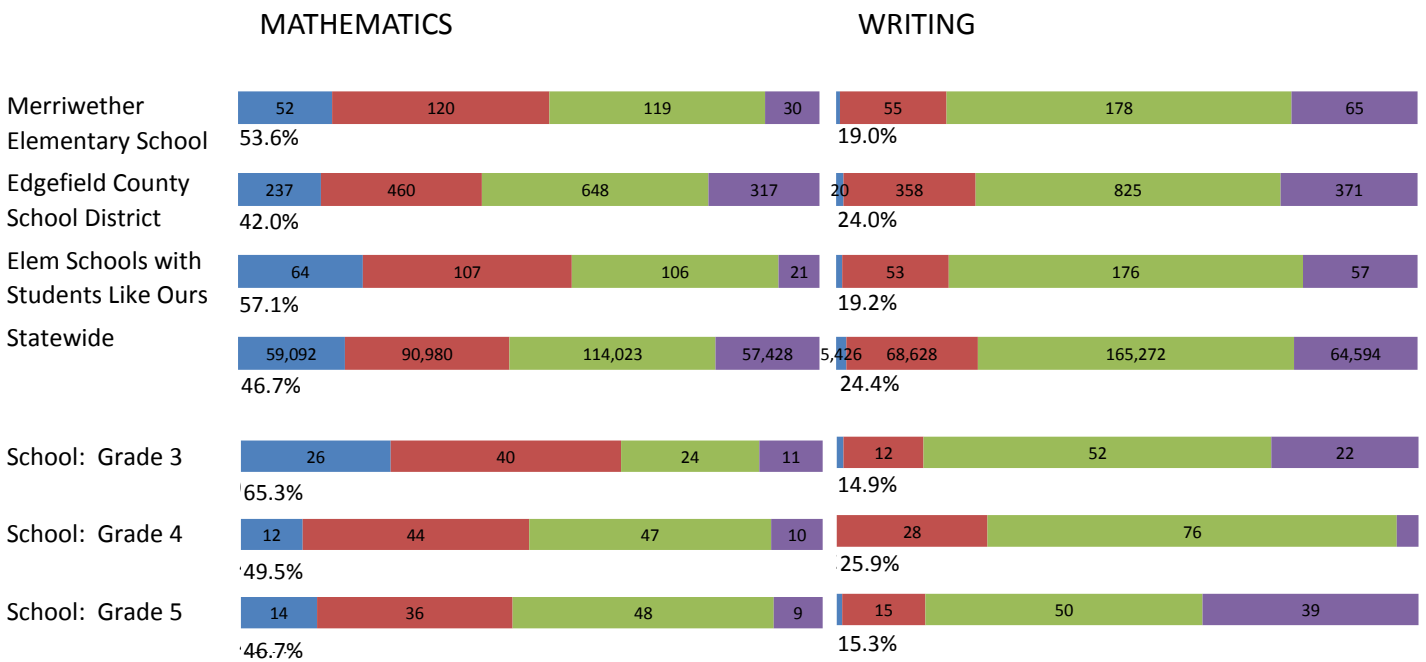

Merriwether Elementary School is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by creating a safe learning environment in which students are able to communicate, demonstrate, and master these skills. The goal of teachers, staff, and parents is to prepare students to be leaders for tomorrow by implementing a rigorous curriculum that meets the needs of all learners. TAP, a new initiative, has allowed teachers to participate in professional development during clusters. While in professional development, teachers and administrators collaborate to develop integrative units, analyze school and grade level data, reflect on lessons, and share instructional strategies that are effective in the classroom. The Leadership Team is also a new addition to the school's community. This is a group of eight teachers who serve as ambassadors for the school. They work together with faculty to improve teacher effectiveness and increase student achievement. Our RTI program maintains commitment to closing the achievement gap. Based on the analysis of PASS, MAP, and AimsWeb scores, identified students receive instruction that targets essential skills needed to overcome instructional gaps. Our school continues to make advances in the area of technology. Our school is 100% Wi-Fi accessible. This allows our students to use Google Chromebooks, etc. to research and play interactive learning programs from anywhere in the building. Several of our teachers have received grants to purchase technology equipment for their classrooms. ☑ We believe having a positive relationship with the community is essential to building leaders and encouraging community awareness. Throughout the year, the faculty and students participate in several service learning projects that help support a variety of organizations. This year, we raised money for Relay for Life and Jump Rope for Heart. Students celebrated the 100th day by collecting 803 non-perishable items for Sweetwater Baptist Church's Food Pantry. Merriwether Elementary continues to strive for excellence. Through high expectations, differentiated instruction, collaboration, and increased accountability, the teachers and faculty members create environments that facilitate the learning process for all students regardless of their diverse backgrounds. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



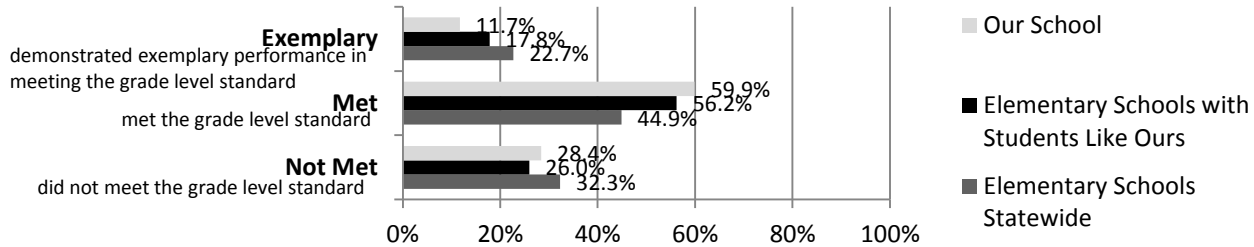

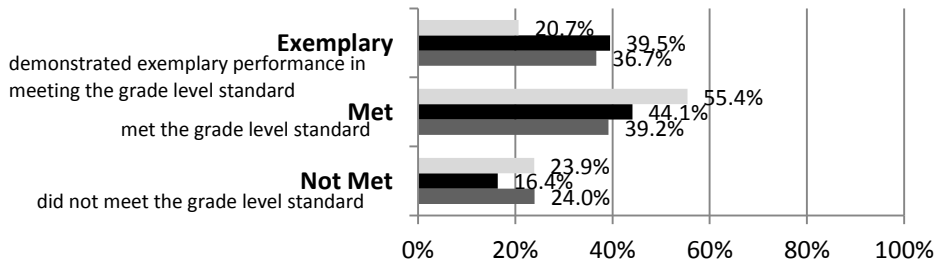
