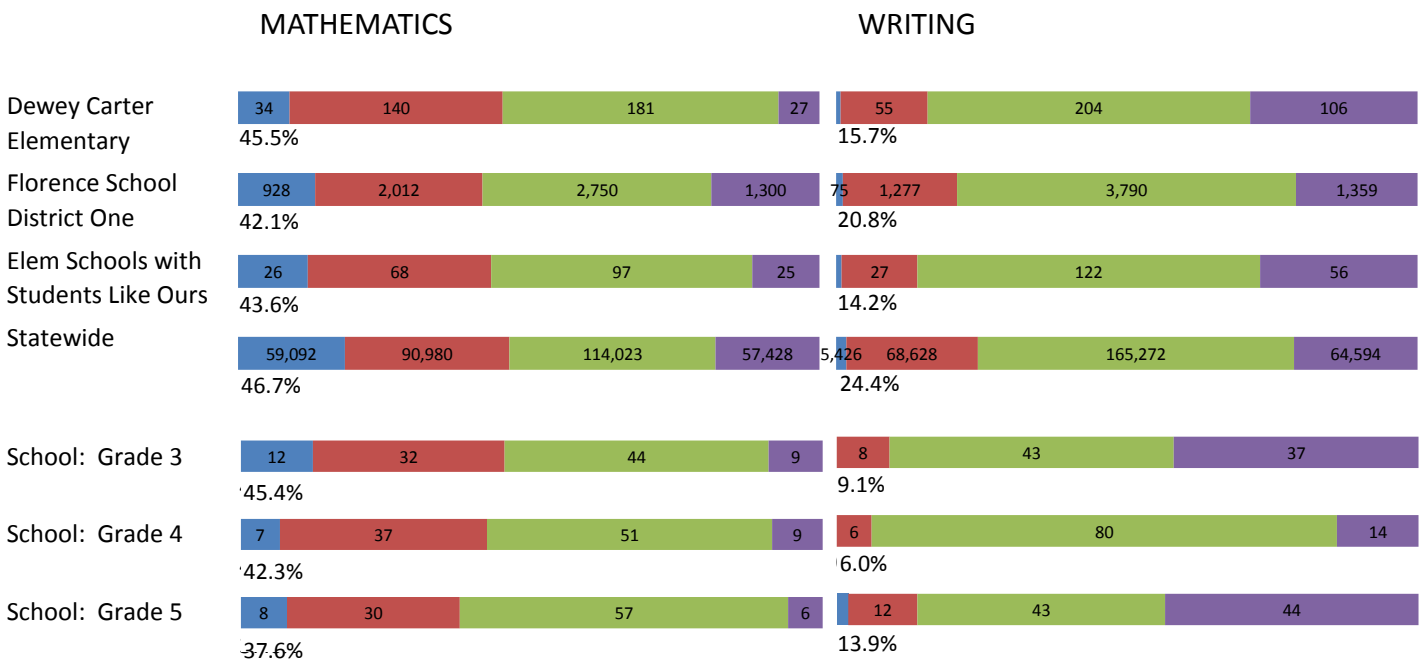
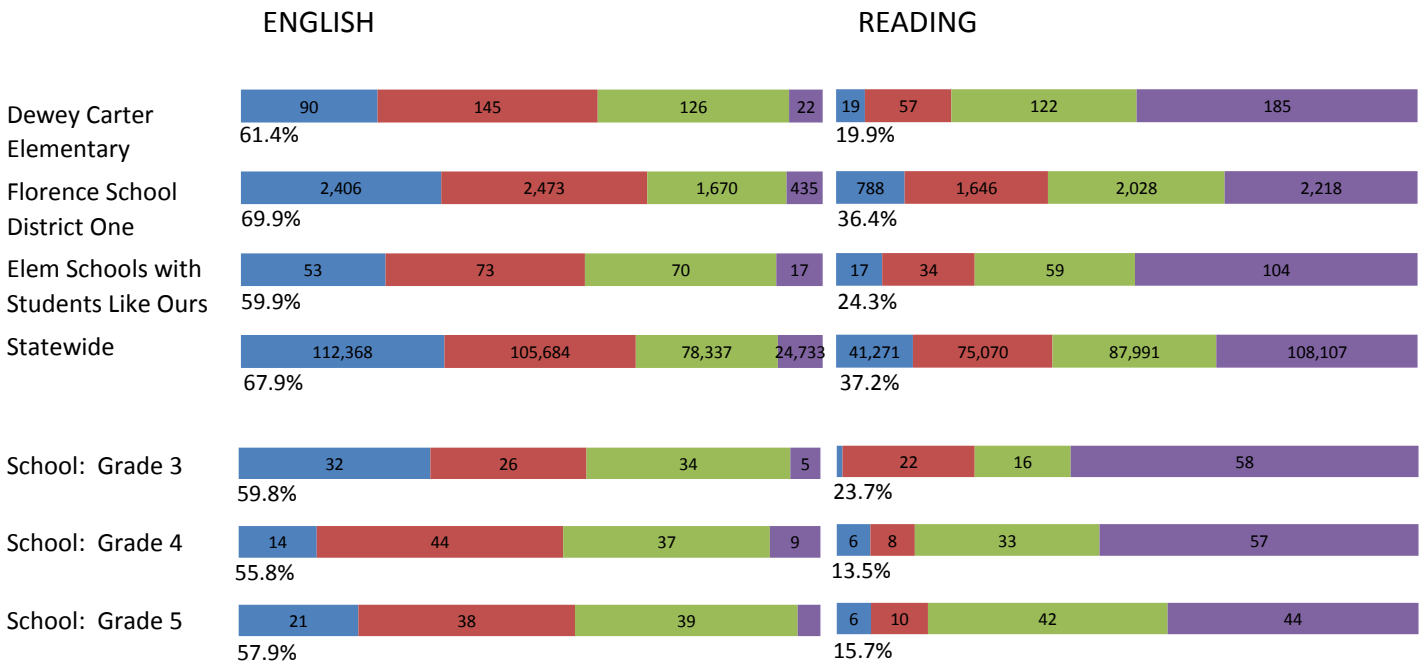

Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by putting our children's needs first. We continually look to new ways of addressing the mastery of standards while maintaining a balance with traditional, proven methods of instruction. We press on towards mastery of writing skills by continuing to utilize our writing lab, coach and software to bring writing to life on a practical level for our students kindergarten to sixth grade. With reading always a priority for all students, we will continue to refine the Accelerated Reader 85% Club, Battle of the Books competition and other reading initiatives designed to keep reading fun and relevant. We have secured funds for a certified technology teacher. In addition to basic and advanced technology skills, students will be able to take advantage of learning computer code in preparation for an ever expanding career and world of technology. Our technology teacher will also stay current with research and assist our staff with implementation of best practices in technology in the classroom. Our Everyday Math continues as our students grow in their knowledge of, not only knowing the steps to find "the right answer", but also being able to "think math" – comprehending and being able to find multiple solutions that all work and contribute to a solution in any given real world scenario. Students will be supported in the basics with newly purchased Math Sharks and Flash Masters – electronic devices aiding in math fact memorization. In developing the total child, we emphasize personal character daily and recognize achievements in academics, attendance and positive behavior. We offer a number of extracurricular clubs and activities including an environmental CARE club, Art Club, Treble Maker chorus, Beta Club, Good News Club, Cross Club, Play Fit, Battle of the Books team and a Survival Club – most of which focus on critical thinking skills. We partner with organizations like the National Network of Partnership Schools and local churches to strengthen community relations and participation. We recognize that our parents play a most vital role in the education of our students and encourage them to visit and/or become a part of serving our staff and students on the school Association of Parents and Teachers (APT). The staff and community of Dewey L. Carter Elementary have accomplished much thus far, and will continue to press on for the love of children. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



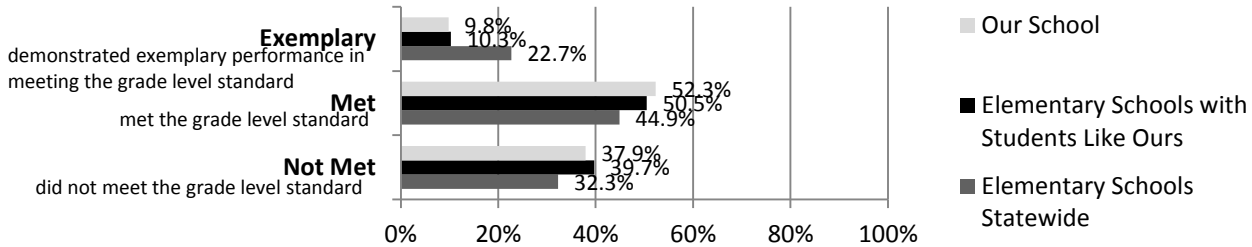

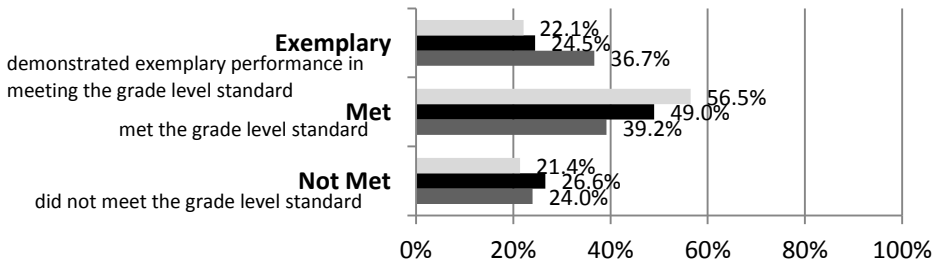
**KNOWLEDGE**
