Hopkins Elementary School is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by incorporating research-proven strategies in the classroom, interventions and extra-curricular activities. This will ensure the individual needs of each child. This includes rigorous academics, varied co-curricular programs, and an effective partnership between home and school.

During the 2014-2015 school year, we worked diligently to protect instructional time through creating a master schedule that supports 120 minutes of uninterrupted instructional time in ELA and one hour for Mathematics. We utilized Title One money to reduce class size in grades 3 and 5. We also used Title One funds to hire 3 tutors for small group instruction in Mathematics and Reading in grades 3-5. We purchased technology, including document cameras and iPads, to support instruction. Our fulltime Math Interventionist provided support to teachers and worked with small groups of students. All professional development was centered on district and school student achievement priorities. Center for Educator Quality Coaches were utilized to provide support to teachers. Our school participated in professional development provided by Title One in the areas of ELA and Mathematics. Our teachers immediately implemented strategies gained in professional development in their lesson plans and instruction. They utilized additional resources provided by Title One to enhance balanced literacy and hands on mathematics instruction.

The Hopkins Elementary family worked hard to raise funds for various charities. Most noted was our gift to Family Shelter of Columbia. This was a student led initiative that raised \$1600 to support the shelter.

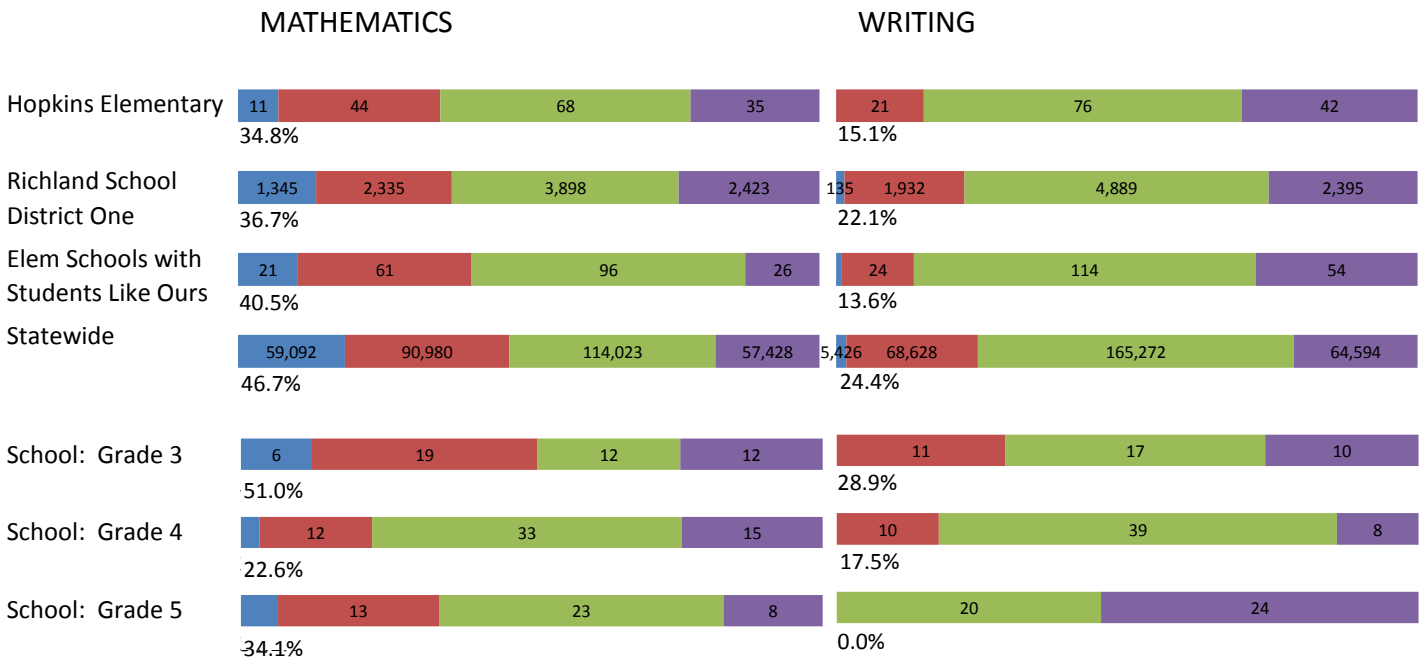
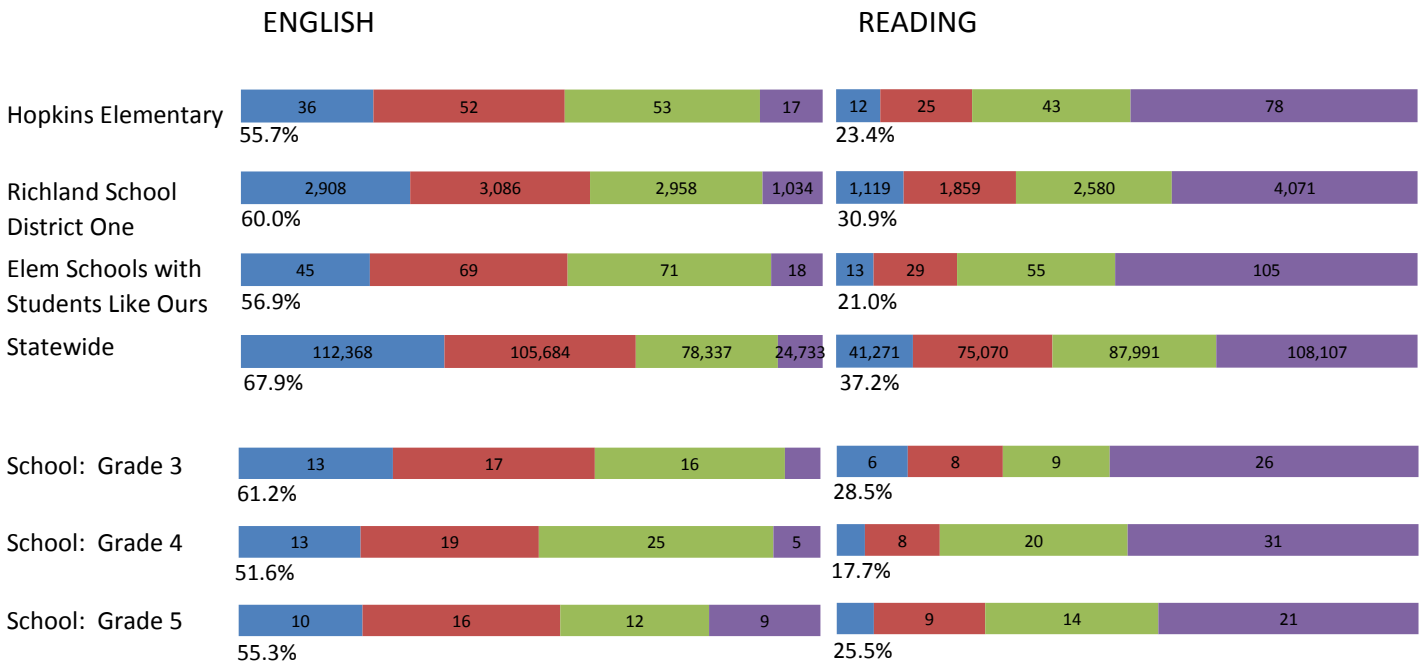

