showcase our teachers. We modeled instructional strategies, addressed topics with student discipline, provided training in technology, and demonstrated techniques on conferencing skills. Our administrative team disaggregated our state PASS results and provided a power point presentation to our staff. Our staff and students achieved many awards. Our school finished with a number one status in schools like us in the state. We received an "Excellent" on the absolute rating (Gold) and an "Excellent" on the closing the gap rating (Silver) on our state report card. One of our Social Studies Teachers won the "National History Day" South Carolina Teacher of the Year Award and 10 students qualified for NHD State competition and 1 student advanced to NHD Nationals in Washington, DC. Our teacher will be advancing to National competition this summer. Other awards included 60 South Carolina Junior Scholars, 55 Explore Scholars, 7 John Hopkins' Scholars, 6 Duke TIP Scholars, 5 All County orchestra members, 6 All County, and 3 All Region Band members, 13 All County Chorus members. We finished in second place in Regional and fifth place in the state in Math Counts competition. Our archery team advanced to the national competition in Louisville, Kentucky in May. Our robotics team has 2 students compete in the Lego League Qualifying Tournament. In addition, our Spelling Bee and Geography Bee champions competed at the Region level, our Multi-Cultural committee held its 15th annual "Taste of St. James" dinner, Math-a-thon raised \$2600 for St. Jude's Research Hospital, \$10,000 was raised for "Freezing for a Reason" to support Special Olympics, school participated in "Relay for Life" program to support cancer research, and our student council association has sponsored a Community Red Cross Blood Drive, a Coats for Kids drive, a Nursing Home visit, a scholarship fund raising event for an education major, and many other community projects. Our PTSO and School Improvement Council coordinated the purchase of new "Walkie -Talkie" radios for our school. These organizations continue to provide breakfasts, lunches, and incentives for students and staff through-out the school year. We continue to focus on academics including our "20/20" 40 minute school wide reading comprehension program, implementing/adjusting our instructional strategies based on disaggregated data from the PASS assessment, MAP assessments, Benchmark quarterly tests, and classroom assessments. Our administrative team continues to follow through with teachers in their collaborative team meetings. This year, we conducted an Academic Pep Rally for our staff and students in preparation for PASS which was based on "The Greatest Show on Earth" theme. Our teachers continue to promote enrichment programs

In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
