Arden Elementary School is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by incorporating research based best practice strategies in ELA and math, mentoring and interest clubs. These strategies will assist us in meeting the needs of the "whole" child. Arden is an elementary Title One School located in the Eau Claire community of Richland School District One. The school has an enrollment of 272 students with 80% being African American, 19% Hispanic and 1% Caucasian. We are Arden Elementary School, a leader in transforming lives through education, empowering all students to achieve their potential and dreams.

As in the past, our students show academic growth that will prepare them for future success. Teaching and Student Learning continue to be the primary focus. Success is not an option at Arden elementary, it is an expectation. Arden Elementary received the Palmetto Silver Award for excellent results in Closing the Achievement Gap in 2014 for the third consecutive year. Utilizing Professional Learning Communities (PLC's) has allowed teachers to analyze student data and plan appropriate instructional strategies that lead to student achievement. Response to Intervention (Rtl) was a major focus for Arden Elementary and it will continue to be as long as we have students with varied academic abilities. Arden was a recipient of the Fresh Fruit and Veggie's program and the Martin L. King Food Drive Award. Progress monitoring is key in the analysis of student performance data, Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) has been a key tool in monitoring student growth in grades K-5.

This is the first year for the Read to Succeed initiative, which focuses on reading development. Teachers participated in study groups and observed modeled lessons conducted by the Reading Coach.

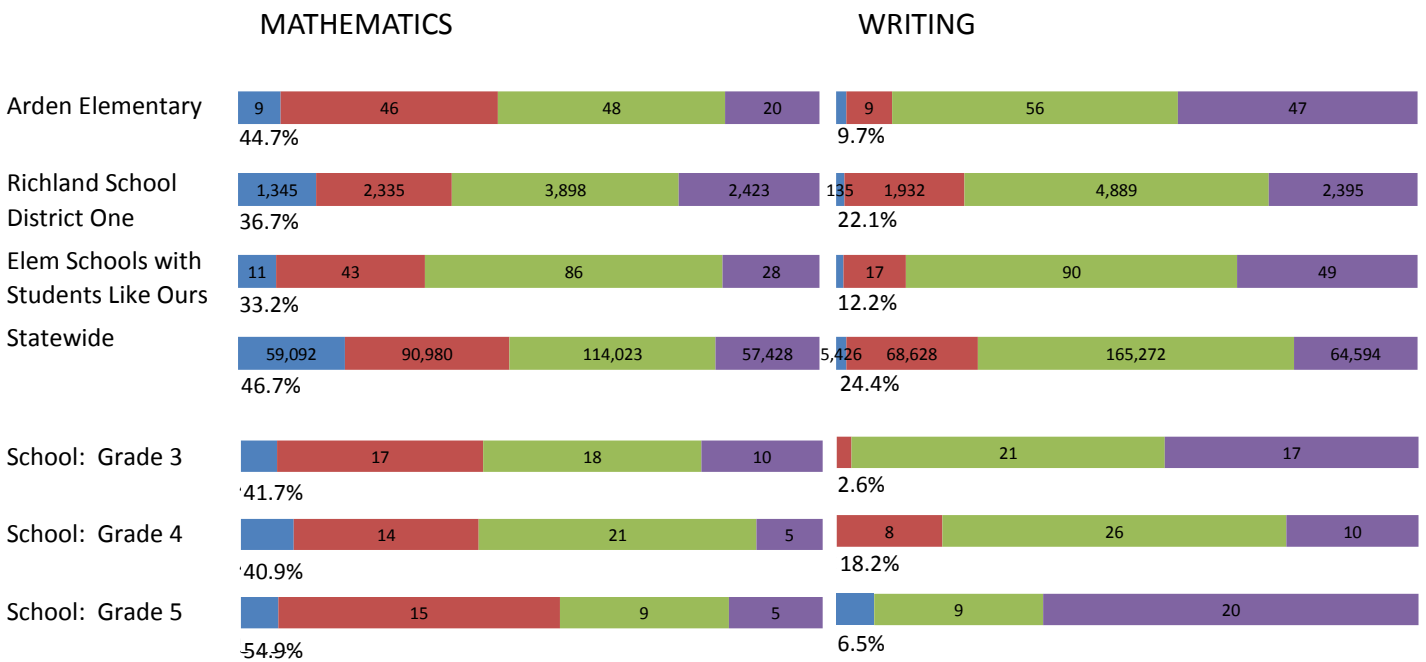
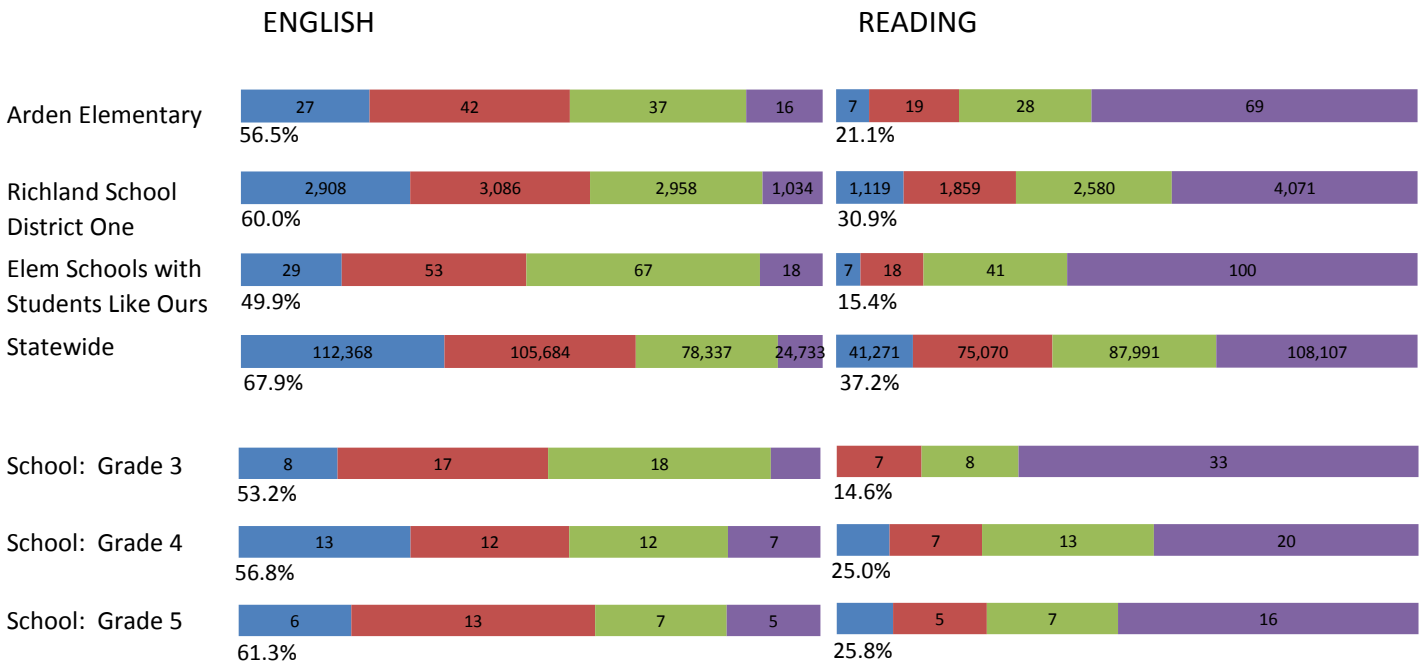

