Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by ...

Devon Forest Elementary, located in Goose Creek, serves a diverse population of over 900 students in Child Development through fifth grade. We focused our improvement efforts on raising AIMSweb scores in all areas. We have used our PASS and AIMSweb data as part of our efforts in grades K-5 to drive our instruction. Since 2010, we have been awarded Palmetto Gold for our student performance growth, Palmetto Silver for student performance growth, Palmetto Silver for closing the achievement gap, Red Carpet Award which acknowledges our family-friendly environment and exemplary customer service, the PBIS Exemplar Award and the MUSC Wellness Award. IXL Math computer instruction was used this year to focus on students identified by teachers and administration. The students having academic difficulties, especially in math were entered into the program first. Our district provided a math interventionist to work with students in grades 2 and 3.

Devon Forest entered the tenth year of our positive approach to school discipline as part of the Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS) program. We established clear expectations for every part of our school with the expectations being taught and reinforced throughout the school year. With PBIS came our Data Team. This was a team of DFE educators, hand selected for their specialization in different areas of our school, meeting weekly with teachers to find ways to help students academically and behaviorally. Our parent volunteer program was expanded by our PTO helping with Red Ribbon Week, PBIS student reward program supplies, school supplies, field trips, paper, printer ink, and much more.

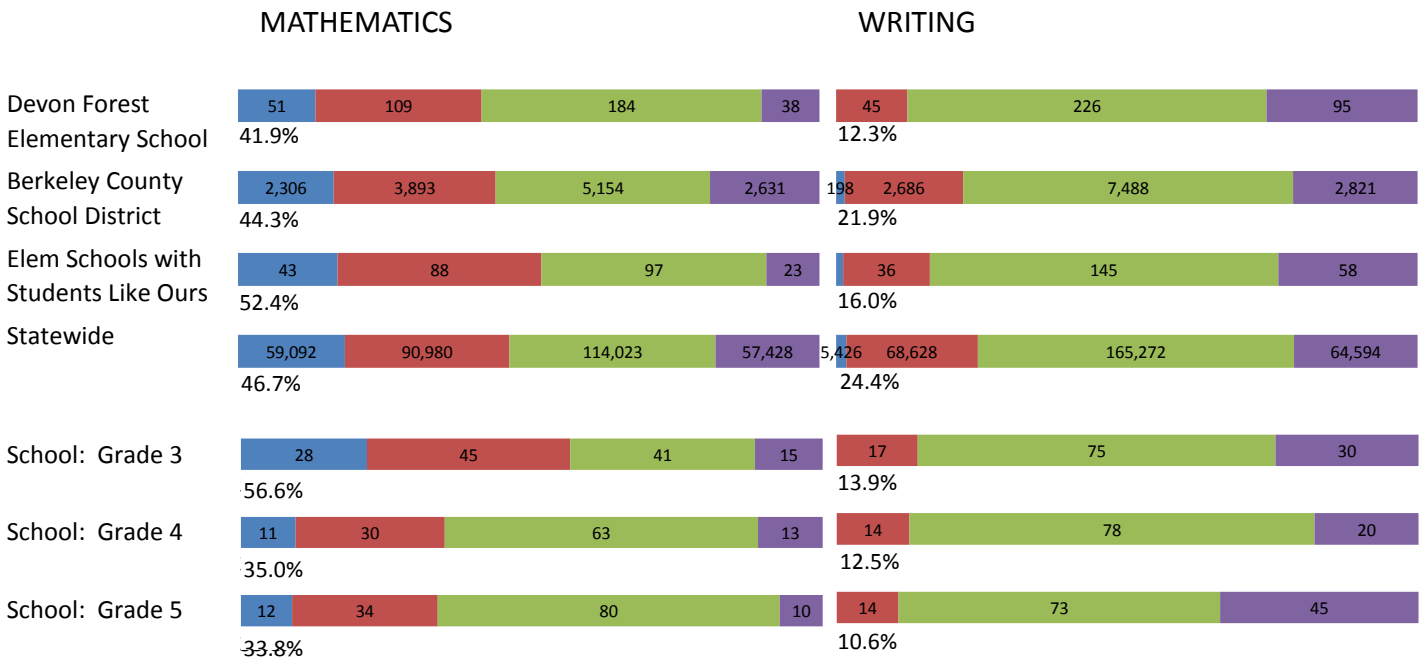
Home/school communication was continued with the use of the school agendas in grades 1-5, monthly calendar of events, Remind101, and a district wide calling system. Parenting events hosted by Title I were successful this year. Events included Kindergarten Make and Take, Marvelous Math, PASS and Pizza, Falling into Books, Looking into the Future, and Rockin Readers. Students participated in the Berkeley County Spelling Bee (Grades 3-5), Berkeley County Multiplication Bee (Grades 3-5), Kids Who Care, Chorus, Kindergarten Crew, STEP Art and our DFE Arts Month. Parents, community liaisons, and teachers involved throughout this year on our Title I Advisory Board and School Improvement Council.

The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



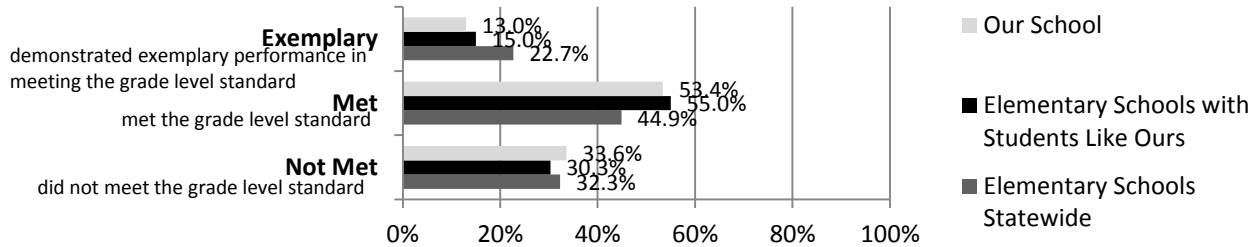

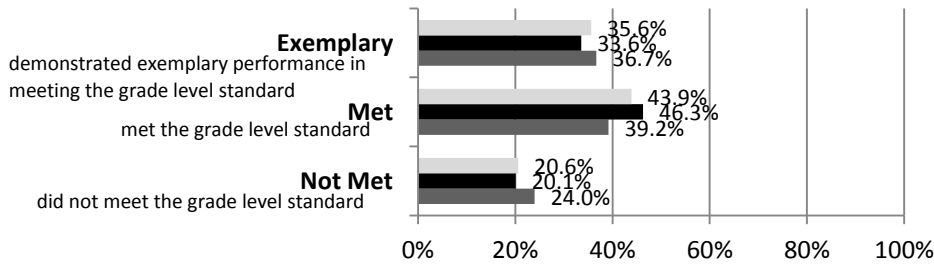
