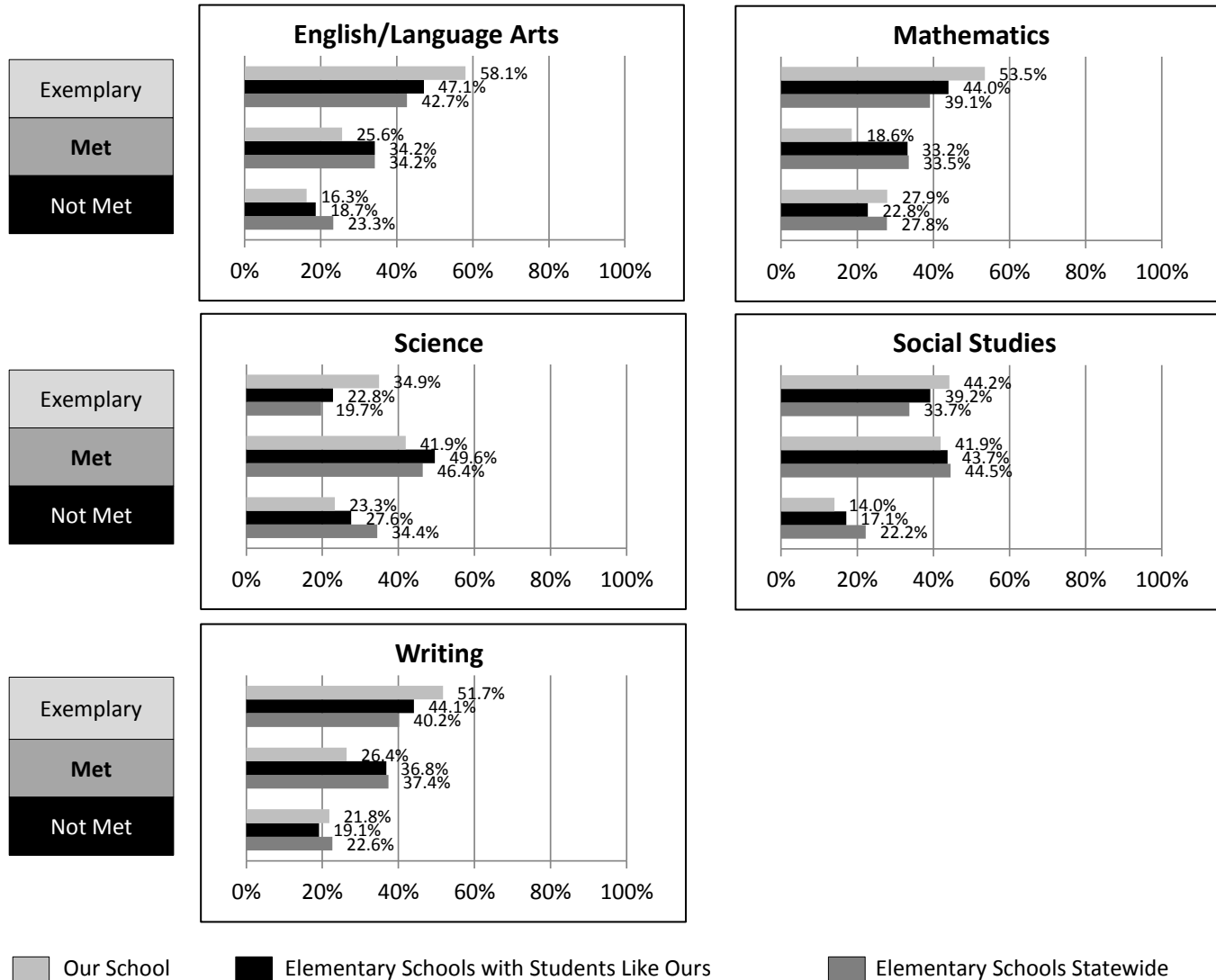

Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

The collaborative spirit among the Fair-Oak Elementary families, students, staff and community creates an atmosphere of excellence for all students. Transitioning from the SC Standards to the more rigorous Common Core State Standards played a key role in staff development. These higher standards prepare our students to compete world-wide at colleges and in their careers. Since reading at or above grade level is crucial to our students' preparedness for math, science and social studies, our strong reading program gives our students advantages in all academic areas. Annually, our students rise to the challenge and improve their skills. This is evident in our spring reading Measuring Academic Progress and Observation Survey results. The Text Level on Observation Survey results indicate our students' progress as 91% first graders read on and above grade level. Our second grade MAP reading mean results rank higher than the district mean score and slightly below the national mean. Third grade students rank the highest of all schools in the district on the reading, math and language MAP scores, above national and district rankings. Clearly, this evidence reveals our children are advanced in reading. ☐

