Students in the Edgefield County School District are developing world class skills and the life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate through its commitment of "Preparing Our Children for the Real World the Right Way". Due to a three-year plan that began in 2012, the district is experiencing positive results from intense professional development for administrators, teachers and all staff which directly impacts classroom instruction. An intense Response to Intervention (RTI) program that involves data driven instructional practices serves students struggling in one or more academic areas. Rigorous standards with high expectations for student learning are practiced in all grade levels and subject areas.

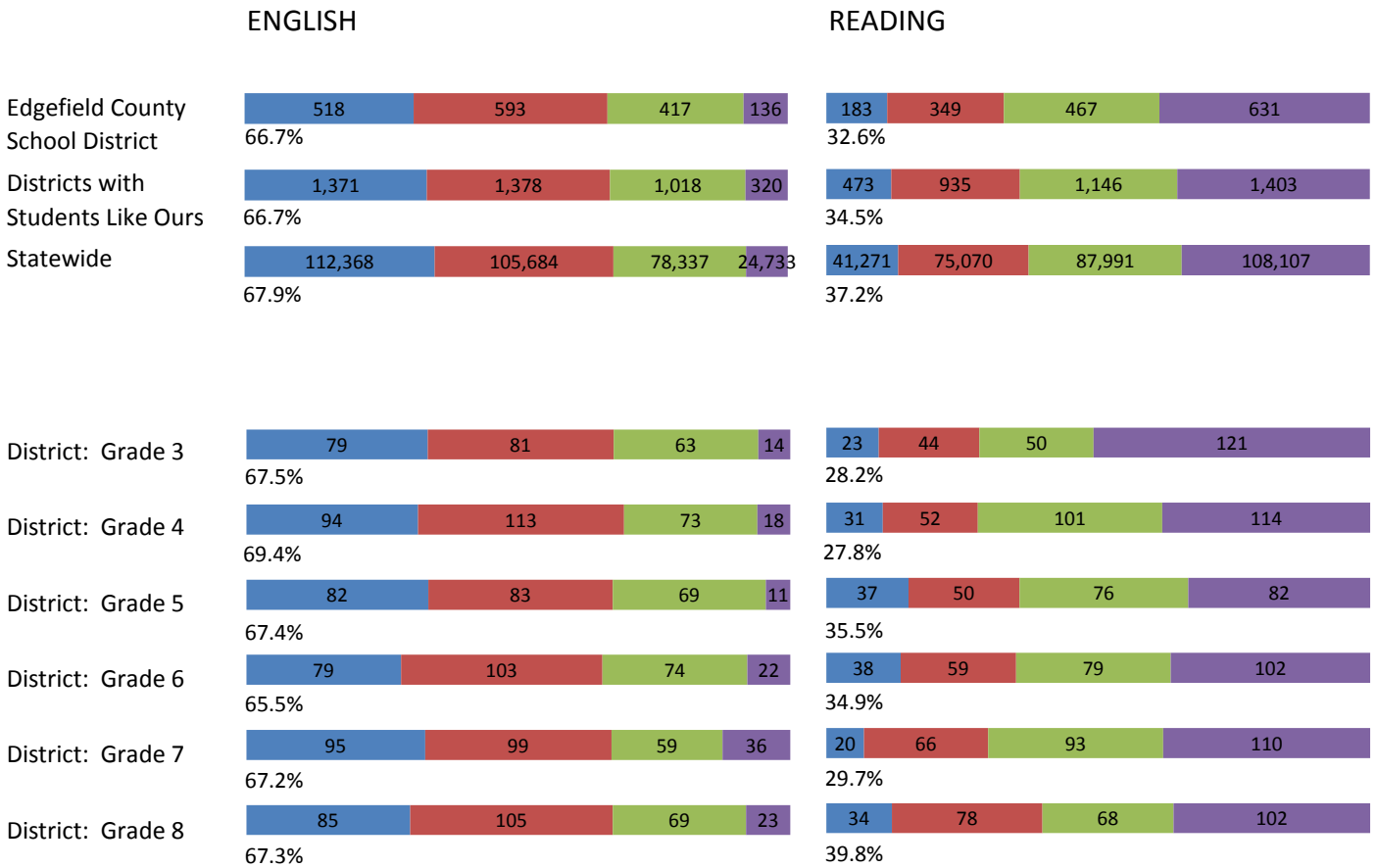
Transitioning students from one level to the next remains a key focus. Strom Thurmond High School continues to utilize the Freshman Academy to better acclimate rising 9th graders. Guidance and counseling services are a priority in the district and the amount of scholarships awarded to our senior students in 2015 crossed the five million dollar mark. Dramatic steps have been taken by the school district to improve the use of technology. Each school is equipped with the proper, up to date infrastructure which allows them to move forward using technology to engage and motivate students for learning. The Strom Thurmond Career and Technology Center (STCTC) began several innovative programs that currently involve over 80% of the high school population with numerous state and national winners. STCTC implemented a Sports Medicine program and Digital Media Marketing. In addition, Automotive Technology, Building Construction Technology and Business Management Administration programs were enhanced. Building Construction Technology students constructed a 1500 square foot home. Each of these activities provided students with real life experiences and prepared them for the world of work. District personnel remain committed to serve as direct support to teachers and school administrators in an effort to assist with the number one daily focus, preparing each student for life success. The entire school district adopted and implemented the TAP model that provides additional staff, research based professional development aligned with the most updated teaching methodology, supportive observational tools, and direct financial incentives for school personnel. These elements of the TAP model have prepared the district for state mandated implementation of SLOs.

