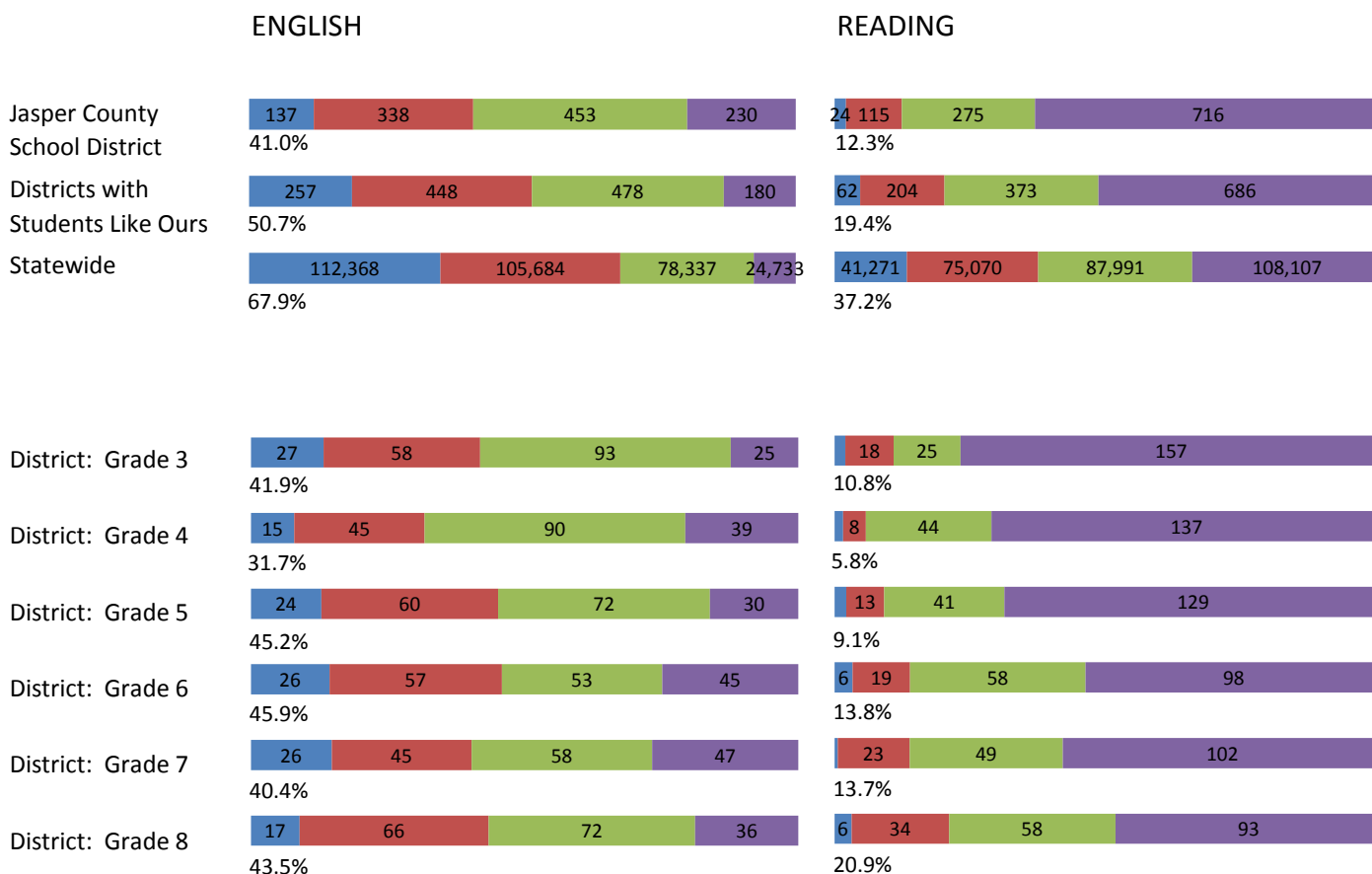

Chinese proverb Over the past five years, the Jasper County School District has had significant improvement. One of our most memorable events this past school year was the number of parents who participated in our first District-Wide Literacy Fair. More than one thousand parents attended both literacy fairs at the Ridgeland and Hardeeville campuses. Teachers provided opportunities for parents to learn about reading and mathematics and demonstrated learning games that the children can utilize during family time while at home over the summer. Reading is the lifeline for students and our goal is to increase the number of students each year that are reading on grade level. In addition to this great news, the 2015 high school graduating class' top ten students received more than \$1.2 Million in scholarships. The total amount of scholarships for the entire graduating class was \$3.6 Million. There