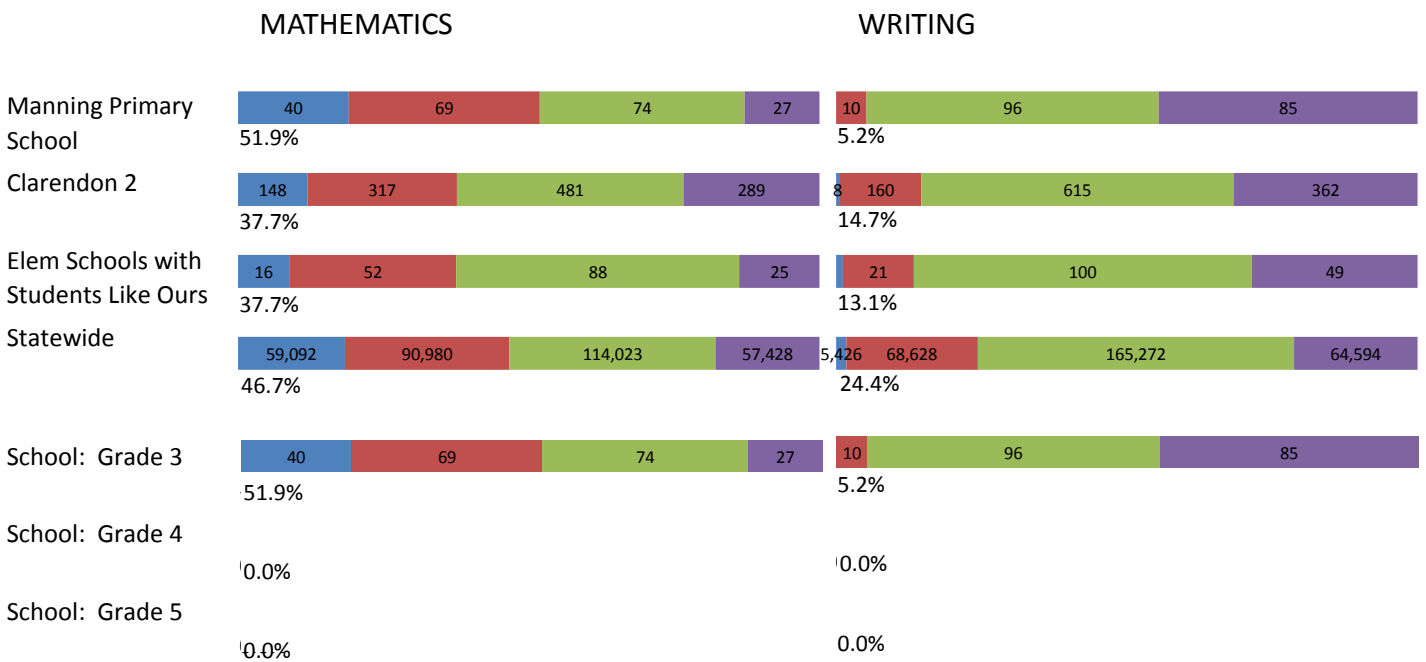
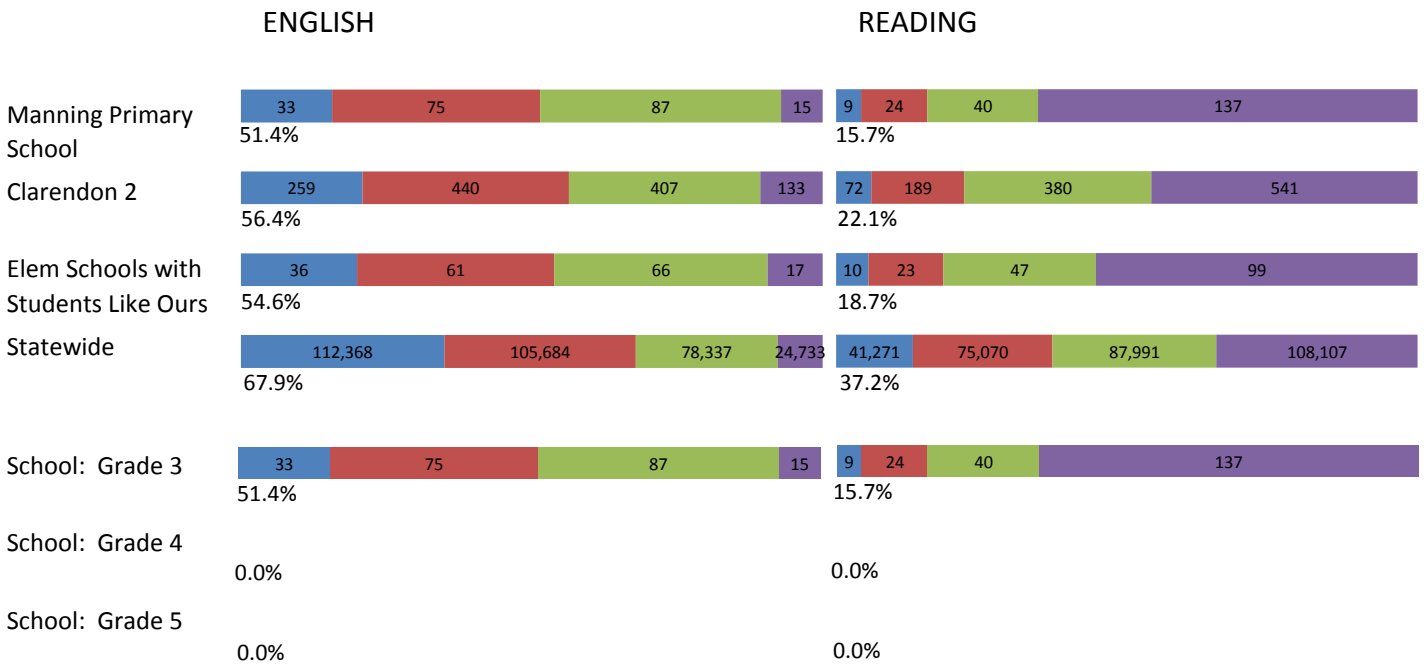