Edgefield County School District remains committed to providing the best educational experience for all students. Our commitment to educating the whole child while increasing student achievement will continue to be achieved through a collaborative effort of all stakeholders.

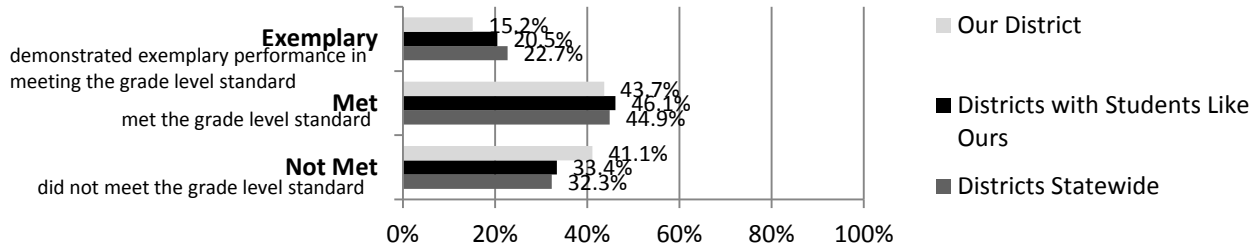
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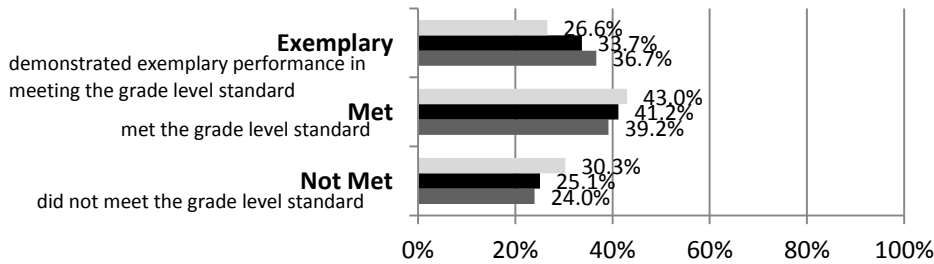