was also a significant increase in the number of students who have been accepted at two-year and four-year colleges and universities. Our goal for the 2015-2016 school year is to continue our focus on the importance of literacy and how it connects to all content areas. We extend an invitation to all Jasper County residents and the surrounding communities to come volunteer in our schools. Our students will benefit greatly by having adults who care about them and share their love of reading and the importance of reading. We know that overcoming obstacles in a rural setting is not an easy task. However, our students are capable of achieving great things with the support of the Jasper County Board of Trustees members, faculty and staff, parents, and the community. 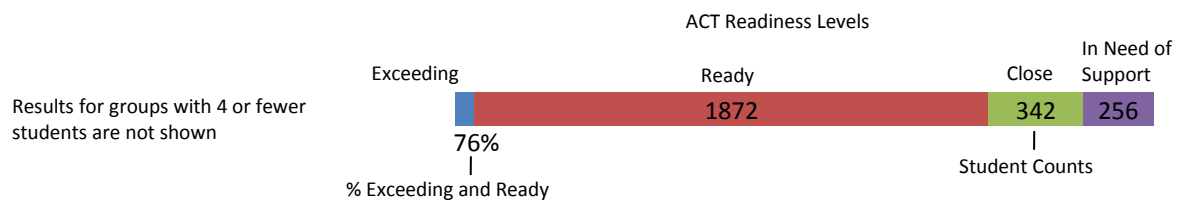

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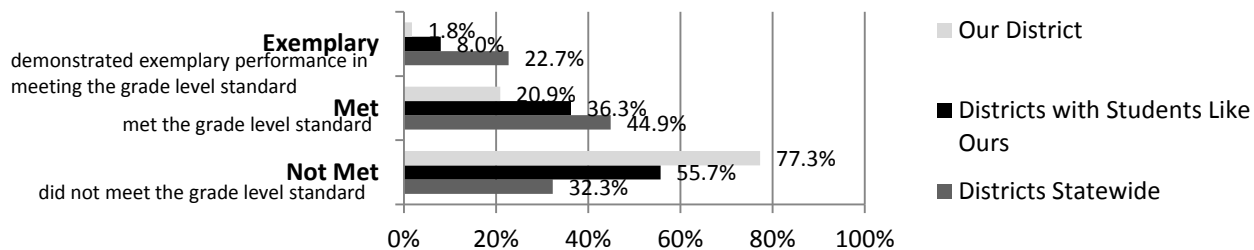
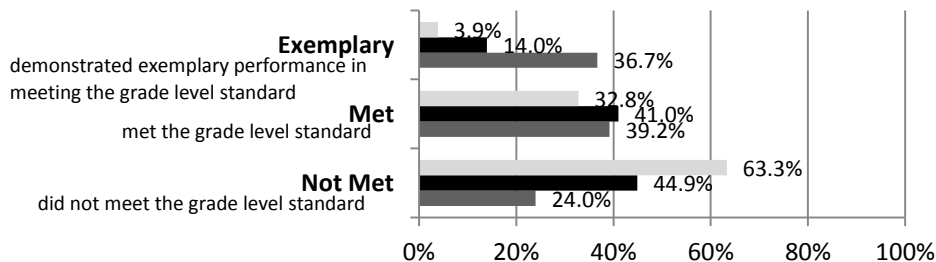

