South Kilbourne Elementary School strives to provide educational experiences that prove beneficial to all students. Our primary focus is to help all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the SC Graduate. Rigorous and engaging learning opportunities, a school-wide character education program, and connections through service learning navigate our drive to steer all students to successful outcomes.

Our top priority continues to be academic achievement. This year's motto, "When You Believe..." emphasizes our commitment to support our community and provide a quality education for all students. School-wide best practice academic strategies include a literacy emphasis across the curriculum, curriculum assimilation, and recognition and awareness of diverse learning styles. Our SuccessMaker Lab is furnished with 25 computers and a full-time lab manager, provides individualized tiered instruction in ELA and Math. School-wide English Language Arts strategies include small group instruction, accelerated reader, and two Reading Interventionists. Math strategies include the use of manipulatives, flexible grouping, and a Math Interventionist to enhance curriculum delivery. Science and Social Studies strategies include the use of inquiry, exploration, research and field studies. Our emphasis on the use of data has proven effective when providing customized services for students. Title I tutors offer invaluable services as integral contributors to our Response to Intervention Plan. Small group instruction is offered in Language Arts and Math. Additional support comes through collaboration with USC, Midlands Reading Consortium, Midlands Technical College, and community and faith organizations. Our newly implemented STEM initiative offers an array of rigorous and engaging project-based learning experiences. These opportunities allow early preparation for the world of work.

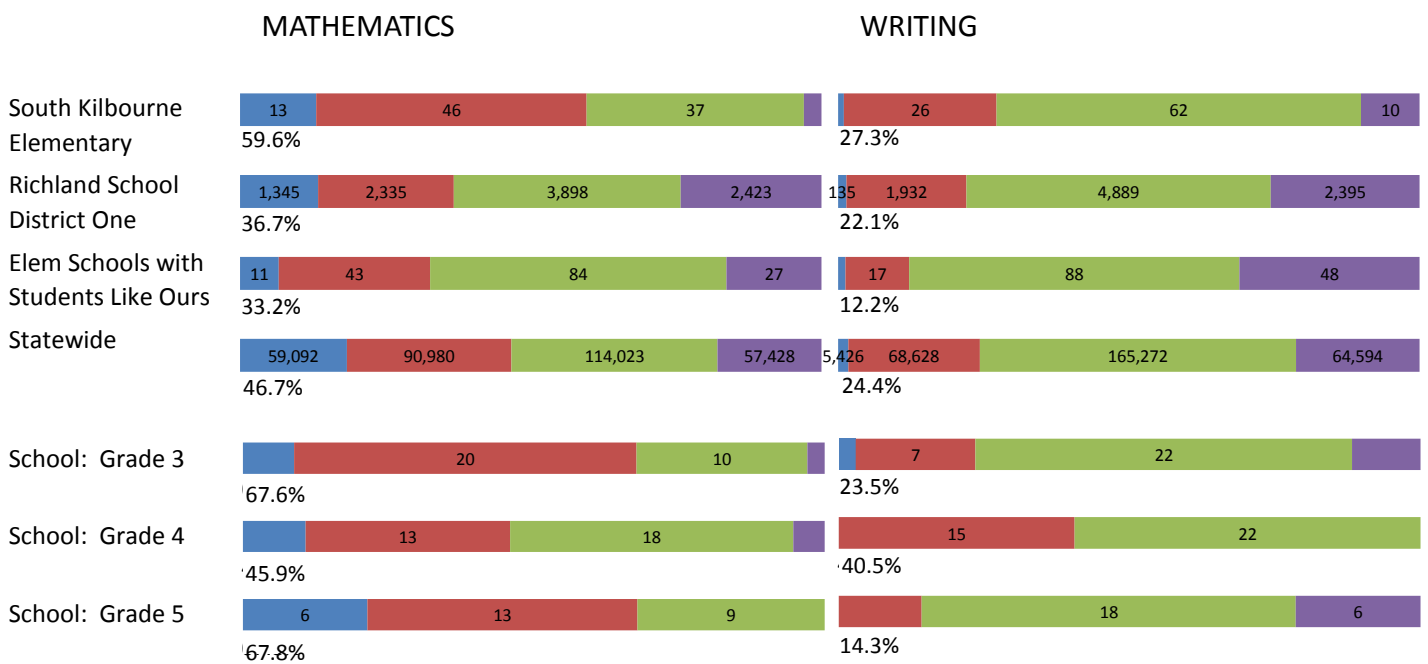

The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



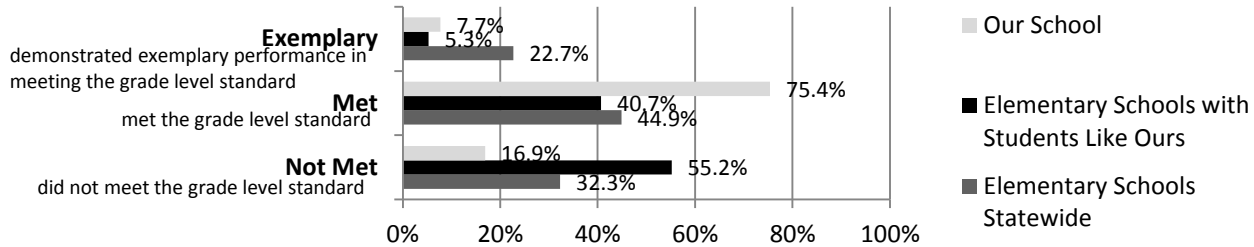

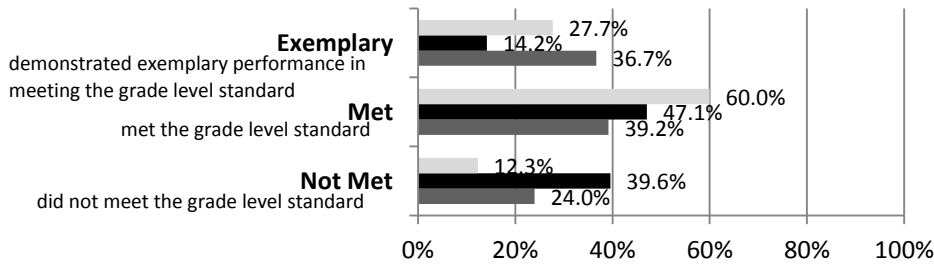