ACT Readiness Levels



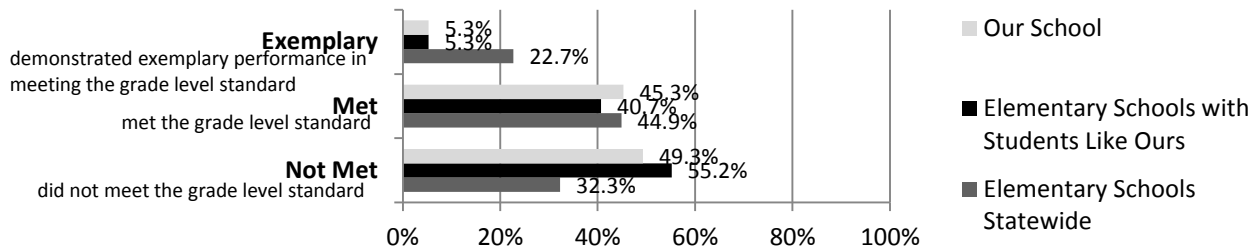

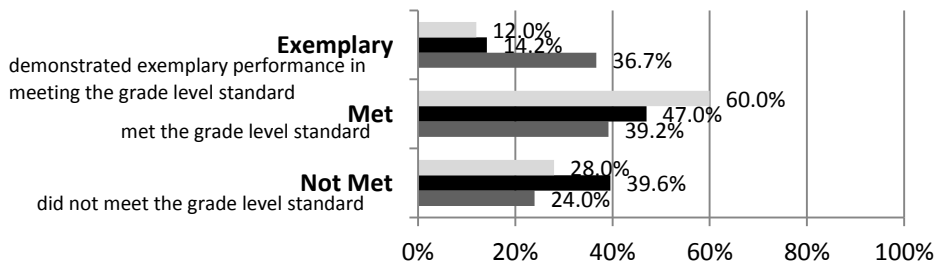