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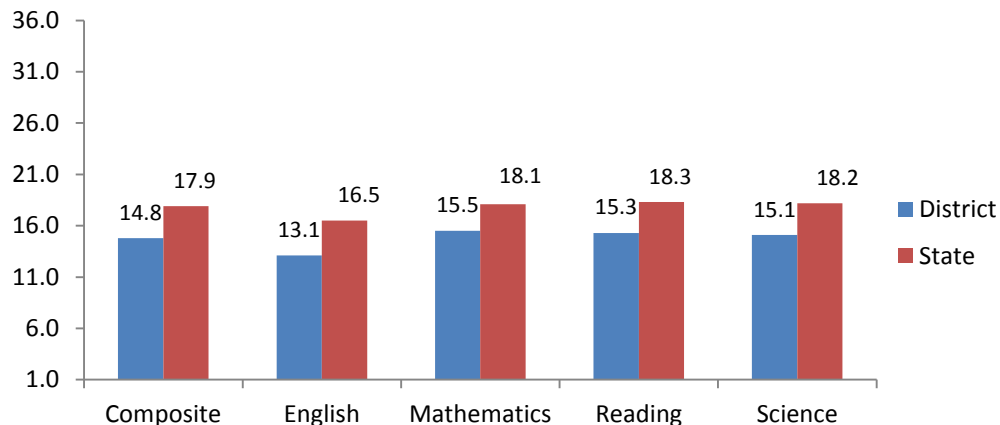

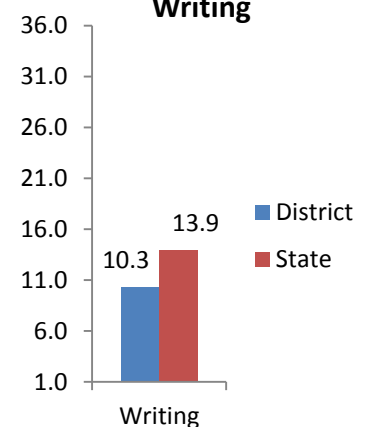
Districts with Students Like Ours are districts with poverty indices of no more than 5% above or below the index for the district.

The ACT, a college readiness assessment, was given to every South Carolina 11th grader in 2015 with the exception of those eligible for alternate assessments. The ACT scores range from 0 to 36. The district and state averages are included for comparison. State averages for ACT data are based on regular public schools and do not include private schools in the state.

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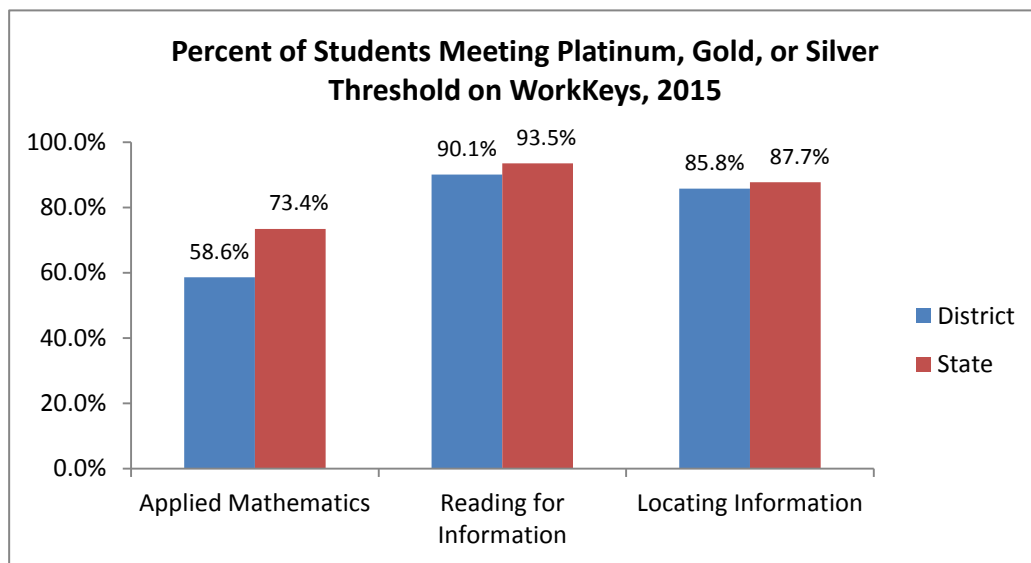
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KNOWLEDGE

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
