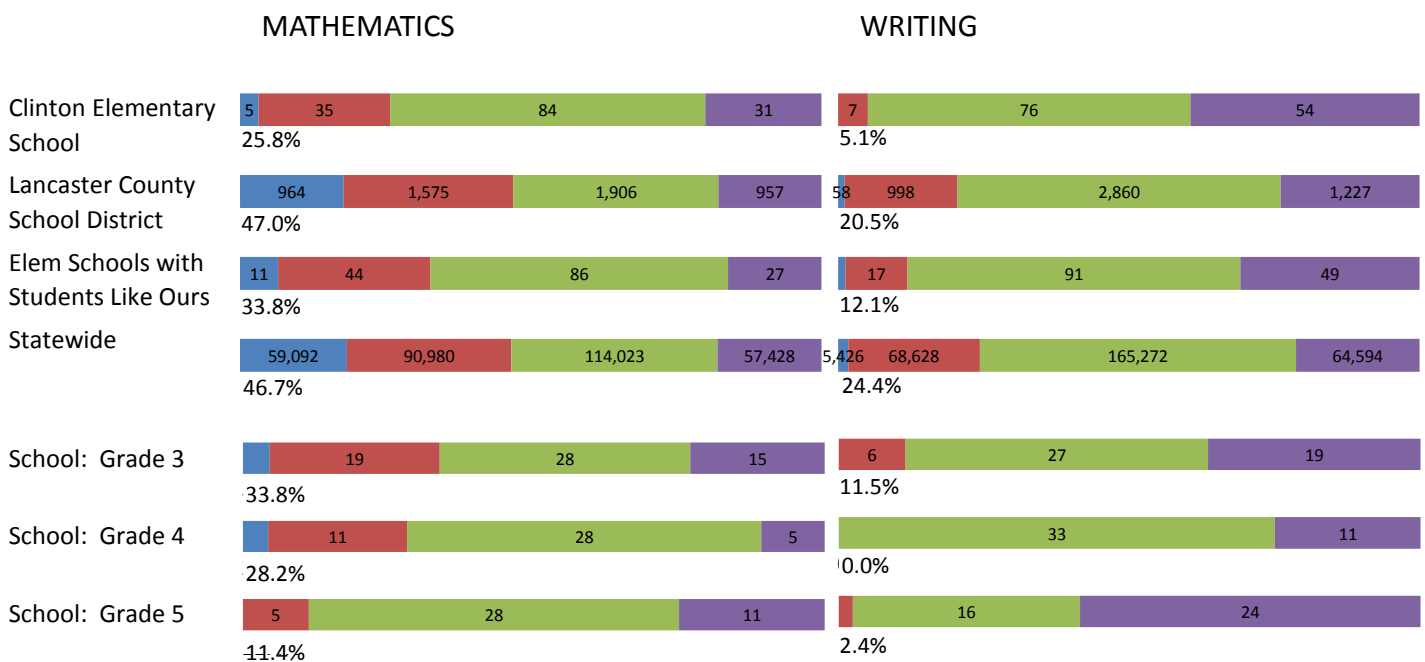
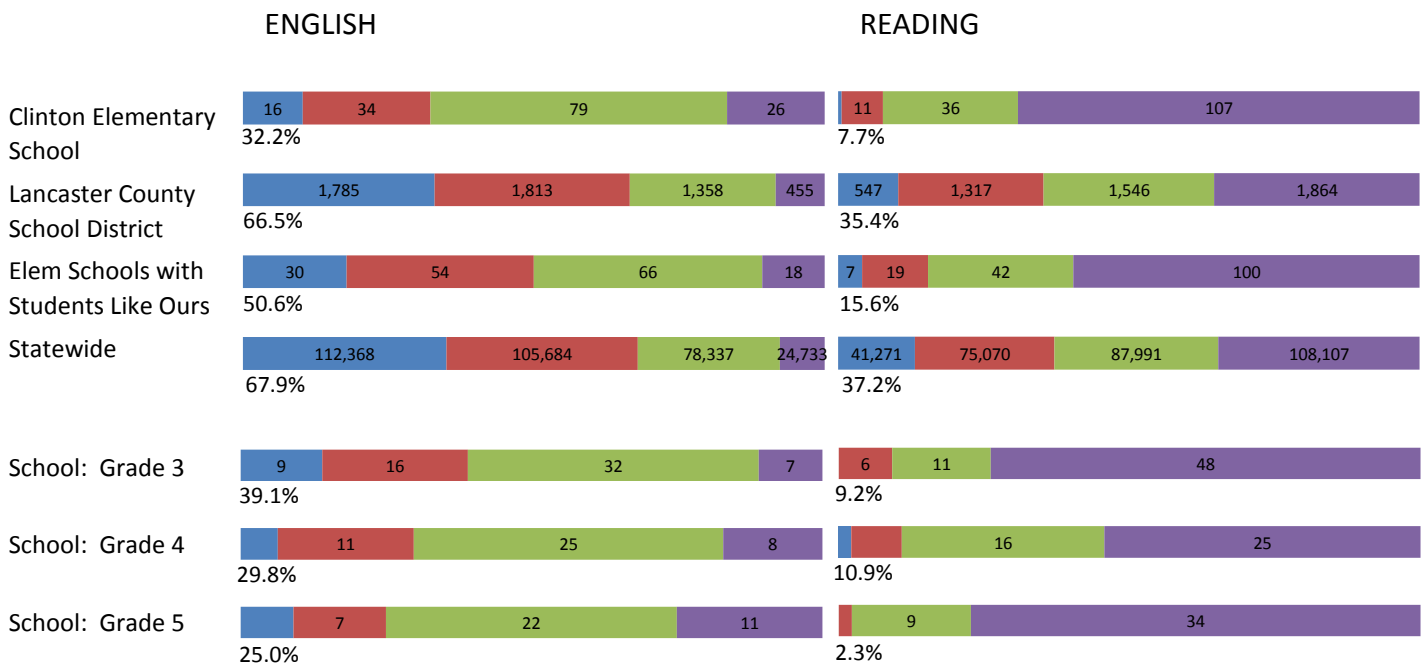

We have implemented a number of innovative practices and programs. Our students begin visiting colleges, universities, and technical schools as early as 10 years old. During the 2014-2015 school year, our fifth grade students toured Johnson C. Smith University, University of South Carolina-Lancaster, Winthrop University, and York Technical College. They completed applications, toured classrooms, dorms, and sport facilities. Campus visits give our students a firsthand view of careers and opportunities that are within their reach. The students return with a sense of purpose and hope. They are motivated. They understand what