Whitesides Elementary School is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by preparing them to become independent, responsible citizens in our community. Students are engaged in a challenging curriculum governed by rigorous standards. Lucy Calkins' writing program provides a literacy framework. The Olweus Bully Prevention program is embedded in weekly lessons to further develop leadership and interpersonal skills. A learning lab and reverse mainstreaming afford even more learning options. Innovations developed through problem solving and writing bring opportunities for student productions created with iPads. Whitesides embraces STEM initiatives that engage students in process elements of science, technology, engineering and math to provide trial and error learning, learn how to collaborate, communicate and revise for successful outcomes. This further provides life and career opportunities to accentuate work ethics and develop communication skills in learning self regulation and managing how to learn. Career day allows for student engagement and Spanish lessons provide additional cultural insight.

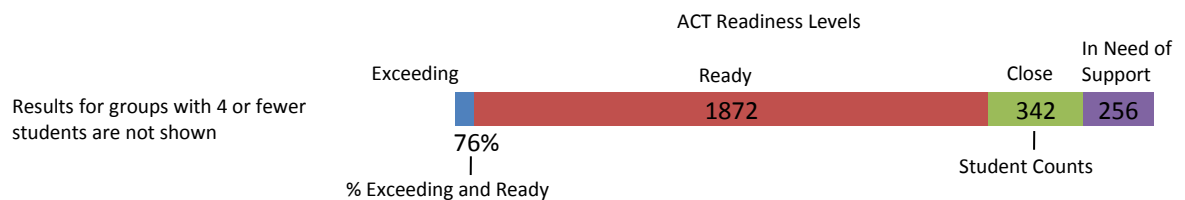
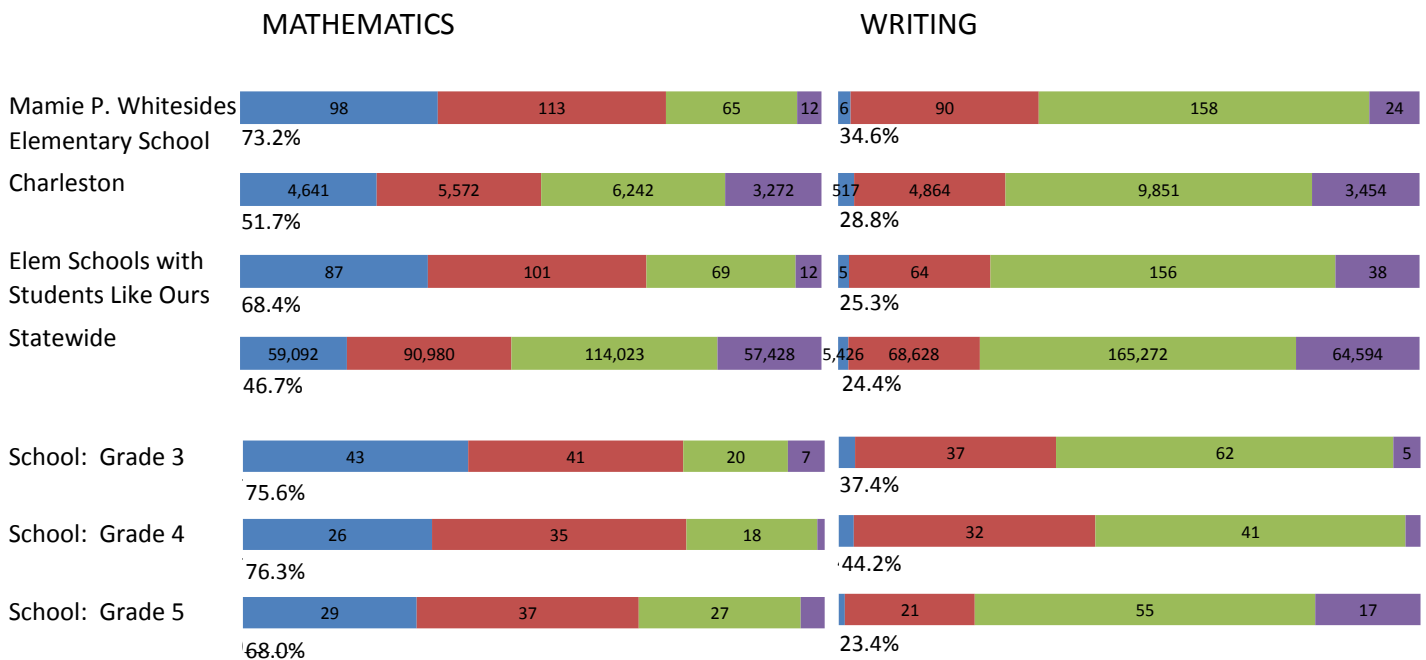
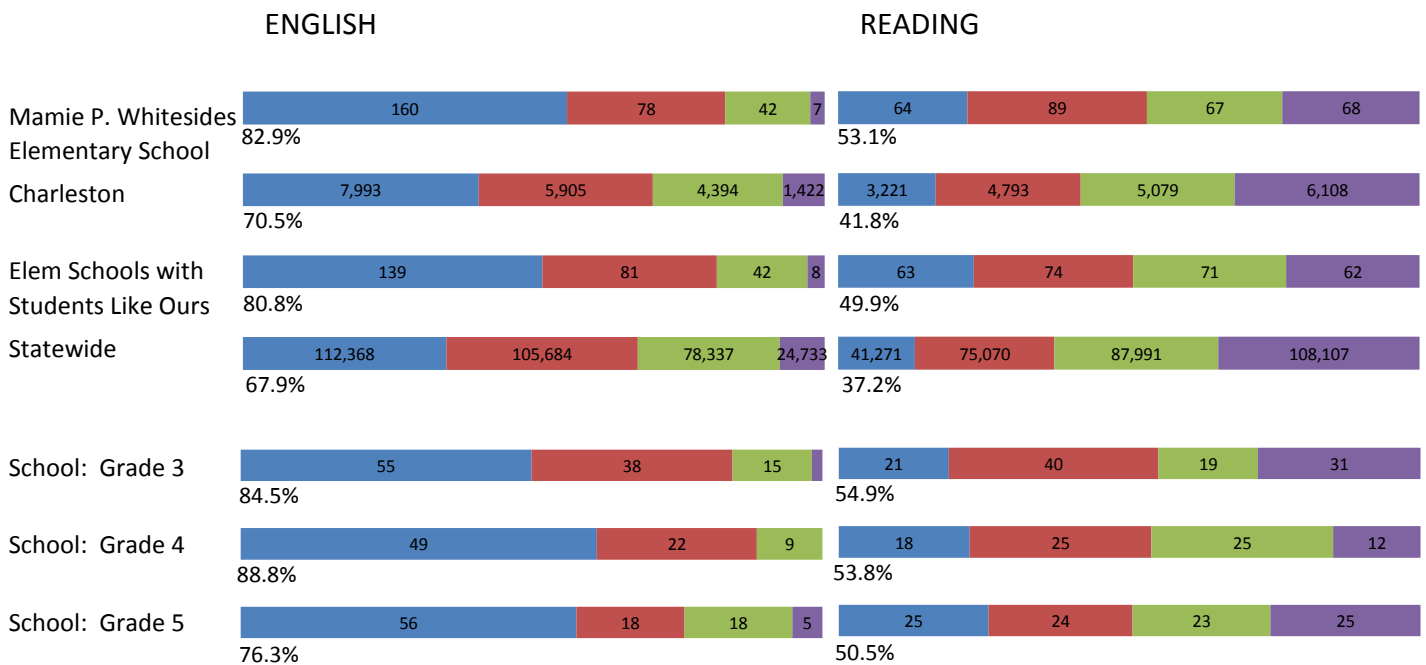
SAIL and student council endeavors enable students to problem solve and collaborate to carry out community projects. Chorus productions integrate history with music, and strings classes provide additional arts experiences. The variety show and school newspaper accentuate and showcase student talent. A partnership with Engaging Creative Minds brings opportunities from the outside world to our classrooms for innovation and creative expression. Parents are involved in all aspects of student learning. Local churches align volunteers to mentor and read with students through the IBEAM program.

