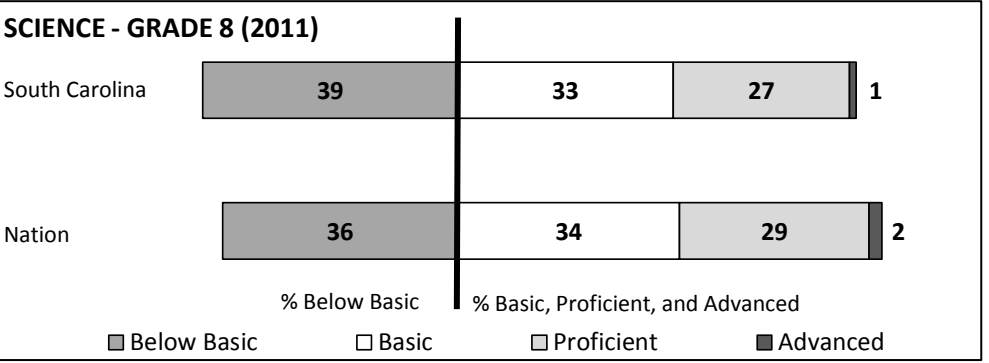
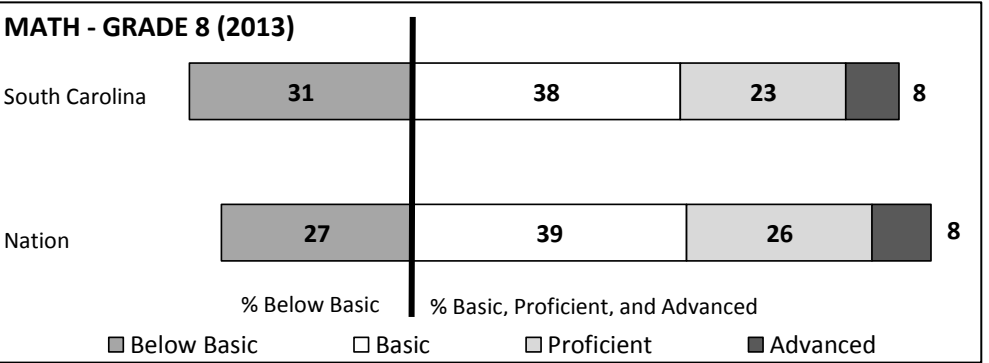
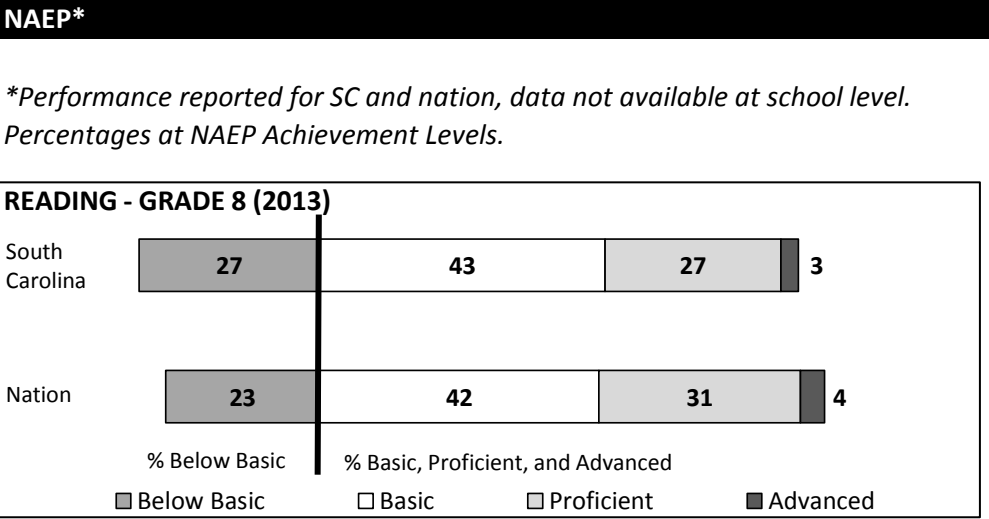

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REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL
IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Colleton County High School is proud of our students during the 2013-2014 year. The Class of 2014 graduated 317 students with 286 receiving State High School Diplomas and 17 receiving State Certificates. Special Education included 12 Employability Certificates and 2 Certificates of Attendance. We have 3 students who qualify as Palmetto Fellows, 86 Life Scholarships, and 37 who qualify for the HOPE scholarship. The total scholarships amounted to \$3,756,435.. Twenty-three students took and passed the Certified Nurse Assistant exam.

In extracurricular activities, CCHS Academic Team once again placed first in the USC Salkehatchie Bowl. CCHS Student Council hosted the 66th State Student Council Conference in 2014. This year, NJROTC Unit placed in the top 15% in Region 5 National Academic Meets, first at North Charleston drill meet, and best marching unit at the Yemassee Shrimp Festival. Our school attained Bronze status from Partners for Healthier Alliance. Cougar athletic girls' basketball team had an exciting season, making it in to the second round of the Region 8 AAAA lower state championship.

Focusing on the arts, students in the CCHS Chorus Department continued to provide outstanding entertainment during their annual Christmas concert, “Spirit of the Season” and spring concert, “Peter Pan”, four students participated in ALL State, and one student auditioned making S.C. Governor's School. Eighteen students went to New York workshops on Broadway and Vocal Seminar at CSU as well as numerous community and school functions. The CCHS Drama Department performed “Voices from the High School” by Peter Dee. The Band of Blue had 14 members earn SCBDA Region Band Honors, and one student was named to the 2014 US Army All-American Marching Band. The Varsity Winterguard placed first in the Scholastic AA Gold Division of the 2014 Carolina Winter Ensemble Association Winterguard and Indoor Percussion Championship. The high school students remained active in the community by hosting and participating in the American Red Cross Blood Drives, Pennies for Patients, March of Dimes, Special Olympics, and Relay For Life.

We continue to focus our efforts on providing a quality education for all our students. Our goal is to provide every student the support and resources needed to be successful. We would like to thank our teachers, parents, and students who helped make the many successes of this year possible with their commitment to the cause of education in Colleton County. These initiatives and success stories are testimony to our commitment to motivate students to accomplish the common goal of graduating from an academically rigorous and challenging high school composed of caring, competent, and committed educators.
