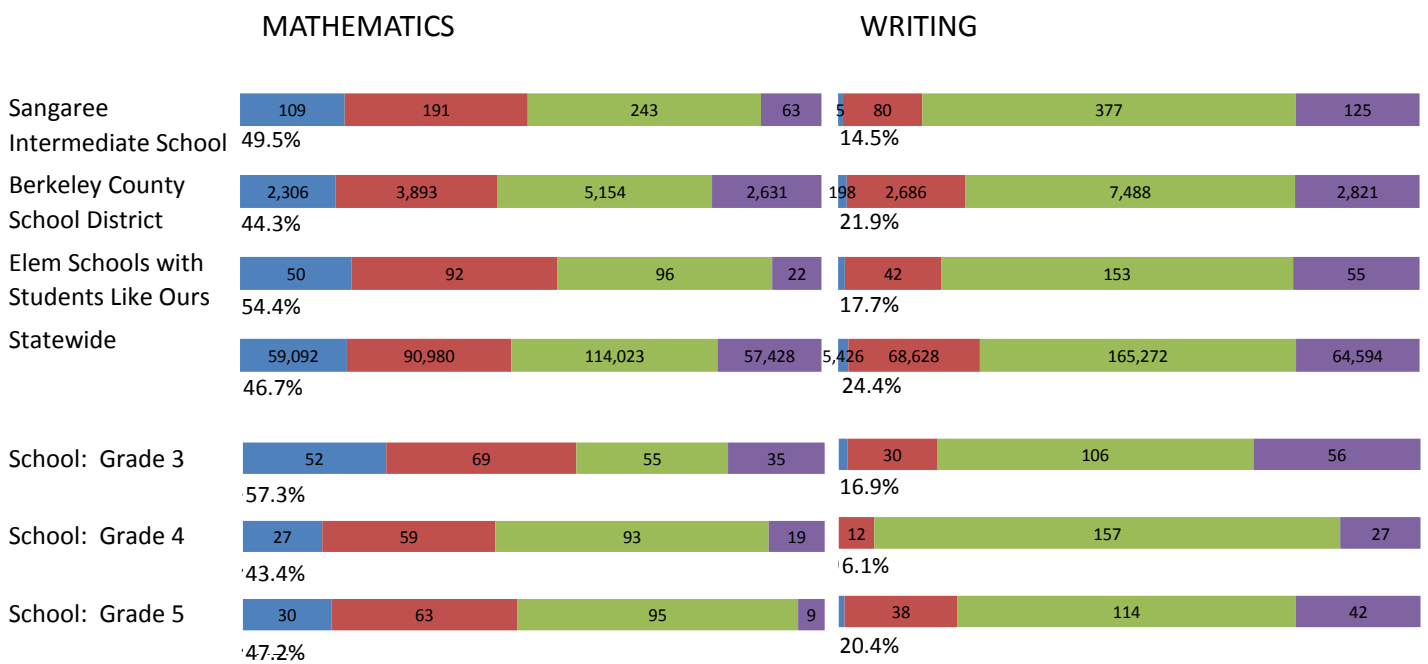
WORLD CLASS SKILLS & LIFE AND CAREER CHARACTERISTICS

Sangaree Intermediate School is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by providing innovative programs based on current research to provide a well-rounded education for our students. We are proud of our strong history of academic success. Teachers continue to learn new and effective strategies to help their students learn to their potential. Over sixty students scored "Exemplary" on the PASS Test in all four subjects and were awarded "PASS PRO" T-shirts. Over four hundred digital learning devices were also implemented in our classrooms this year. Our students and staff were awarded \$1,000 as a MUSC's Boeing Center for Children's Wellness Winner. Many healthy practices were put into place for students and staff such as Family Fitness Night as well as the addition of a water fountain where students could fill up their water bottles each day. Water stations were also added to each teach workroom. Our students enjoyed going to the Action Based Learning Lab each week to exercise, reinforce learning and hear helpful tips about nutrition. The 3 R Character Education Program highlighted students being respectful, responsible and ready to learn. Students earned tags and t-shirts each month to proudly wear around school. The Chick-Fil-A Core Essentials program was taught through our guidance department with a character word highlighted each month. Random Acts of Kindness Week was also a big success. We continued to provide a strong emphasis in the arts as a result of the funding through the Distinguished Arts Program Grant. These additional funds provided us week long residencies with artists such as Storyteller Tim Lowry, Atlantic Coast Theatre, and Dance Artist Andrew Worthem. The DAP Grant also provided our fourth grade students an opportunity to go on an architectural stroll of downtown Charleston. Other highlights this year included: Honor Roll Luncheons, Come Read with Me, Career Day, Chorus Concerts, Clubs, Performing Arts Plays, Family Movie Night, library visits by Lucy the Library Dog, Lunch Buddies, and The Principal's Multiplication Bee. We were proud to participate in Relay for Life. Students donated over \$500 to the American Cancer Society. Our students also participated in Boosterthon and raised over \$7,000 to add an additional play area behind our school. We fostered student leadership through Student Council, Patriot Pals and National Elementary Honor Society. The new W.A.T.C.H Dogs (Dads of Great Students) Program provided over 40 male role models in our school this year. We were elated to have these fathers in our building to partner with students and staff at SRI. Journey Church also provided monthly mentors for our students in the Breakfast and Lunch Buddies Programs. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



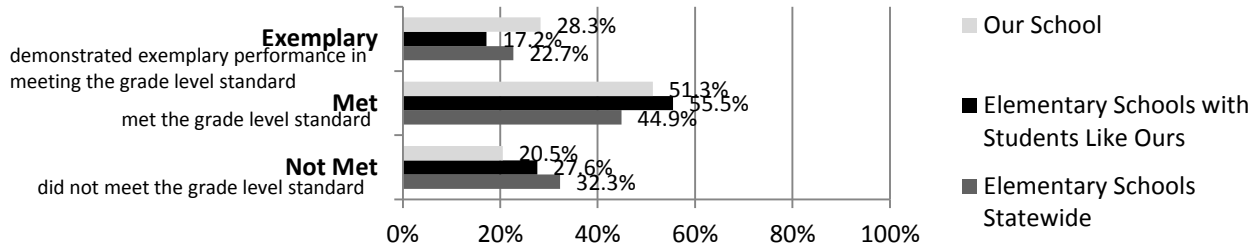

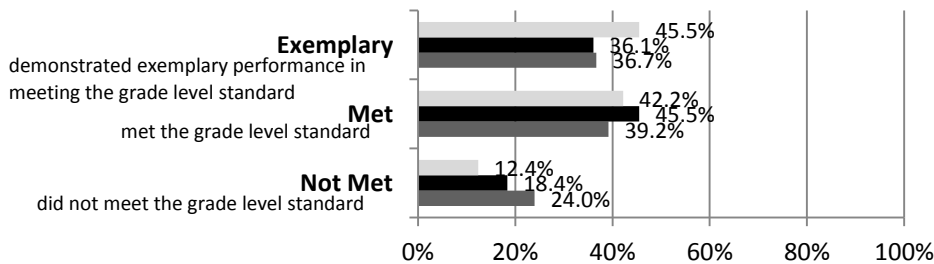