Results for groups with 4 or fewer students are not shown

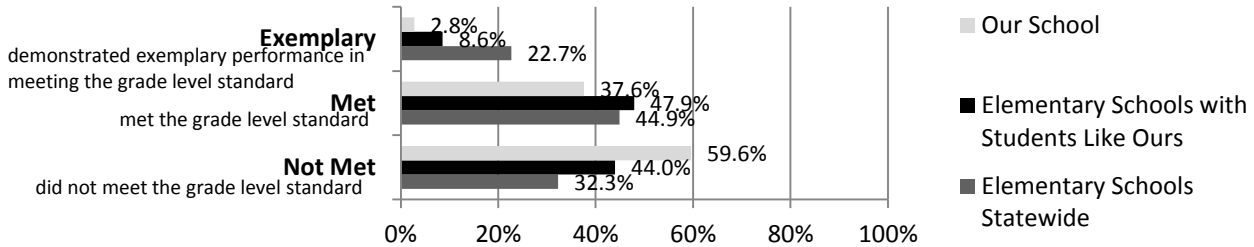

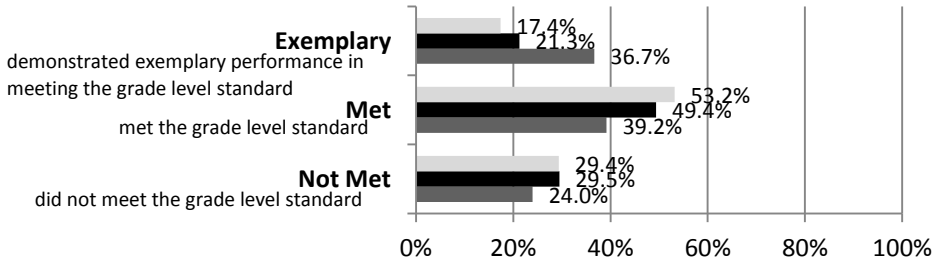
