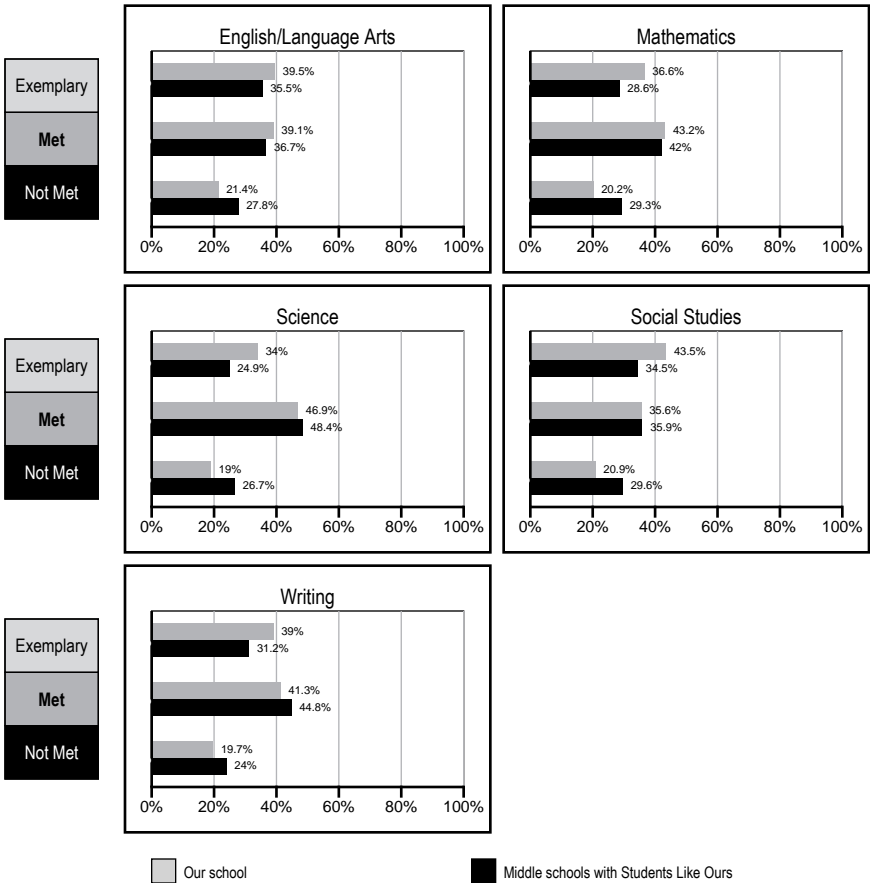

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## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

During the 2012-2013 school year Chesnee Middle School continued in the tradition of being exceptional in academics for students and their teachers. Our school's total number of teachers with National Board Certification is now at nine. One hundred nine students were in the Beta Club. Over two hundred and fifty students were honored as STAR students. Ten eighth grade students qualified as Junior Scholars. Twenty-four seventh grade students participated in the Duke University Talent Identification Project. Chesnee Middle School received a Palmetto Silver Award for an absolute rating of "Good" and a growth rating of "Good" on the state report card. CMS received a Palmetto Silver Award for closing the achievement gap. On the Federal ESEA Accountability Rating System we received a grade of "A". Students and staff published a newsletter, The Aerie, and a variety of other indigenous publications. CMS also participated in the Accelerated Reader Program and the Spelling Bee.

Chesnee Middle School shines with athletic achievements. Students enjoy playing for the Fighting Eagles' football and basketball teams. This year we added an additional sport, volleyball for our female athletes. The football and basketball teams enjoy winning seasons. Many of our students participate on the golf team, wrestling team, track team, softball and baseball teams at Chesnee High School.

Our students are artistic as well as intelligent. Three students were selected to participate in the Limestone College Honor Band. Many students participated in marching band. They were very successful this year winning the Upper State Championship and finishing second in the State Championship. The orchestra, band and chorus students entertained the community with concerts. Our art students' projects were displayed at the Chapman Cultural Center and at an in-house show. Sixth grade students entertained local day care facilities and elementary school students by acting like famous characters in children's novels in "Characters Alive."

As part of our Character Education Program, the students of Chesnee Middle School participated in many charitable activities. Our students collected over five thousand for Relay for Life. The Beta Club sponsored a 5k run benefit to help with expenses for a student battling cancer. We also donated cans of food for the Chesnee area food bank during the Thanksgiving Holiday. As a demonstration of our students' patriotism we participated in "Stuff a Soldier's Stocking" for Christmas. As part of our Veteran's Day program we had a breakfast to honor our veterans and their families. Faculty and staff also provided Christmas gifts for needy families in the Chesnee area.

Chesnee Middle School is proud of the accomplishments of our school family. The community and school amalgamate to inspire our young people to reach for excellence. We teach our students the importance of academic success as well as the necessity of good citizenship to prepare them to build an even greater America.

In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
