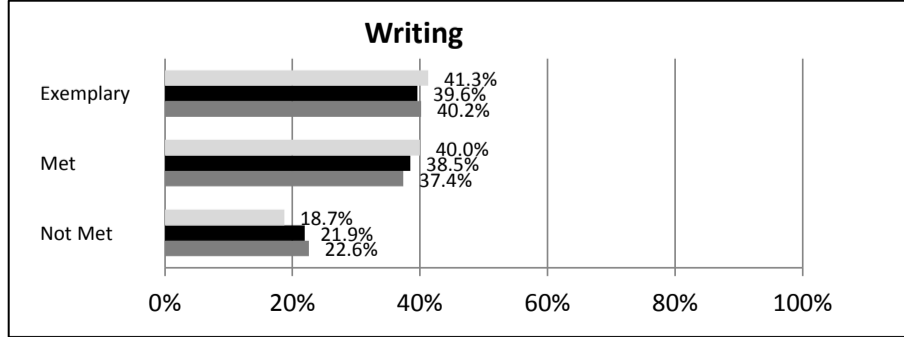

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Independence Elementary School (IDES) is a suburban Title I school that serves a diverse population of over 575 students in grades 4K–5. IDES believes that nothing is more important than children. We are continually committed to the social, emotional, and academic development of every child. Our school is a safe, challenging, caring, and supportive environment where teachers, parents, students, and community members work together to ensure all Independence students have a solid foundation for life. We strive to make the learning experiences at Independence fun and engaging while holding everyone accountable for reaching his or her highest potential. ☐

IDES has celebrated many successes in the 2013-14 school year. IDES was one of four elementary schools to receive the recognition as a “Reward School for Performance”, indicating that IDES is one of the highest performing Title I schools for the school year. IDES achieved 95.71% of its objectives in ELA and 85.71% of its objectives in mathematics. ☐

We continue to implement our School Improvement Plan (SIP), which is directly aligned to the District Strategic Plan. The three main goals of the SIP are continually implemented and monitored for fidelity of implementation: Quality Work Design/Delivery of effective Tier I Instruction, Shared Vision & Beliefs, and Nurturing Environment. To continue to improve the quality of instruction, teachers utilize Tiered Instruction through Response to Interventions (RtI). Response to Intervention implementation includes Tier I instruction with fidelity, Tier II targeted interventions, and Tier III intensive support. School-wide nurturing environment has been supported through the implementation of Positive Behavior Intervention & Supports (PBIS) framework. PBIS is a systemic approach to proactive, school-wide behavior based on the RtI model, which includes strategies for all students to increase academic performance, improve safety, decrease problem behavior, and establish a positive school culture. A unified IDES mission/vision was developed for IDES to insure the entire school community is united as it moves forward. The mission/vision is in direct alignment with the SIP and District Strategic Plan. ☐

We continue to provide many programs to help our students be successful and well-rounded. Students have an array of opportunities in which to participate, including Dance Team, Step Team, Lady Patriots, Recycling Club, Battle of the Books, Safety Patrol, Tech Squad, Girls on the Run, and Patriot Council. Community connections continued to improve through planned PTO, Title I, and school events including a Fall Festival, Fun Run, CSI Night, Super Hero Math, Lunch & Learn, Donuts with Dads, Muffins with Moms, Books & Blankets, Watch D.O.G.S. Dads, and grade-level Field Studies. ☐

Independence Elementary believes in the power of technology. Independence was the 1st school in the district to hold a Parent Information Night about the district’s iRock initiative. All 4th & 5th grade students have an iPad assigned to them to use during the school day for a true 1:1 environment. We currently have a 2nd grade challenged-based learning class and have purchased many iPads which are used school-wide. Students are encouraged to bring their own devices to use as well. We believe in iRock: Learning Anytime, Anywhere! ☐
