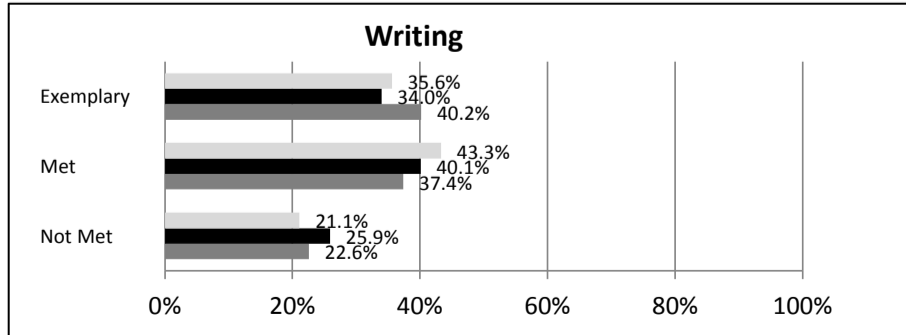

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REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

This year the “busy bees” of J. C. Lynch Elementary School joined in our theme, “MISSION: It’s Possible.” Our teachers were determined to show improvement in each of the content areas. They used the Common Core State Standards for their instruction and received year-long training on effective strategies to improve student achievement. As a TAP school, our teachers focused on writing with all of our students from pre-kindergarten to fifth grade and in all subject areas. They also found that teaching through small group instruction was just as successful in math as it is in learning to read. ☐

☐ Our students participated in school-wide events such as the Spelling Bee, Math Problem-Solving Competition, and National History Day. This year’s National History Day competition had three of our student groups place in the event. Students also had the opportunity to perform in the school musical, “The Legend of Sleepy Hollow” as well as sing in various concerts with our High Flyers Choir. Three students received special recognition for their art work displayed at the annual ArtFields Jr. art competition in Lake City. ☐

☐ Throughout the year students were recognized and awards were given for academics as well. Thirty-seven students scored exemplary on three or more areas of the SCPASS tests and were treated to a video gaming party. Each nine weeks there was a Celebration of Learning to recognize students on the honor roll, having perfect attendance, showing growth on MAP tests and having exemplary performance on PASS. ☐

☐ New for this year was the “Boys of Character” program. It was started to improve the self-esteem of our fifth grade boys before they entered the middle school. The boys participated in a variety of team building events and activities throughout the year and a special bond was made for these twenty five boys. Our students also learned the importance of giving back to the community in a variety of ways. Each grade level selected a worthy cause to support and encouraged school-wide participation for that cause. Our students and staff showed their support by wearing fuzzy moustaches for the Prostate Cancer Foundation, collecting a lot of change for the March of Dimes, creating a school zoo to help the Florence Area Humane Society, sending cards to soldiers, recycling plastic bottles, wearing hats for the children at St. Jude’s, making rescue monsters, and donating canned goods for the local food pantry. ☐
