REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

During 2012-13, students, staff, and parents at Hannah-Pamplico Elementary Middle focused on student achievement, professional development, and parental involvement.

HPEM received the Palmetto Silver Award for General Performance for its 2012 Report Card ratings: the elementary grades maintained an Absolute rating of Average and a Growth rating of Good and the middle grades improved to Average in both the Absolute and Growth ratings. A preliminary comparison of HPEM's 2011-2012 PASS data to 2012-2013 PASS data shows consistency in the elementary grades. Third and fourth grades maintained previous performance levels with minimal improvement in ELA and math. There was a slight drop in science scores in both grades, but there was a marked improvement in social studies, with an increase in the number of students achieving Met in fourth grade and a 10% increase in the number achieving Exemplary in grade 3. In fifth grade, there was minimal improvement in the number of students meeting proficiency in science. The middle grades as a whole showed improvement over last year. Sixth grade showed improvement in all areas tested, with at least a 15% improvement in the students meeting proficiency in ELA, math, and science. Students who participated in single-gender classes in sixth grade outperformed their co-ed counterparts in all subjects. In seventh grade, the number meeting standard in science increased by 7% and in social studies by 4% with slight increases in those scoring Exemplary. Eighth grade showed significant growth across all tested areas in number of students meeting proficiency, with a 17% increase in ELA, a 26% increase in math, a 12% increase in science, and a 15% increase in social studies.

This year HPEM continued to focus on improving student achievement levels using inquiry-based instruction, Thinking Maps, Measures of Academic Progress testing; one-to-one computing using iPods/iPads; single-gender grouping; Soar to Success, Classworks, student goal-setting, and SRA. Professional development focused on data analysis, Common Core Standards implementation, and technology integration. The sixth-eighth grade ELA teachers participated in the first year of a writing grant through the Upstate Writing Project and the National Writing Project.

Our faculty, students, and parents have made significant accomplishments this year. Faculty members continued their educations and attained advanced degrees. Four eighth graders were named SC Junior Scholars and an eighth grader won the Pee Dee Regional Spelling Bee at Francis Marion University and participated in the National Spelling Bee in Washington, D.C. Our eighth graders participated in Advanced Placement courses and B-Teams sports. All students participated in our fine arts program, including holiday productions and a Broadway, Jr., production of Annie, Jr. Some of our students participated in Special Olympics. Our elementary students continued to break their own records by passing Accelerated Reader book tests. Students and staff participated in community service activities that benefited the American Heart Association and the Humane Society. Parents, grandparents, and community members actively participated in Grandparents' Day, Field Day, Month of the Young Adolescent, Pastries for Parents, etc.
