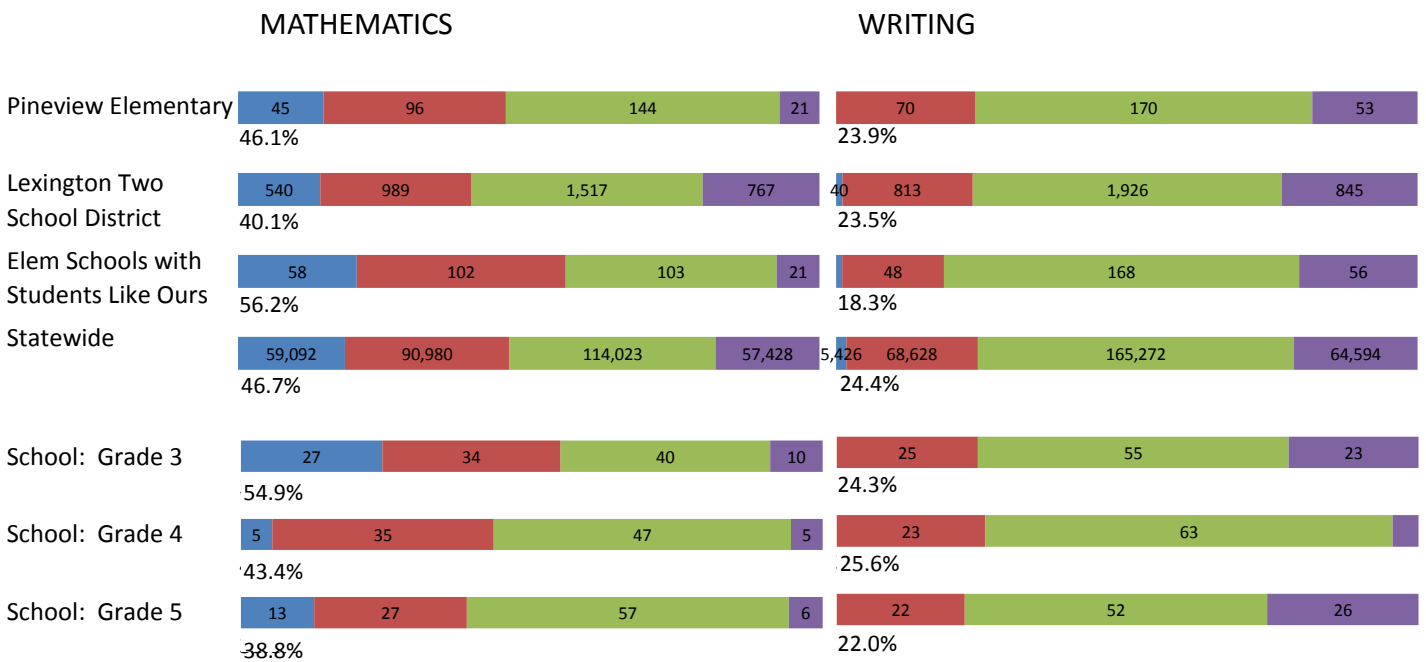
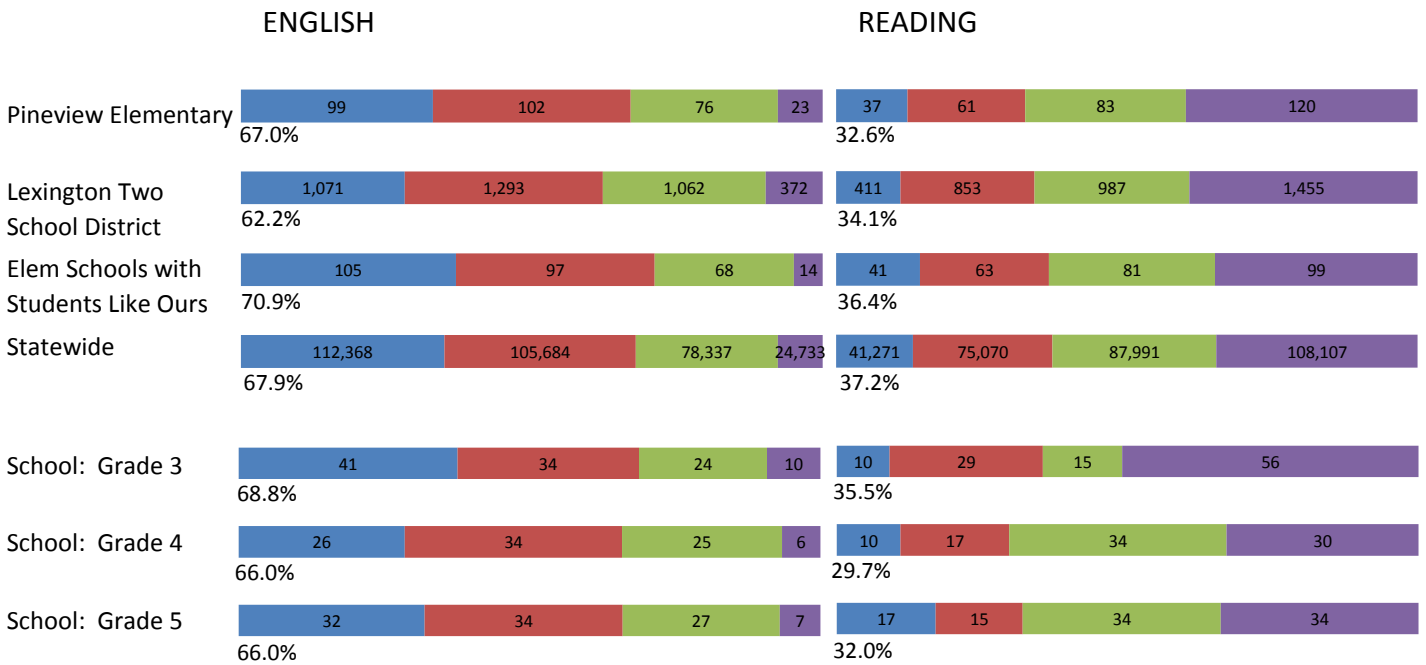

