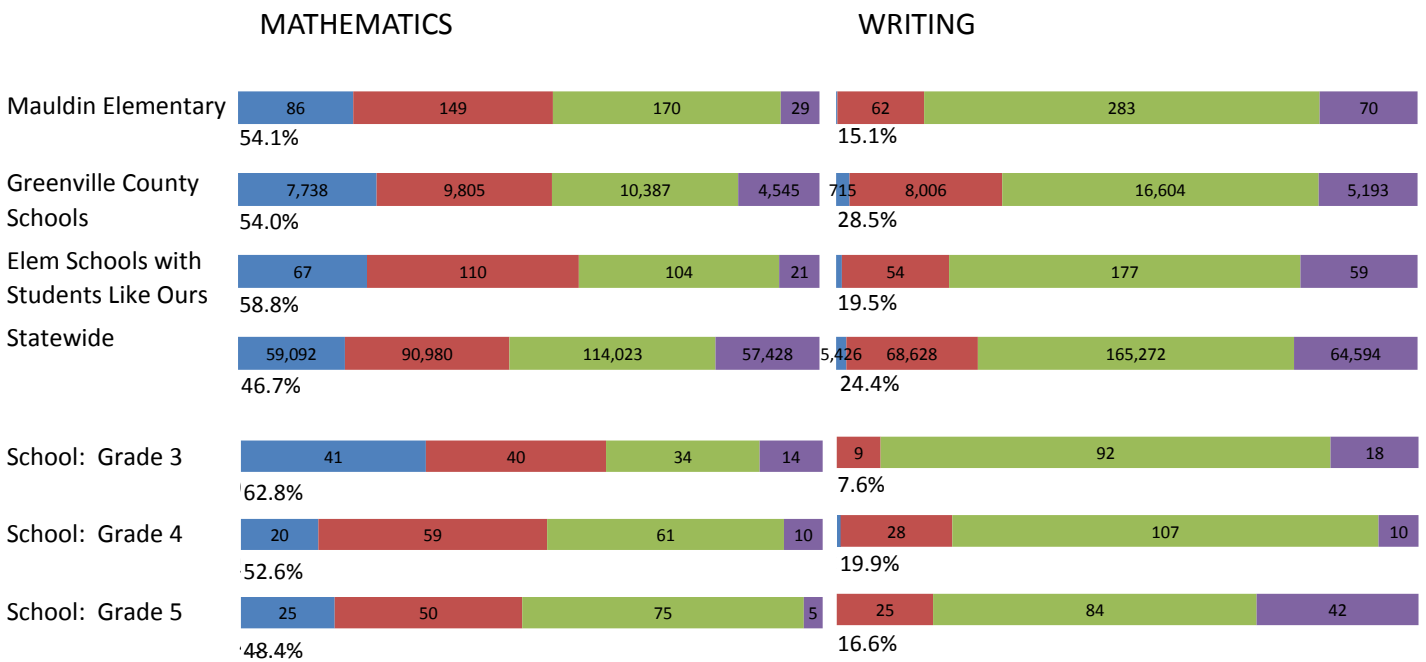

At Mauldin Elementary, we are transforming dreams into reality through the implementation of goals and plans. Our students and staff are "beginning with the end in mind." We believe that elementary school is where we build a strong foundation for our students and their future. We desire for our children to be challenged, engaged and empowered through the learning process as they begin now to prepare for college and careers. We accomplish this through the implementation of our state standards and specialized programs. Our teachers are always seeking to learn new and effective strategies to use in the classroom such as: Balanced Literacy, Lucy Calkins Units of Study for Writing, Guided Reading, Google Apps, iPads in the classroom, Effective Math strategies, Reading Recovery, and Interventionist focusing on interventions to meet student needs. We are excited to see our classrooms and instruction reflect the 21st Century. We have various programs outside the academic world to focus on the development of the whole child. School-wide we have continued using the Positive Behavior Interventions and Support (PBIS) program which rewards students for displaying positive behaviors. We celebrate these behaviors at the "High 5 Cart" as well as quarterly behavior bashes to reward our students. Our guidance counselors teach Sean Covey's 7 Habits to Happy Kids in monthly classroom guidance lessons. One of their key programs is the backpack program through which students who need them receive bags of food. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



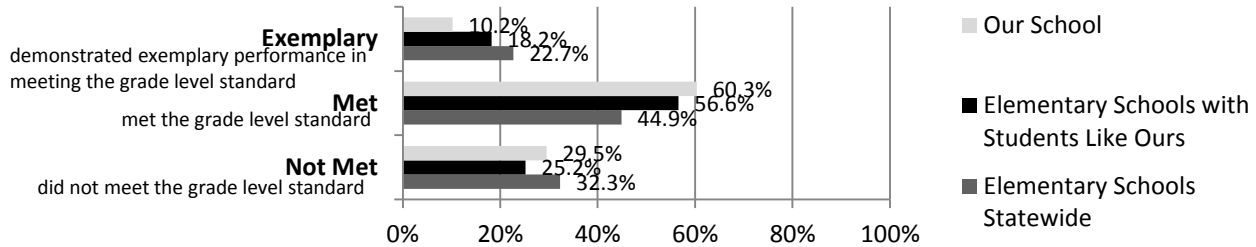

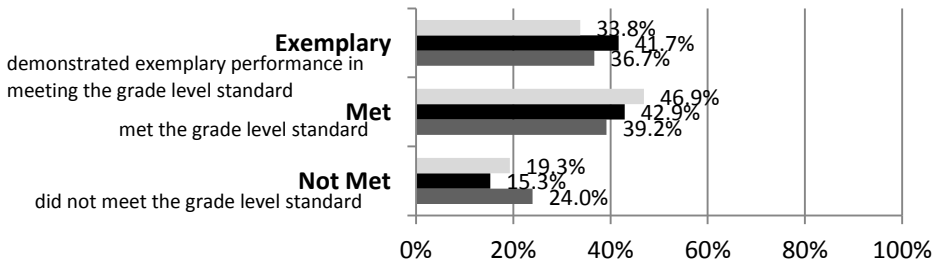
