Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by ...

For the fourth year in a row, Finley Road has been classified as a Title 1 school. Within these four years, our percentage of students qualifying for subsidized meals has increased from 67% to 81%. We have worked with a faculty to adjust to these changing demographics. We have introduced Breakfast in the Classroom, a federally funded program providing a free breakfast to every student, regardless of lunch status. We have read and discussed Beth Lindsay Templeton's book, *Understanding Poverty in the Classroom: Changing Perceptions for Student Success* in order to help us look at students and their situations differently. In addition, we have implemented a positive school-wide behavior plan which focused on rewarding positive behavior and it has decreased referrals dramatically within the first year of implementation.

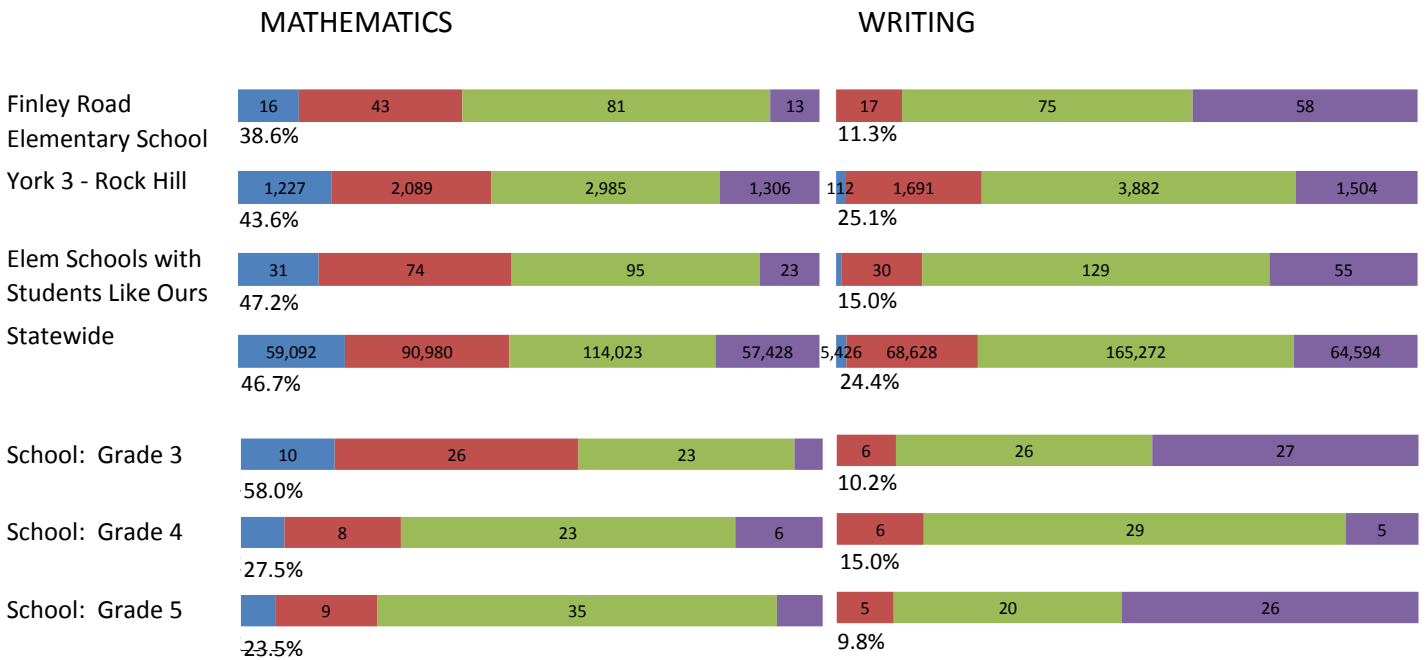
We will continue our partnership with Winthrop University as a Partner School. This partnership not only benefits Winthrop students, but Finley Road's teachers and students as well. We were privileged to host six exceptional Winthrop University interns. Four of these interns were able to work the entire year with our teachers and students. We look forward to hosting more students and strengthening this important partnership in the future.

We have focused this past year on working as a true Professional Learning Community. Our teachers have defined the Essential Learning for each standard, developed common formative assessments, and increased rigor in student work and assessments through questioning. During the 2015-2016 school year, we will continue to work on becoming a stronger and more proficient PLC. We will refine the work done this past year and also continue to improve upon these five areas: 1) data driven instruction, 2) technology integration to enhance instruction, 3) targeted instruction for struggling students, 4) improve upon the positive school-wide behavior plan, and 5) differentiated professional development.

Our plan of action continues to be to increase the percentage of students meeting or exceeding target growth on ELA and Math Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) tests, continued refinement of our balanced literacy instruction and math instruction, providing intervention services for struggling learners, promoting character education through our positive school-wide behavior plan, modeling the use of technology to enhance instruction, and continuously finding ways to improve through differentiated professional development.

The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



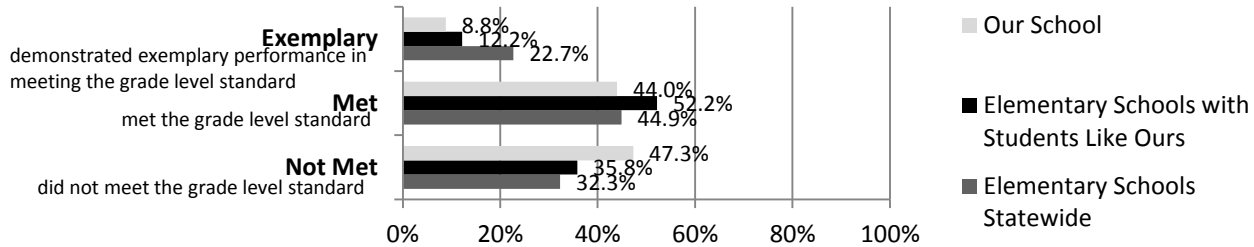

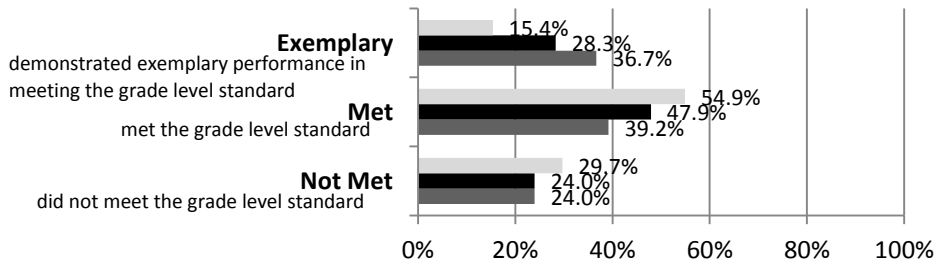
