REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Boiling Springs Intermediate School students began their quest for a quality education during the 2013-2014 school year as they embraced the theme “Mission I’m Possible: Lights...Camera...Action...Lead!” The new state standards provided students with a foundation for success in college, career, and life. Teachers and students welcomed this problem solving, collaborative, critical thinking, and creative approach as a vital part of student’s education. Students were also charged with taking on meaningful leadership roles and responsibilities at school and in the community.☒

Boling Springs Intermediate School concentrated on student growth with an emphasis on state standards, Project Based Learning (PBL) and providing additional services to struggling students with the Response to Intervention process (RTI). The new state standards provided our students with consistent, rigorous academic goals to attain in ELA and math with the integration of science and social studies. Students were actively engaged in the learning process as they became independent thinkers. Students were involved in Project Based Learning activities that provided relevant, real world learning experiences. BSI students were excited about their participation in two PBL’s. As students participated in Mission I’m Possible: Save the World and Weather and Safety Begin with the End in Mind they actively explored these real-world problems and challenges to acquire a deeper understanding of the content. Students incorporated technology to effectively communicate their acquired knowledge. The RTI process addressed students’ needs through multiple tiers of increasingly intensive instructional interventions. ☒

Students, staff, parents, and stakeholders worked together to effectively build a culture of leadership in classrooms and throughout the school by using data notebooks, student-led conferences, student leadership roles and community service projects. The data notebooks empowered students to think about what they want to achieve by setting and tracking class, school, and personal goals. The student-led conferences provided students with the opportunity to be actively involved in their learning and assume responsibility for the learning process. Through student-led conference, students become more motivated, reflective, and evaluative. They also became more critical in their approach to learning. Students took active leadership roles by hosting awards day ceremonies, orientations, and other events. BSI students were also leaders in the community as they participated in Isaac’s Christmas Toy Drive, a canned food drive for the Upstate Family Resource Center, Jump Rope for Heart, Hoops for Heart, The Children’s Security Blanket, and The Shriner’s Hospital for Children. Students at BSI know they are important, that they matter, and that they can be leaders every day in their own way.☒
