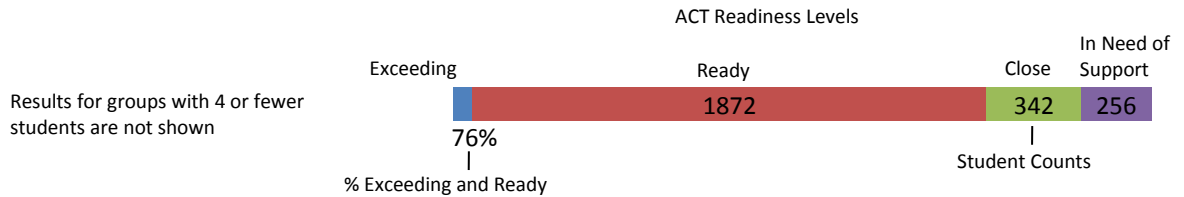
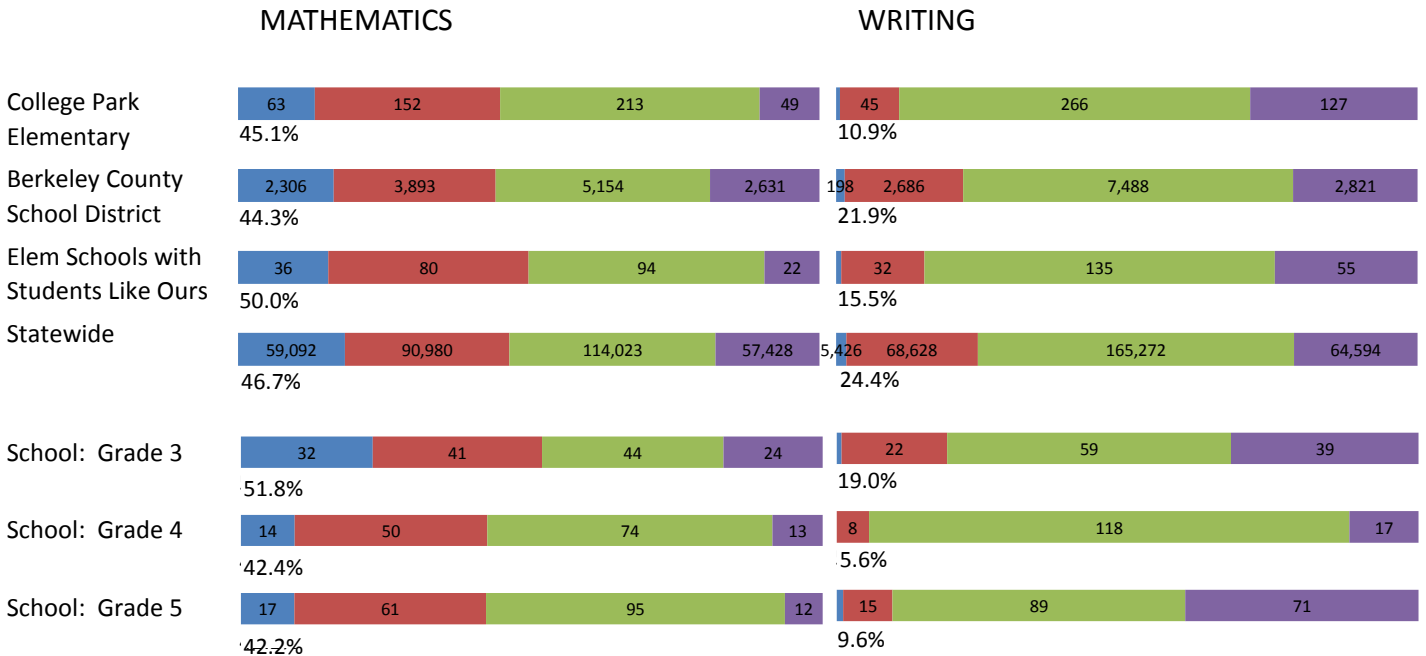
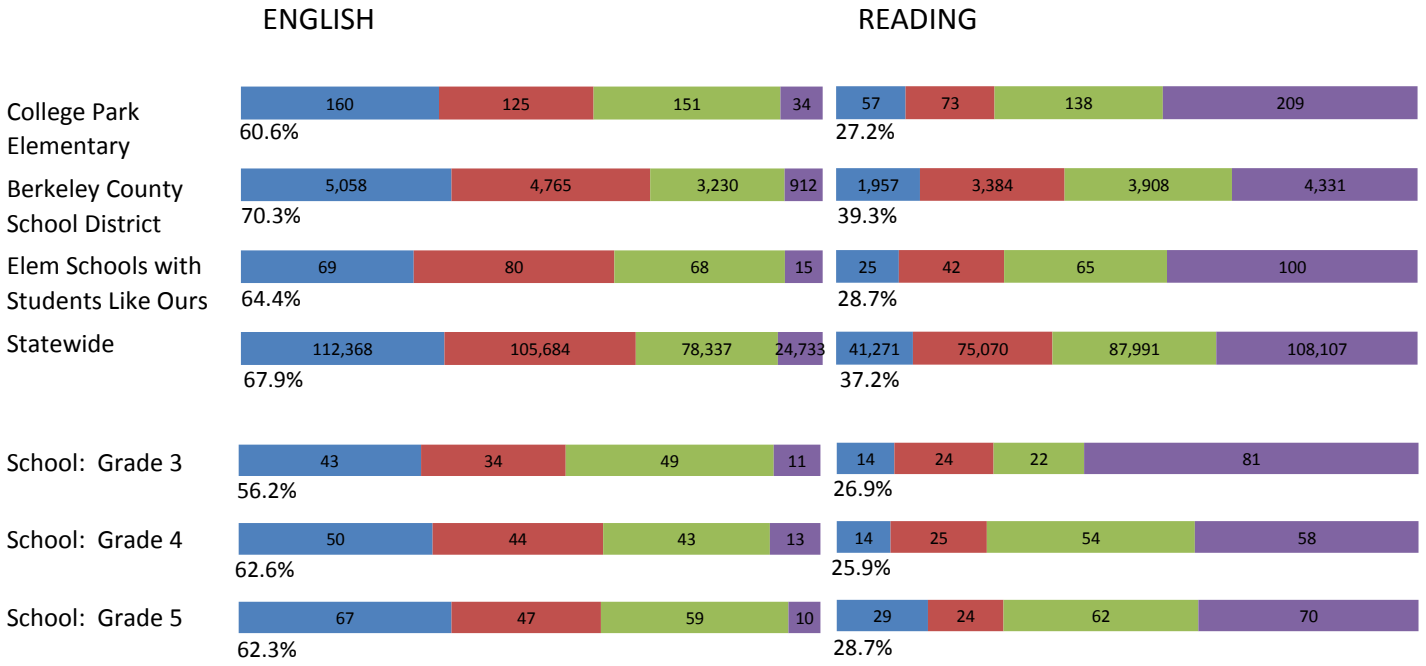
Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by ...

