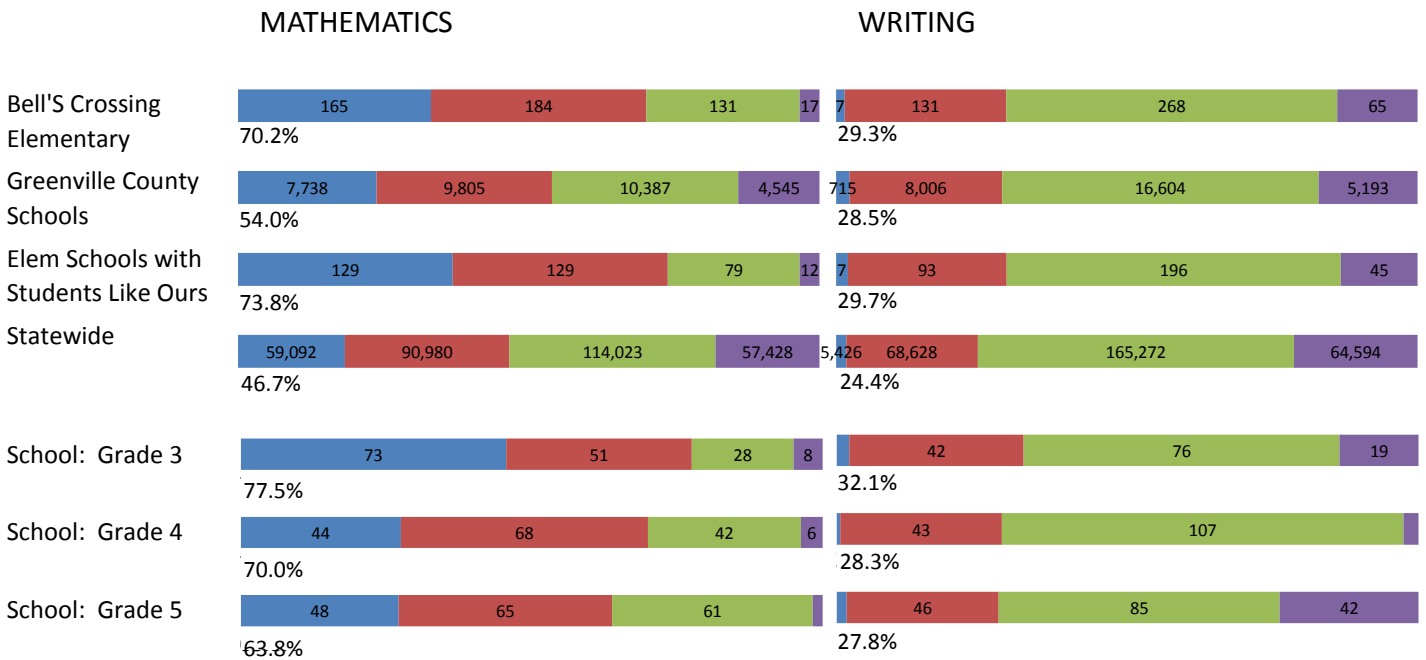

The Baldrige Model of continuous improvement has students taking ownership of their learning through setting goals, tracking their progress, and communicating their growth. The Covey Model uses character strategies found in Stephen Covey's Book, Highly Effective People. The two models complement each other to make Bell's Crossing a School of Leaders. Bell's Crossing has been recognized across the state and nation for its accomplishments. The school is a recipient of the Palmetto Gold Award which recognizes high academic achievement. Bell's Crossing has a top ten Teacher of the Year finalist for the school district. Our Guidance Program earned the National RAMP Award for being a Recognized National Guidance Model Program. We are A Safe Kids School. In the past the school has been named an Exemplary Writing School, Palmetto's Finest, Red Carpet School, and a National School of Character. Bell's Crossing continues to achieve at the highest of levels. The school's leadership model provides extensive leadership opportunities for students through Student Council, Peer Tutors, News Team and Community Service Projects. The School Improvement Council is active, monitors the school goals, and serves as an advisory board with input on school improvements. The Parent Teacher Association supports the school with strong programs and financial resources. Technology is an important aspect at Bell's Crossing Elementary Each classroom is equipped with iPads, interactive white boards, and devices that enable each student to interact with the white board. Students have access to two computer labs and eight laptop carts. The school also has a virtual field trip lab that enables students to visit places like NASA, London Archives, and the Royal Botanical Gardens of Canada to enrich and expand their studies. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



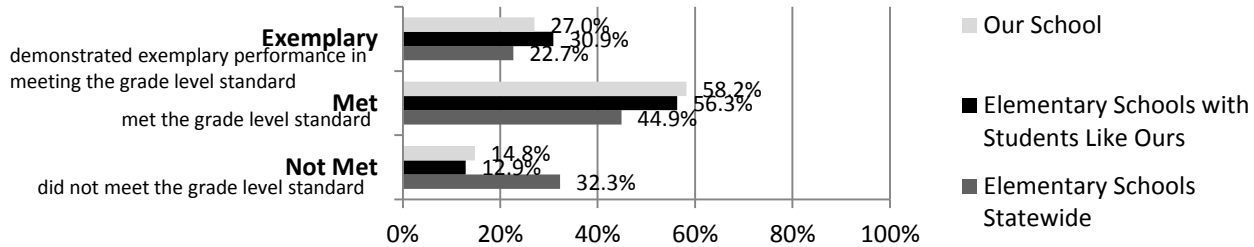

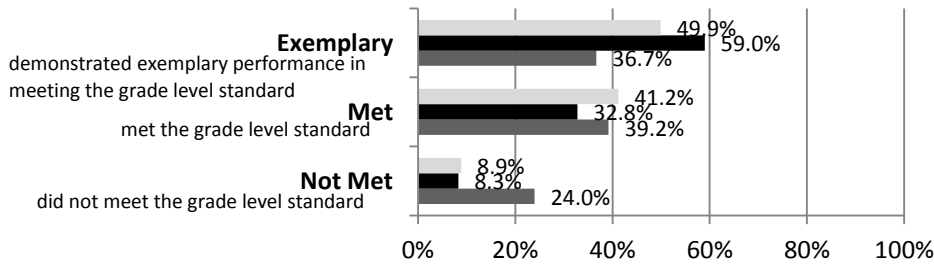