Combining our solid balanced reading and writing initiative with the high expectations of the Common Core State Standards; our students receive expert instruction in reading and in math. Teaching students to read advanced informational material, to write argumentative and opinion papers and to build fluency in math boost students' achievement. ☐

To enhance students' emotional growth, the Positive Behavior Intervention team continues school-wide systems of positive rewards for following the R.A.C.E., R-(Respect) A-(Achieve) C- (Cooperate) E-(Eager to Learn) expectations. Students received daily mini lessons on the Chick Fil A Core Essentials and monthly incentives to purchase prizes at the school store and Victory lunches. Through the support of our community, our paved walking track extends physical activity opportunities for students who participate in the early morning walking club and in the Marathon Club. ☐

This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. 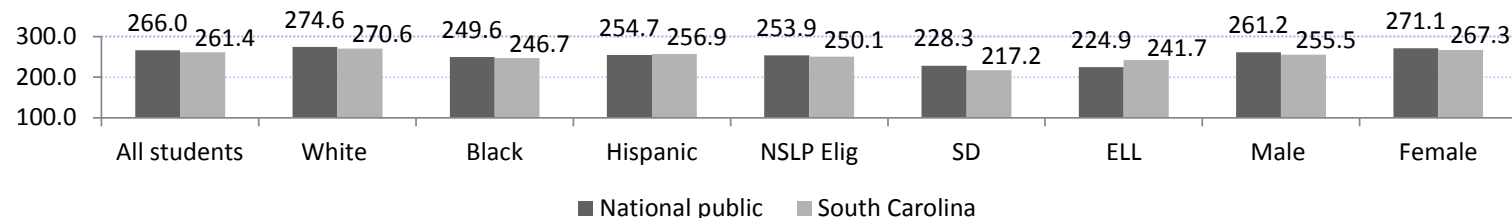
Reading - Grade 4 (2013)



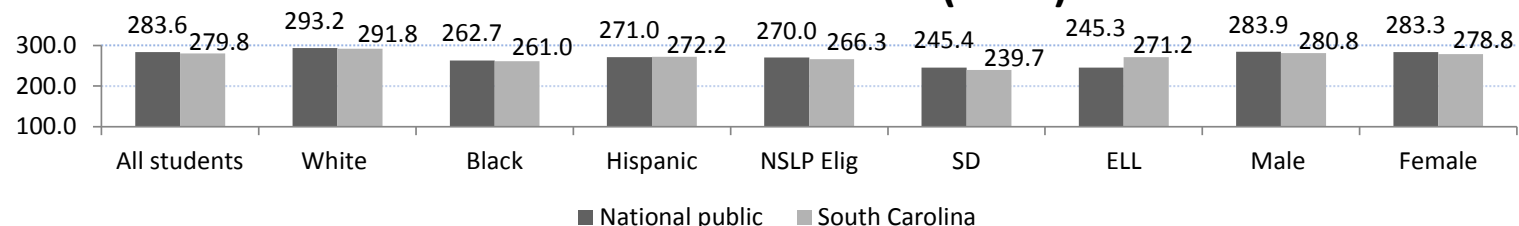
Mathematics - Grade 4 (2013)