they need to accomplish in order to obtain their personal and academic goals. Our school continues to make significant strides in the area of technology. With over 170 computers, chromebooks and iPads, our students are able to incorporate many skills that will help prepare them for the 21st Century. We are teaching children to inquire, explore, and create as they will do in college and the workplace. Children are learning how to conduct research online, download and upload images, create videos, and utilized a variety of software and applications. Technology has opened windows to a wealth of knowledge and opportunities. 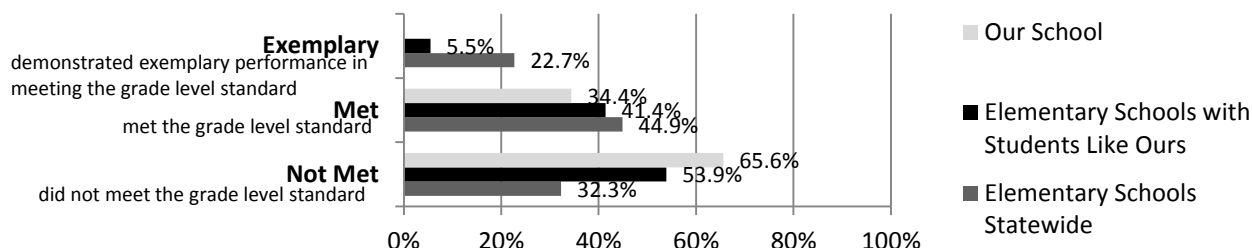
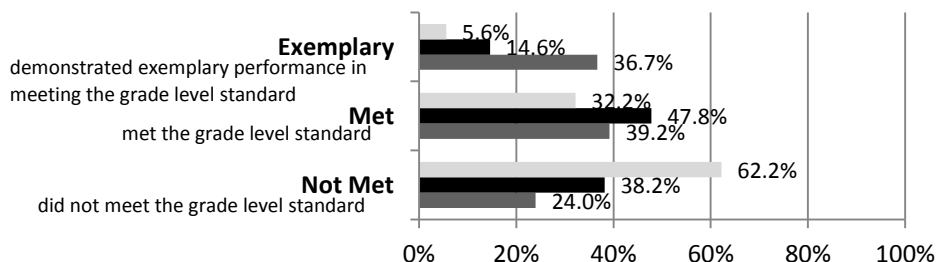
