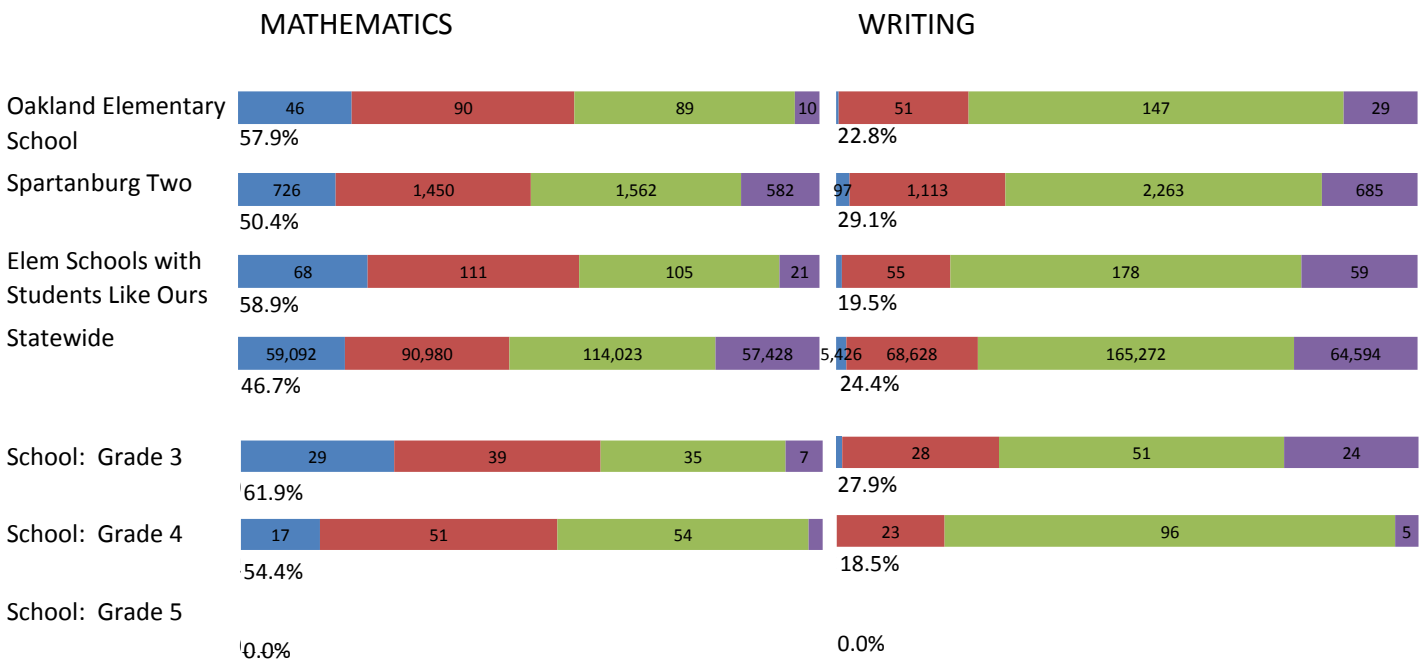
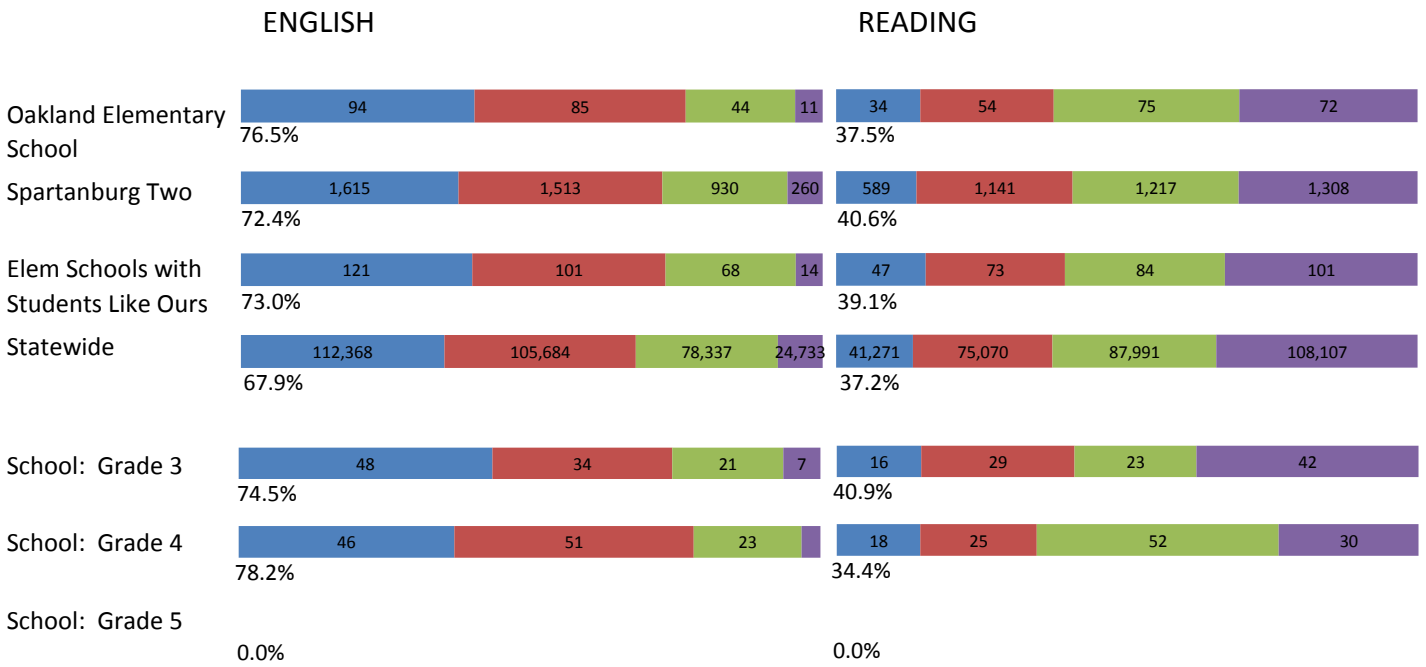