Our strong School Improvement Council (SIC), Parent Teacher Association (PTA) and business supporters are focused on the needs of our learning community and continuous improvement in student achievement. Throughout the school year our students received rigorous instruction in all content areas using research based best practices. Critical thinking, problem solving, creativity, collaboration, and perseverance were promoted and developed using problem based learning opportunities. Every student learned to explore and seek solutions to problems using their Samsung tablets. With this technology, global information was at our student's fingertips. Collaboration in partners and groups occurred frequently to develop our student's interpersonal skills and teach the importance of working together to solve problems and create solutions. At Pineview Elementary, we offer programs and service projects outside of the academic world to focus on the development of the whole child. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



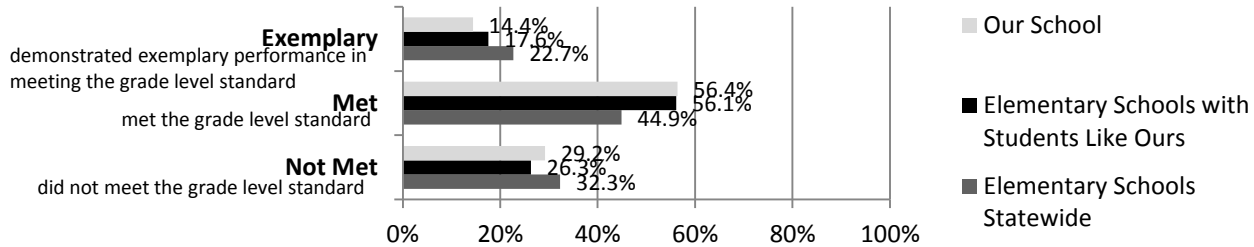

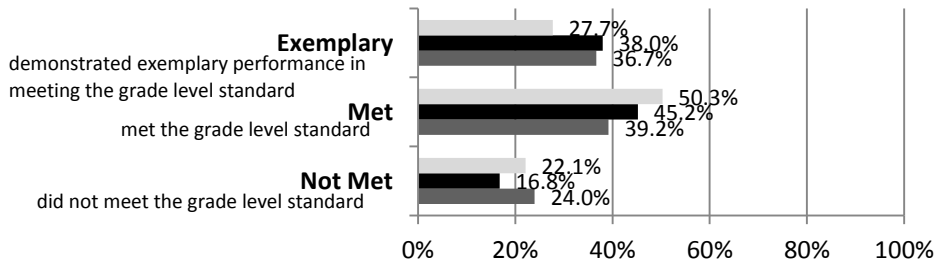
