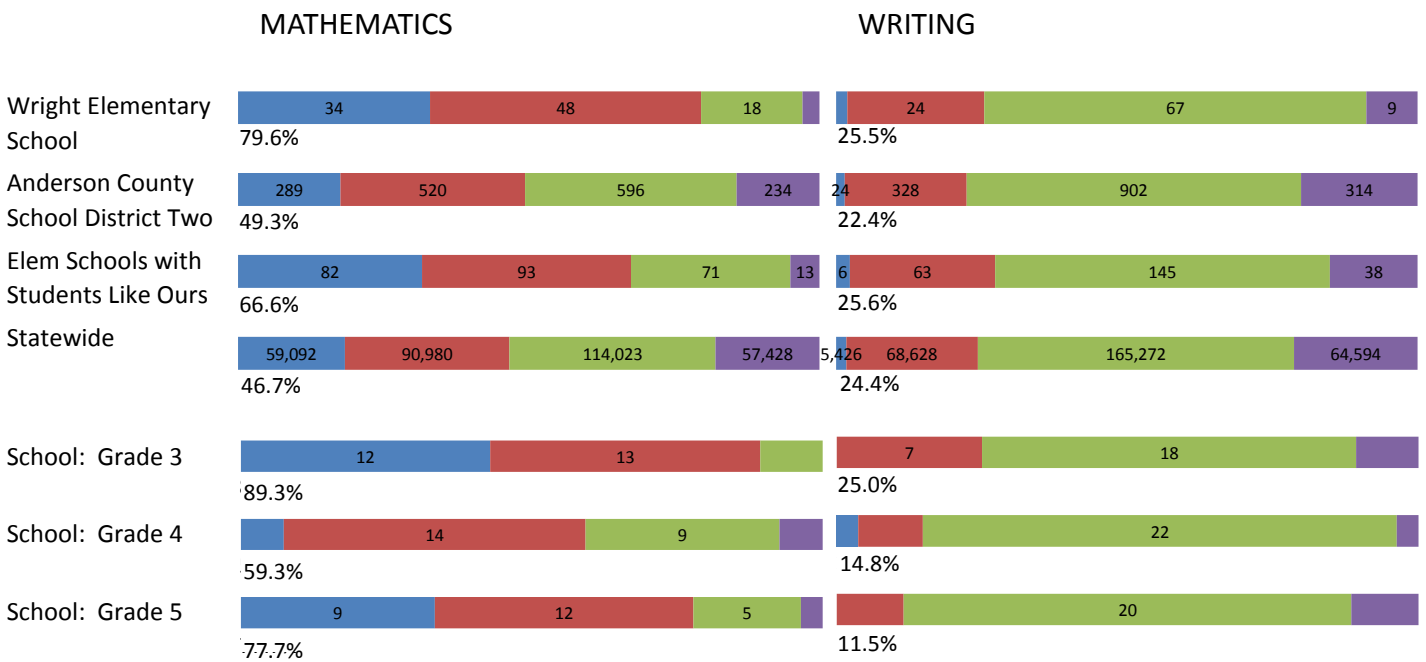

Wright Elementary School is helping all students develop the world class skills, life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by emphasizing the dedication of home, students, school, and community to provide a quality education in a safe learning environment. Through rigorous curriculum, high expectations for student achievement and relevant learning experiences, all are encouraged to achieve at their maximum potential. Throughout the year, book studies, professional learning communities, staff development opportunities, and peer observations allow our faculty to continually strive to maximize the effectiveness of instruction and professional growth to ensure success. Focused initiatives enable teachers to learn new and effective strategies: Daily 5, CAFÉ, STEM, small group guided reading and math, Daily 3 Math, hands on science, Write from the Beginning, CLC, math and reading interventions, digital research, and technology supports. Our continued academic success is truly a proud accomplishment of all. Wright Elementary fosters various programs outside the academic world to focus on the development of the whole child. A school-wide Positive Behavior and Intervention Support (PBIS) program rewards positive behaviors observed throughout the school. Wright Quality Kids are identified monthly for exemplifying positive traits. To support and encourage positive behaviors, the Core Essentials program is implemented as well. This program, in marriage with our guidance program, builds character education in which students prepare for a future where they treat others with respect, make smart decisions, and maximize their potential. To build leadership capacity among students, our Handy Helper program is in place. The program combines career education, character education with real life experiences, and service learning by volunteering. Numerous service learning opportunities allow students to give back to the community. Wright Elementary partners with the Ronald McDonald House through the pop tab collection project. The pop tabs are a part of a recycling effort that brings in money to provide a "home away from home" for seriously ill children receiving treatment at nearby hospitals. Other service learning projects include: Reduce and Reuse Clothing Drive, Mitten Tree Drive, Shoe Recycling, and Share the Warmth Blanket Drive. At WES, we believe that it is a partnered effort with families and community to ensure the best educational opportunity for our students in creating future SC graduates and leaders.

The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



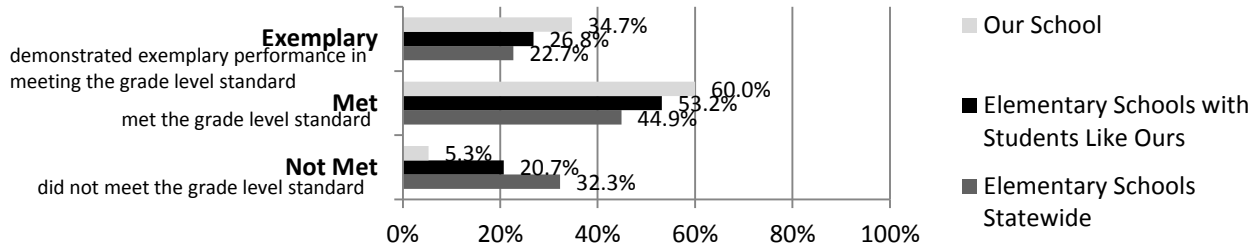

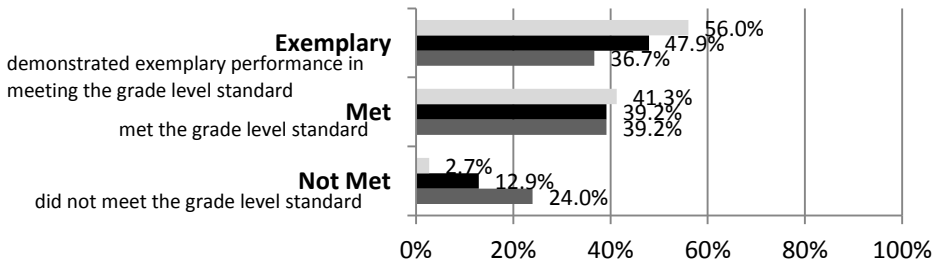