Oakland Elementary School is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by providing various academic and social experiences within a safe, supportive environment. Our school's collective success is the result of a dedicated staff partnered with supportive families, working diligently to provide opportunities that enable our students to achieve their fullest potential and prepare them for tomorrow's world. With the implementation of our new state standards, Oakland Elementary School embraced Project Based Learning (PBL) as the most appropriate model for engaged learning. PBL promotes a cross curricular emphasis and presents an expanded, rather than narrow, view of subject matter, ensuring that students are engaged in the 4 C's: critical thinking, creativity, collaboration, and communication. This year, Oakland teachers presented at several local and state conferences on the topics of inquiry, PBL, and student engagement. Oakland also hosted visits from seven schools throughout the state. We continued our partnership as one of thirty-seven schools within the TransformSC network. As a result of our success, Oakland was highlighted as one of four transformational schools of innovation during this year's spring conference. These efforts not only build the capacity of our teachers to help all students develop the skills and characteristics of the Profile of the S.C. Graduate but also support schools throughout our state. In our ongoing goal to develop the "Whole Child," several efforts were encouraged in the area of health and wellness. Oakland partnered with Wofford College's Healthy Eating Decisions Program to implement C.A.T.C.H. (Coordinated Approach To Child Health). This program provides students with a greater understanding of the various foods and food groups. Fitness was also a priority this year. Teachers utilized routine brain breaks, the gym was available each day for morning jumpstarts, and special events such as Boosterthon, Walk to School, and J.A.M. (Just A Minute) were organized. For these efforts, Oakland was chosen by the Spartanburg Healthy Schools Project and ultimately achieved the 2015 Bronze National Healthy Schools Award, an award given by the Alliance for a Healthier Generation. At Oakland, we are living out our mission by preparing students for "tomorrow's world." The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



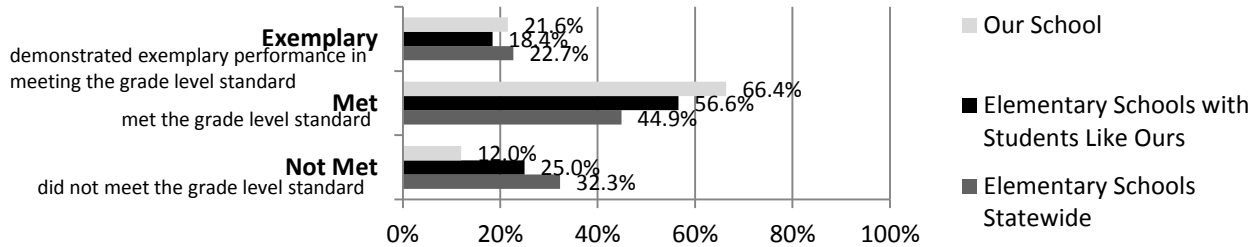

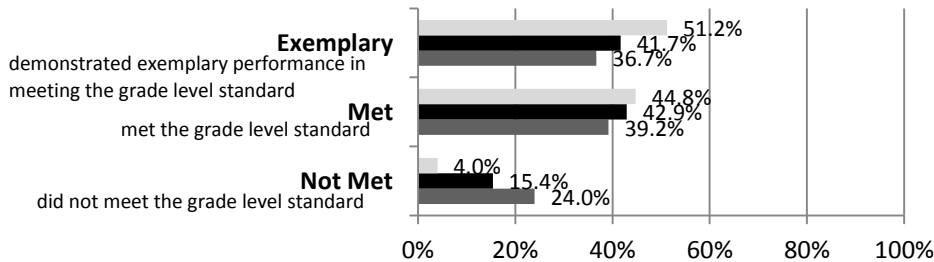
