F.W. Bradley is a warm and welcoming environment that prepares our students to become leaders.

During the 2014-2015 school year, our focus remained on teaching, learning and working to ensure academic success for every child, every day. The school continued to strive to reach the learning needs of every child through Response to Intervention (RtI). An intervention block was incorporated into the schedule to allow teachers the time to assess students' individual learning needs in the core content areas and individualize instruction based on each student's needs. Teachers were able to use the data room where student test data was readily accessible. The data room was also used as a means of collaborating with colleagues, gathering information on one student, groups of students, or placing students into differentiated learning groups. Furthermore, student data from MAP, PASS, common assessments and teacher-made assessments were analyzed in order to meet the needs of our students.

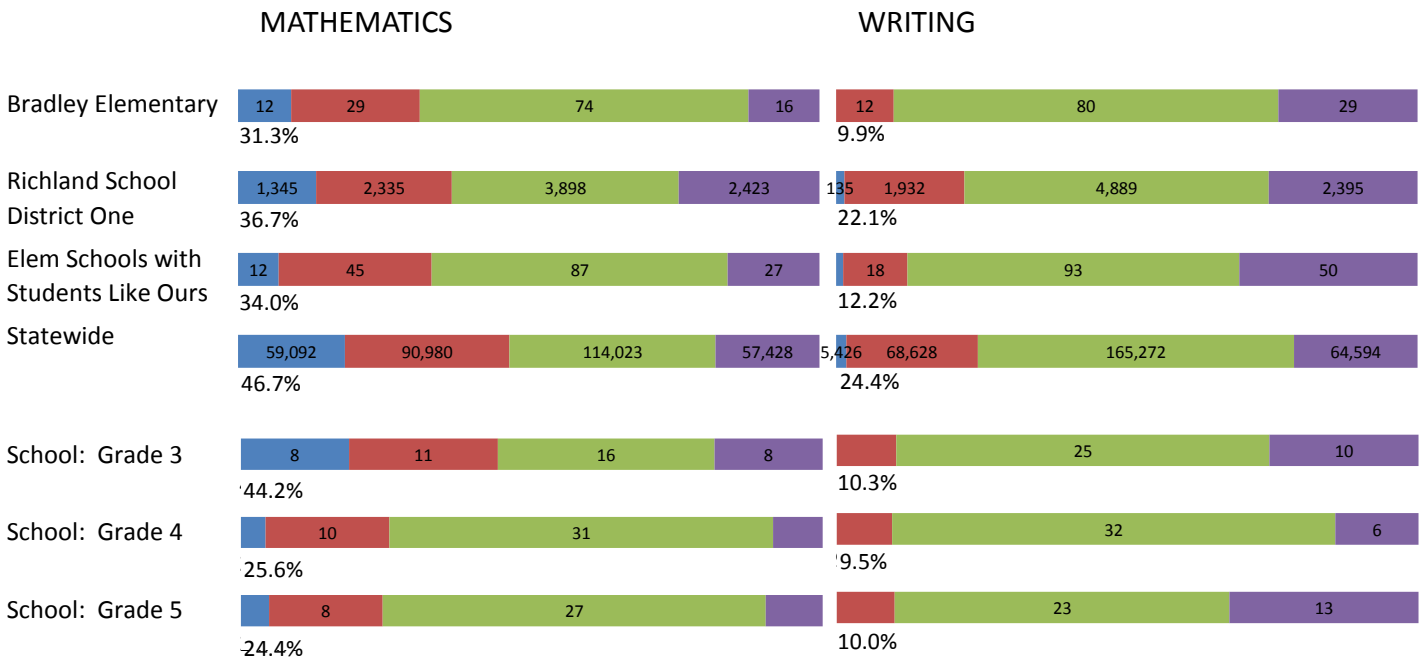
This past school year, we continued to increase parental, community and stakeholder involvement through Parent Teacher Association (PTA), School Improvement Council (SIC) and school activities. Bradley's first "Chew and Chat" was held to allow our parents an opportunity to have a face to face conversation with the principal. Our stakeholders continued to expand upon their academic relationship with our students through our Lunch Buddies Programs with Eastminster Presbyterian, Junior League of Columbia and The Midlands Reading Consortium. These partnerships provided regular small group, as well as one-on-one assistance to our kindergarten, 1st, 2nd and 4th grade students to ensure that our students became more confident with their reading skills. Our PTA, SIC and increased partnerships with local businesses proved to be a huge support in assisting with many of the extra incentives/endeavors for our students and the school.

Our theme for the past school year was "Bee a 'Bee'liever and 'Bee'come an Achiever!" This school year was devoted to helping our students believe in themselves and empowering them to be go-getters. As a result, Bradley has seen great strides and looks forward to our continued success.

The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



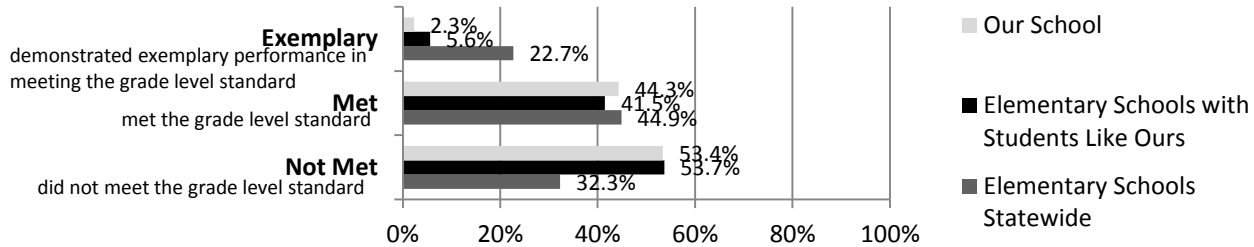

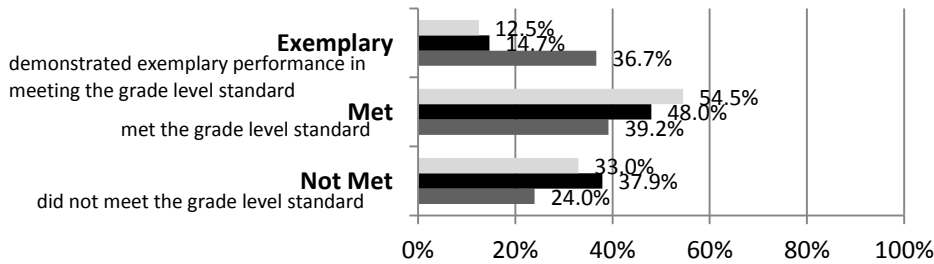