The 2014-2015 school year was full of positive changes and successes. At CPE we continue to strive for commitment and pride in education through data driven instruction and on-going staff development for our staff. CPE has completed PBIS Year 7 and evaluation results of our program included a decrease in discipline referrals and 100% school wide implementation. Our school focus for the year included a school wide math fluency program and math problem solving strategies, pilot programs in ALEKS math and Reflex Math, targeted interventions for students including two reading and math interventionists, common assessments, and the implementation of the BCSD Curriculum Units that focused on the Common Core Standards. Teachers collaborated weekly in Professional Learning Communities to review student data and plan for instruction. All staff members participated in on-going district training on the curriculum units, Mastery Connect, and the SIOP model to support out ESL program within the classroom. During PLC time teachers collaborated to unpack the standards, create common assessments, and share instructional strategies. Teachers throughout the school worked with the full-time Math Coach and ELA Coach to ensure that all students were engaged in learning. Title I funds supported school supplies for students, technology for classrooms, a Math Coach, and a variety of family nights. In addition, Title I funds and district funds were used to implement a 1:1 iPad initiative in 14 classrooms, including a full-time Technology Coach. Our School Improvement Council worked in conjunction with our Title I program to create and evaluate programs that improve student learning and strengthen home and school partnerships. CPE partnered with Adult Education to provide continued support of the CPE Family Literacy Center. This program focused on our ESL population and provided adult English classes to our Non-English speaking parents. In conjunction, CPE offered a summer ESL program for our students that focused on pre-teaching of the upcoming units for the school year. Several classes in K-2 participated and placed in the Kids Who Care initiative. Throughout the year, all students participated in a Character Education program that focused on specific character traits. In addition, we partnered with our feeder high school to create a mentor program with student athletes. At College Park Elementary, we believe that all students can learn. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



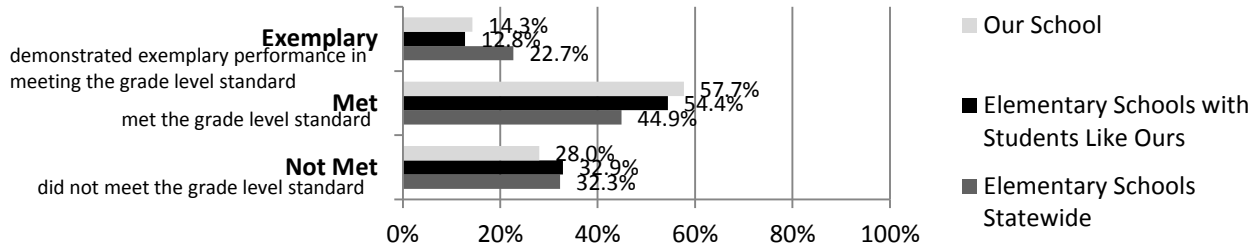

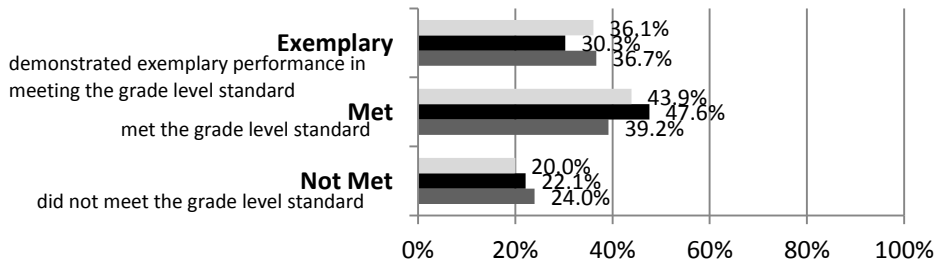
