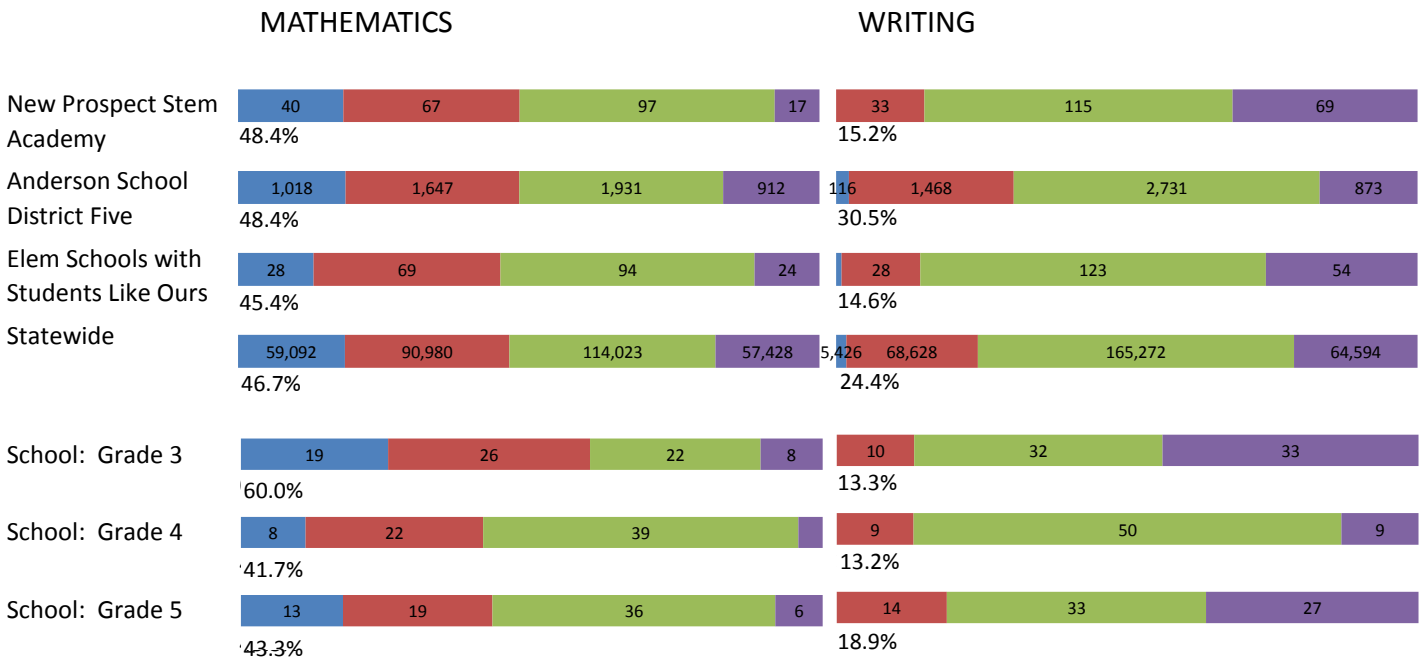
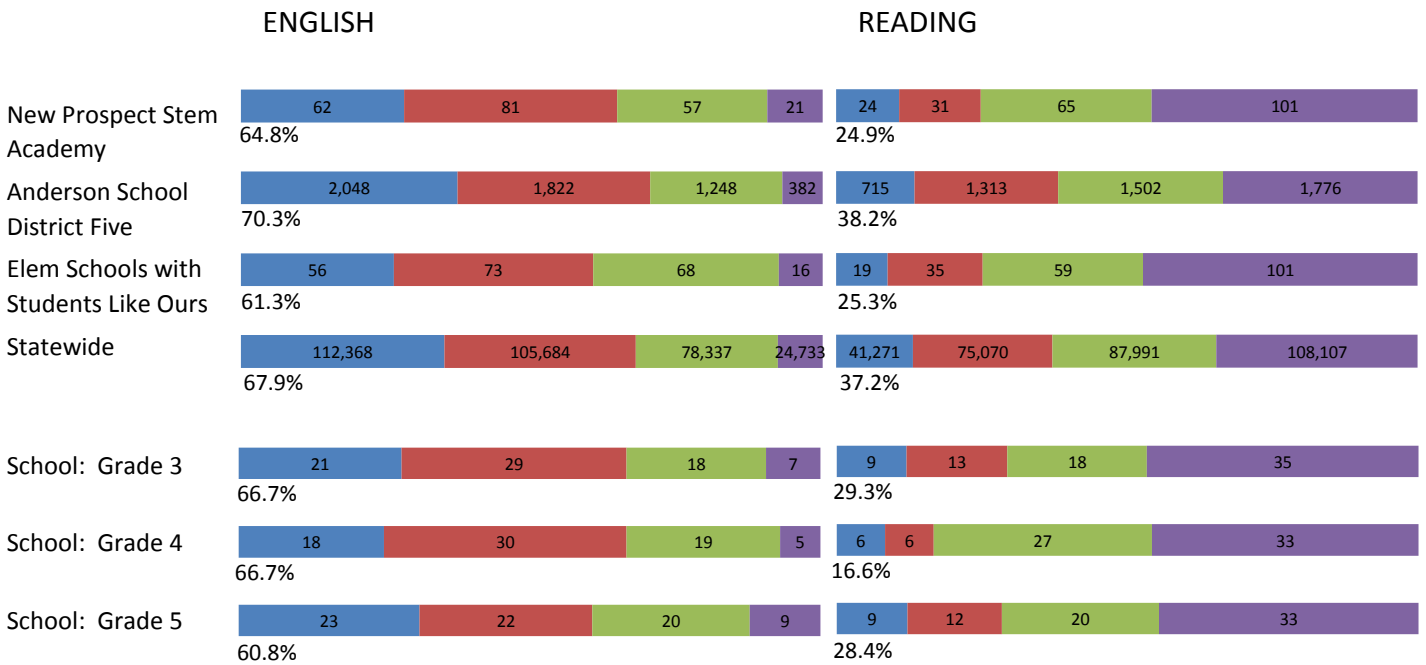
**WORLD CLASS SKILLS & LIFE AND CAREER CHARACTERISTICS**

Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by providing a well-balanced curriculum and extracurricular activities which will provide an excellent foundation for students entering middle school. Our teachers focus on using a balanced literacy approach for ELA, science kits and CORE training, Calendar Math is an integral part of our math program, and a variety of primary documents are used to teach social studies. Our curriculum is infused with STEM lessons to further enhance our STEM initiative. A certified STEM teacher develops inquiry lessons to help develop critical thinking skills. This becomes an overlay over the district's Approved Curriculum in all content areas. Also, all students receive weekly instruction in music, physical education, computers, center, and art. Guidance is a part of our school's curriculum with Character Education and Bullying Prevention as an emphasis. As a response to intervention, we offer Reading Recovery and ERI to K – 2nd graders, and a certified teacher serves as an interventionist in Grades 3-5 in Reading and Math instruction. Our 21st Century Afterschool Program serves 130 students receiving additional instruction before and after school from our certified teaching staff. Kindergarten students benefit from the Morning LEAP Peer-Teaching Program that is done by fifth graders. All faculty, staff, and students benefit from an instructional facilitator and an assistant principal. We also have a fulltime nurse and 1.5 guidance counselors to address the health and emotional needs of all students. We encourage student academic excellence through the use of Accelerated Reader and the Order of the Scroll Writing Awards. Gifted and Talented students in grades 3 – 5 receive instruction from an itinerant teacher weekly, and we have two K-5 ID classes on campus. "Our school motto is "We are the High Flying Jets." To celebrate student achievement and behavior, we have "Top Jets," "Terrific Kids," and "Double E" Awards. Students also benefit from a number of extension activities such as Student Government, Turbo Jets, Science Club, Beta Club, Robotics, a Writers' Guild for Fifth Grade Resource Students, Step and Dance, Art Club, Flag Football Club, Volleyball Club, Basketball Club, and Strings. Other opportunities include Jazzy Jets Chorus, Family Nights, Book Fairs, Movie Night, Running Club and Skate Nights. Most recently, New Prospect received recognition with silver flags for Closing the Achievement Gap and Student Performance. Our challenge is to empower children to achieve their potential in a diverse, safe, innovative, and caring environment while preparing them to be lifelong learners and productive members of society. A major goal is to provide our children opportunities to excel in all subject areas through the use of a STEM centered approach to learning. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



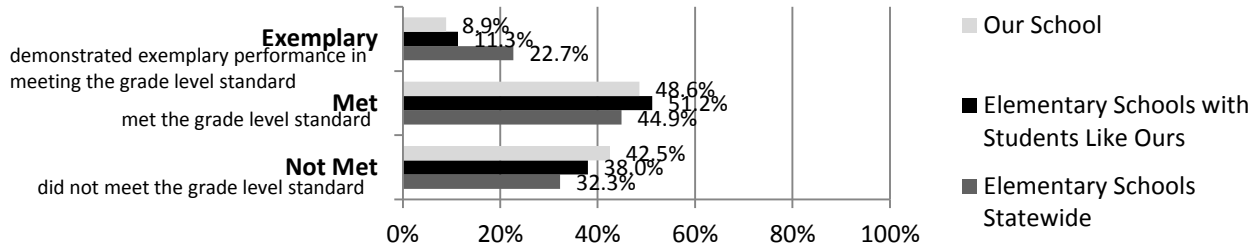

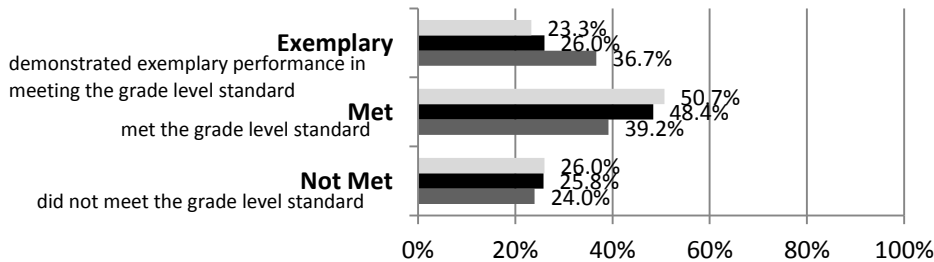
**KNOWLEDGE**
