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Report of Principal and School

Once again we have had a very successful and exciting year at CHS. The efforts of all our stakeholders including teachers, students, parents, and our community helped us to achieve our success. Our ACT scores are among the highest in the Upstate and above both the state and national averages. We have been nationally recognized by U.S. News and World Report as among the top 10% of high schools as well as being ranked 14th in the state. [2]

Our focus this year has been Project-Based Learning as a method to implement the new state standards. Our emphasis on literacy and reading across the curriculum has eased this transition. Our faculty has participated in bimonthly professional development sessions in an effort to continue to improve our instructional practices. We are very fortunate to have a math coach along with our literacy coach who work with our teachers individually and as departments to ensure that our students achieve at their highest levels. [2]

Our Guidance Department and our Career Development Specialist work to ensure that students have the information needed to make informed decisions about their futures. Through career cluster meetings, monthly Career Fairs, and individual graduation plans, CHS students are exposed to the endless possibilities open to them. Our guidance counselors also assist students with registering for college entrance exams and share test-taking strategies. They also offer after-school sessions to aid in completing scholarship applications, offer a financial aid workshop for students and parents, and provide a college application day for all seniors. CHS continues to participate in the school improvement initiative High Schools That Work. Through increased rigorous course work, high expectations for student achievement, and an emphasis on career and technical areas, we are preparing our students for success in college and careers. Based on the 2014 HSTW assessment, 43% of the 60 seniors who were assessed received an Outstanding Achievement Award based on their course work and high scores on the assessment. [2]

We are very excited about our new classrooms, gym, weight room, wrestling room, and training facility. Our STEAM Academy, which is housed in our new classroom space, offers our students new and exciting opportunities in the areas of science, technology, engineering, arts and math through project-based learning and integrated curriculum. An additional component of our STEAM Academy is our STEAM 1 and STEAM 2 classes which provide hands-on learning experiences for students through real-world modules that expose them to career opportunities available in our area. This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years. 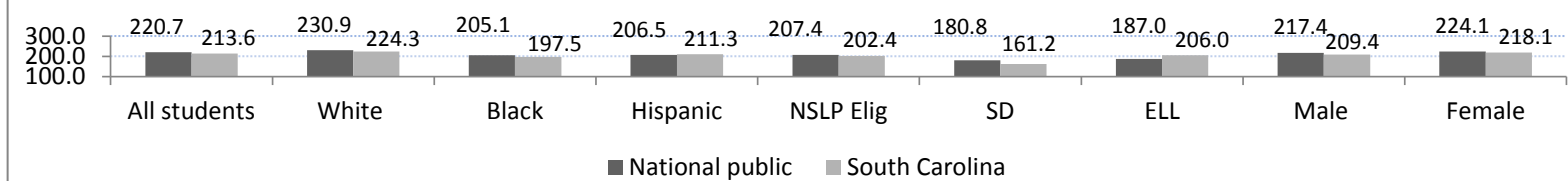

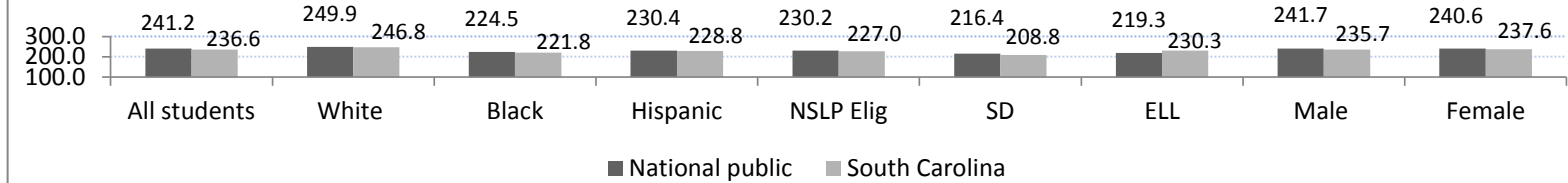

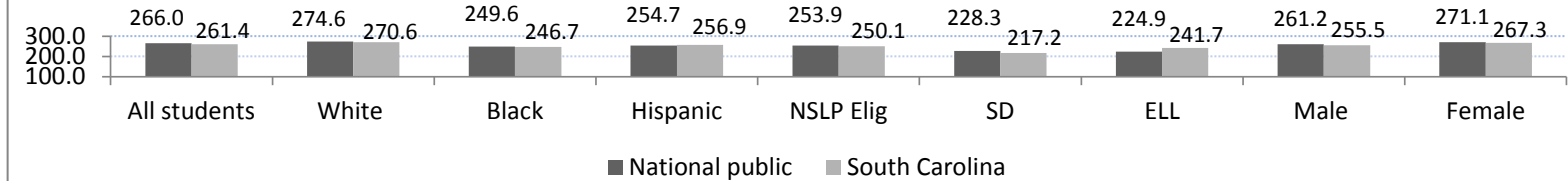
Reading - Grade 4 (2013)



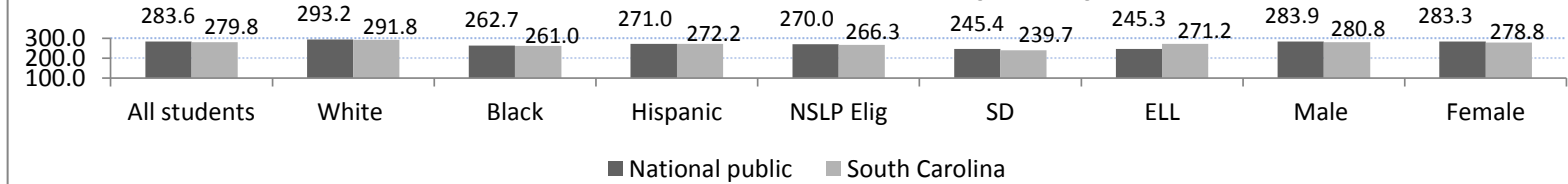
Mathematics - Grade 4 (2013)