We practice recycling and environmental stewardship. Student efforts raised \$5,280 for Relay for Life in the fight against cancer. Donors Choose grants have brought iPads to classrooms, robotics offerings for the summer, and observation opportunities to watch blue birds hatch via a remote camera. Grants, the PTA, local businesses and community support have enriched classroom interventions and support swimming lessons for kindergarten, Spanish instruction, and grade-level field trips where students are able to experience and apply concepts as students prepare to become world class citizens.

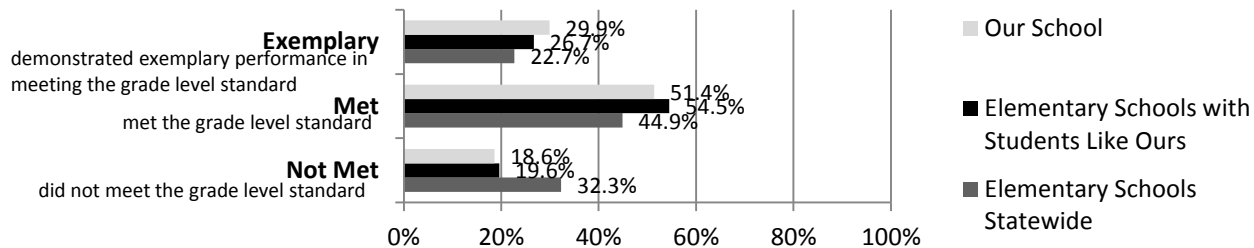
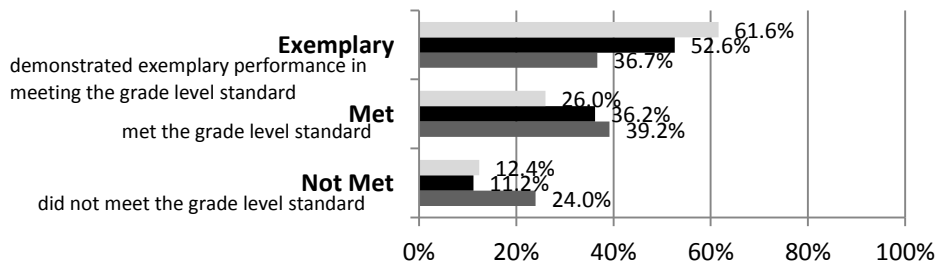
