Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by aligning our curriculum to a set of rigorous academic standards which are the most essential elements needed to prepare our students for college and a career. Each teacher approaches the standards in math, science, English language arts, and social studies with a similar philosophy of holding students accountable, inspiring them to take ownership of their learning as self-directed learners, and expecting them to show a committed work ethic as they persevere through challenging concepts and rigorous reading.

At York Intermediate School, we understand the importance of literacy and realize that literacy is a world class skill that all students must possess. We believe that engaging students with literary texts will ensure that they are strong readers and help them in preparing for college and career readiness. Our teachers and media specialist work together to ensure that students select books of interest so that students will enjoy what they read and therefore strengthen their desire to read.

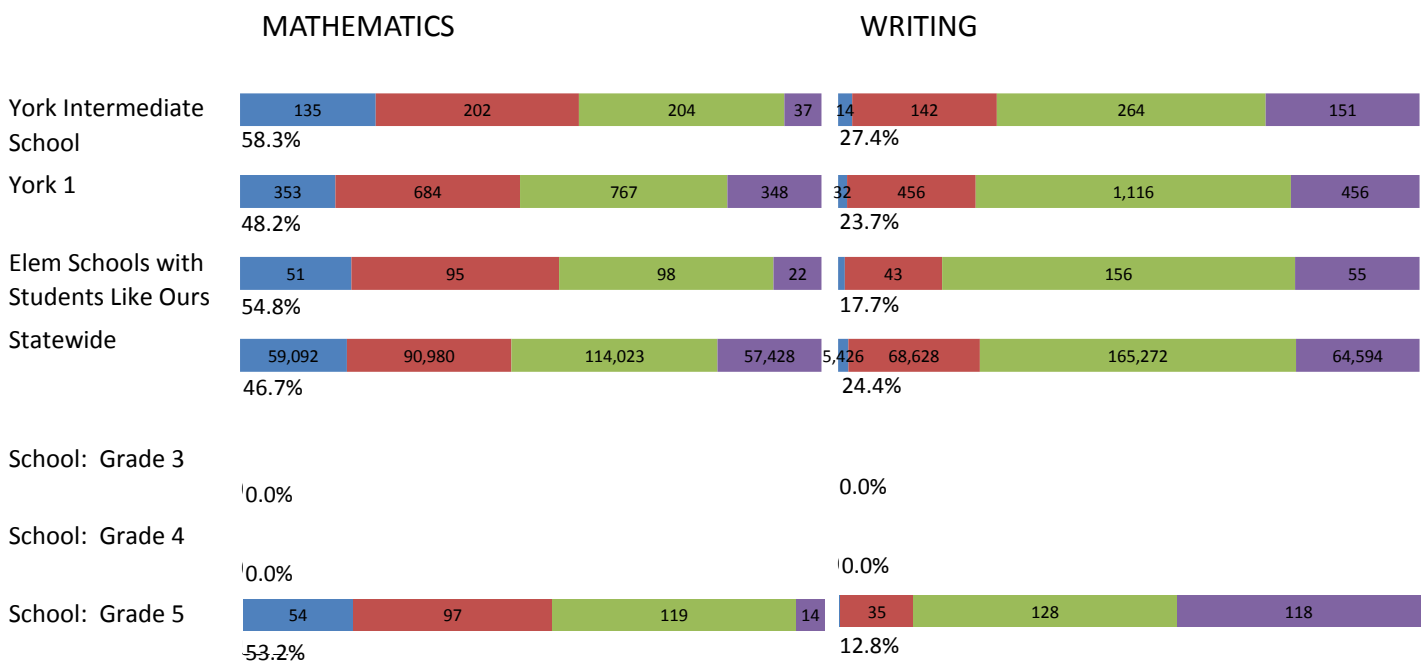
Extra time and extra help is emphasized at York Intermediate School to ensure that all students are challenged and receive additional academic assistance based on individual needs. We offer an after school program as well as summer enrichment to many of our students. During these programs we have exposed our students to different careers through guest speakers, field trips, and project based learning, to enhance real world experiences.

Increasing the use of technology has been a major emphasis in our school. We promote activities that involve critical thinking and problem solving, as well as teamwork and collaboration. For example, in sixth grade science students researched and designed simple machines. In math, students created Podcasts and presented to their classmates. Furthermore, all of our sixth grade students complete the SCOIS career inventory survey to get an idea of what their career interests may be.

Collectively, we remind our students of their value as individuals that they are unique among others, and in order to have integrity, they must choose to develop their own mind, their specific talents, their personal interests, and to be true to who they are. In addition, through the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program this year, students are developing interpersonal skills, becoming more aware of the value of empathy towards others and a

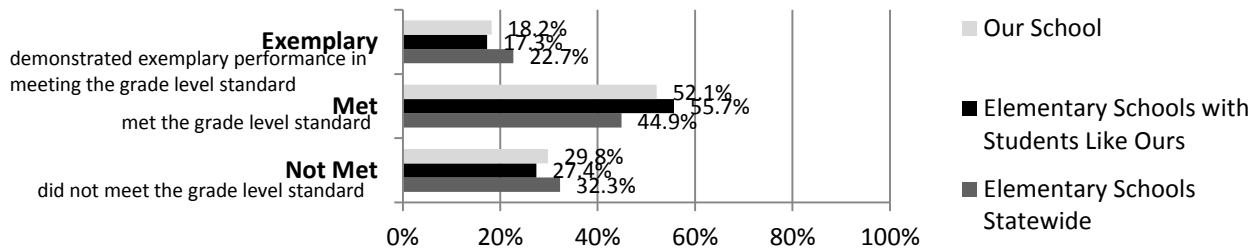

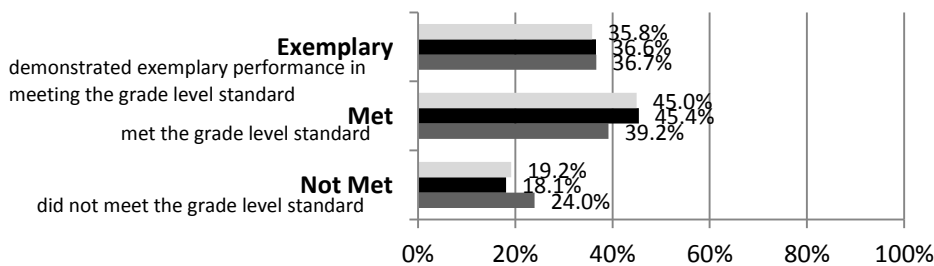
