\* Placement Rate --- The percentage of career and technology completers available for placement over a 3-year period who are actually placed in postsecondary instruction, military services, or employment.

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Report of Director and School Improvement Council

The 2013-2014 school year has been exciting and filled with many successes and new challenges. The PCCTC has a new director and a new district program being housed on campus. Ken Hitchcock took over for Leonard Williams, who retired after serving eleven years as the director. The School District of Pickens County created a Drop-out Prevention program called C3 (Citizenship, College and Career) that has completed its debut in June 2014.

The PCCTC partnered with D-HEC to start SC Prairie Project on campus. This has involved several programs with the implementation of this exciting project. The first 9th grade STEM Academy for Pre-engineering and Bio-Medical careers was highly successful.

Our student organizations made a huge mark at the State and National level. FFA won several state competitions throughout the year with a strong delegation participating at the state convention at Clemson University. HOSA will be sending 14 students to the national convention in Orlando, Florida. PCCTC brought home 6 gold, 12 silver and 8 bronze medals from the Skills-USA state competition.

We are continuing to expand our partnership with local industry. Several advance manufacturing groups are recruiting our students into work-based learning opportunities. Many students have earned employment and scholarship opportunities this year.

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We will continue to improve our highly successful mock interview experience with students. We plan to enhance our cover letter and resume development with seniors. We have seen positive growth with Work-Keys results and acceptance to college.

A challenge for the future continues to be keeping up with technology- both equipment and software. The most significant challenge to us is the budget. We will continue to search for resources to keep our programs up-to-date. State and local funding has been cut significantly since 2008. However, the costs of supplies continue to rise.

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**ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System**

In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the Federal High and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target.