Manning Primary School is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by providing a nurturing environment where all students can be successful. Our school's mission is "educating children." During the 2014-2015 school year Manning Primary School was FOCUSED on Following Our Commitments and Utilizing effective Strategies to build positive relationships and increase student achievement. Our implementation of enterprise learning with the iPad Mini placed students on the path to college and career readiness. Our 485 second and third grade students were afforded many opportunities to grow academically and socially. Our Reaching Every Child Program, funded through a 21st Century Grant provided academic and cultural experiences for our students. A computer-assisted instructional program, Classworks, provided students with ongoing, personalized academic support. The Measures of Academic Progress online assessment was administered twice this year. Achievement data was used to ensure quality and meaningful instruction. Math and Reading Interventionists fostered critical thinking and problem solving skills to meet the diverse needs of targeted students. Reading, math, science and social studies common assessments were used to align instruction with curriculum standards. An online tool, Mastery Connect, expedited the process of tracking student learning. Manning Primary School strives to meet the needs of the whole child. The implementation of TEAM (Teaching Encouraging Advising Mentoring) lessons engaged students in the processes of collaboration, teamwork, and interpersonal skills. FOCUS handouts were used to promote individual and classroom self-discipline and personal integrity. Character education was addressed daily through the morning announcements, outside marquee, posters and banners. Clarendon Behavioral Health Services and the Department of Mental Health offered counseling for our students. Our students have access to Smiles Dental Clinic and the Clarendon Christian Learning Center. The local Rotary Club and Clarendon Delta Kappa Gamma Educational Sorority donated dictionaries to every third grade student. Business partners, Bojangles' and Arvin Meritor, provided monetary contributions and incentives for family-oriented and school-wide initiatives. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



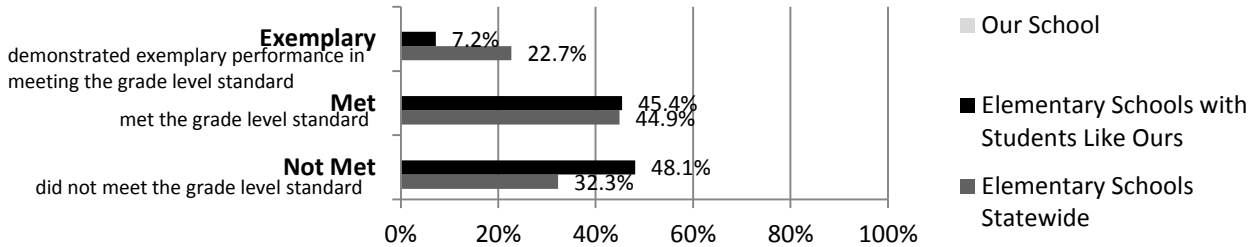

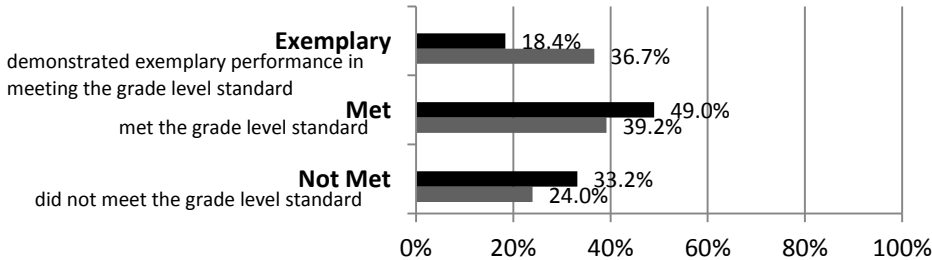