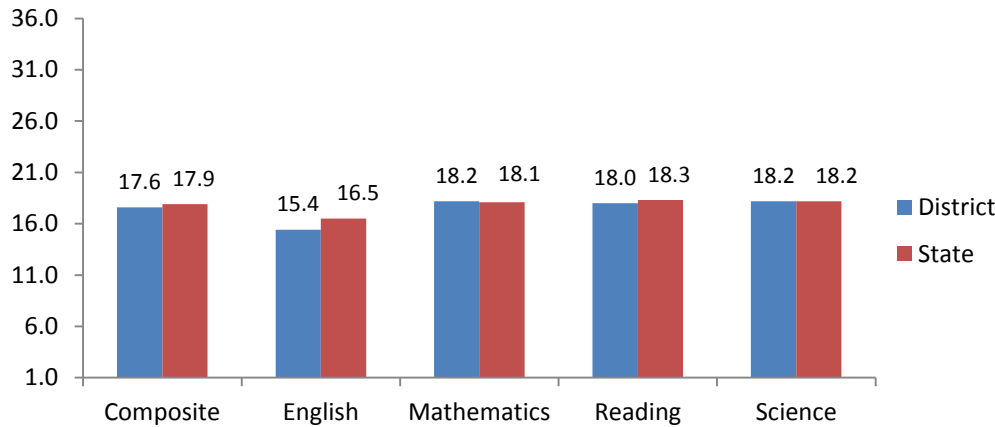

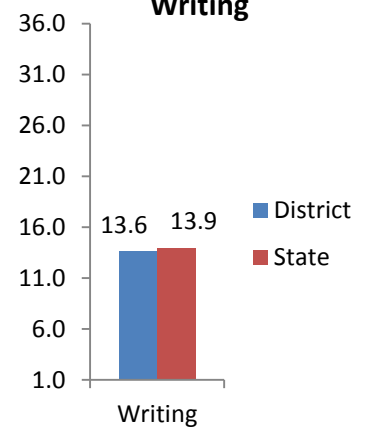
Districts with Students Like Ours are districts with poverty indices of no more than 5% above or below the index for the district.

The ACT, a college readiness assessment, was given to every South Carolina 11th grader in 2015 with the exception of those eligible for alternate assessments. The ACT scores range from 0 to 36. The district and state averages are included for comparison. State averages for ACT data are based on regular public schools and do not include private schools in the state.

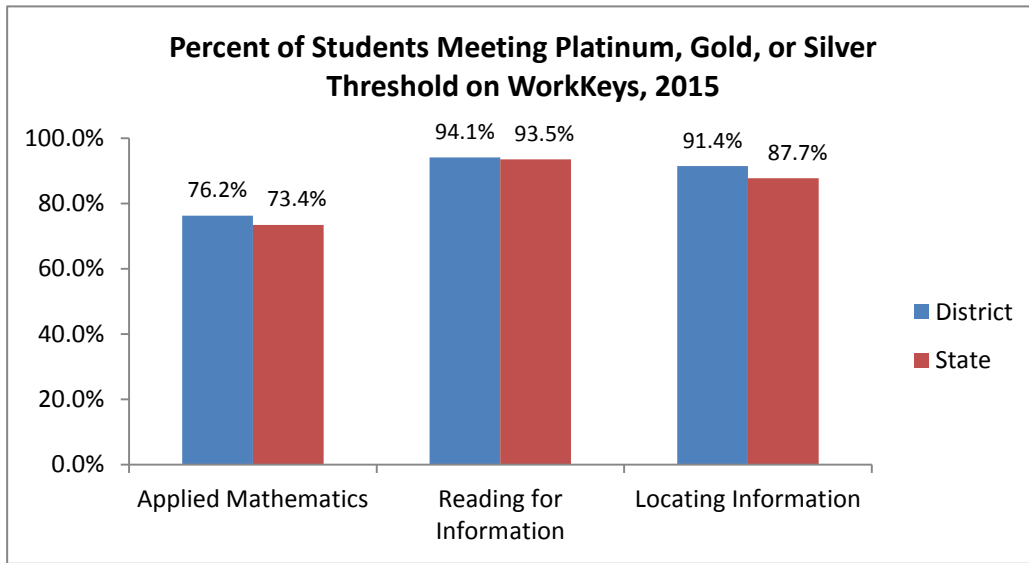

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**KNOWLEDGE**

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
