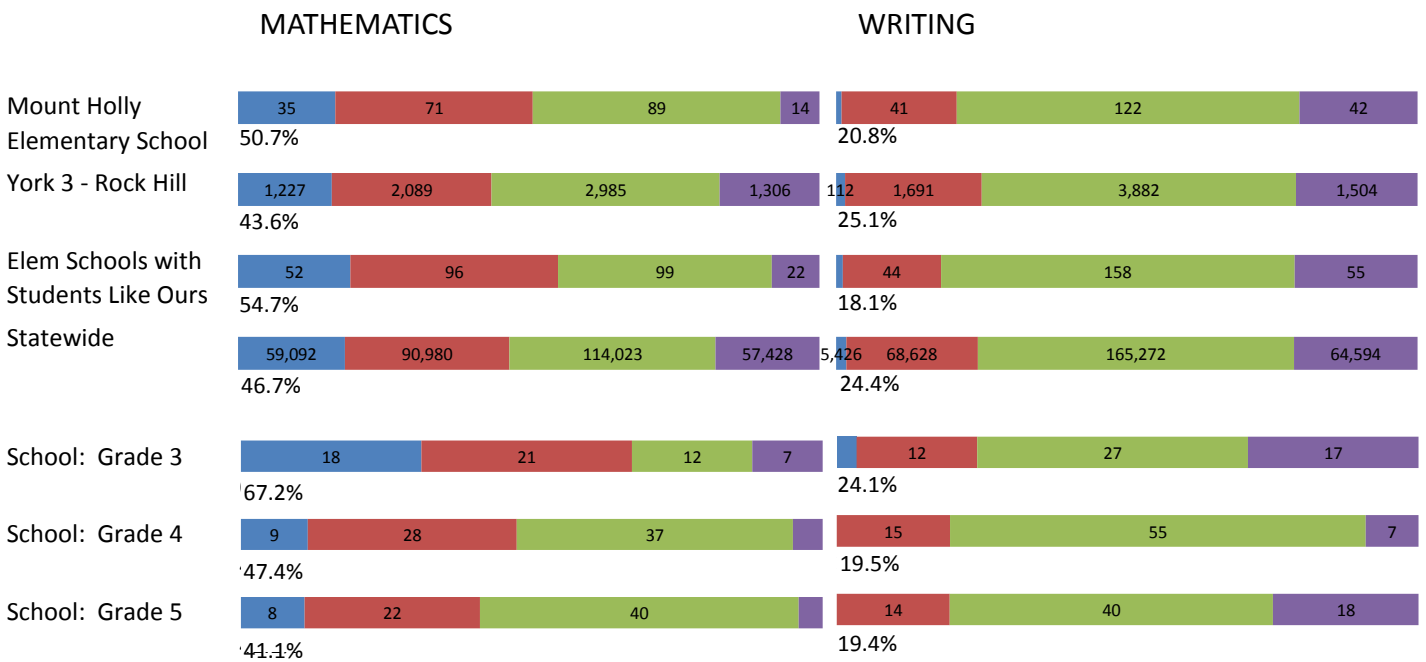
WORLD CLASS SKILLS & LIFE AND CAREER CHARACTERISTICS

During the 2014-2015 school year, our School Improvement Council chose to focus on building the self-worth of our students, faculty, and staff. We did this through the Inspirational Sticky Note Project where in conjunction with our PTO and community partners, we wrote personalized notes to all of our students and faculty/staff twice throughout the year. Volunteers arrived before the students entered the classrooms and placed a message on each student's desk. The Inspirational Sticky Note Project was a rewarding experience for our School Improvement Council as we provided words of encouragement to our school family. The second project the School Improvement Council took part in was continuing our school's initiative to promote health and fitness among our students. We explored fitness stations to add to our walking track for our students to use during their physical activity time. We received quotes from various vendors to ensure we got what is best for our students in a cost-effective manner. Our PTO agreed to provide funding for the fitness stations and we planned a Health Fair/Fun Run in the fall of the new school year in support of adding our fitness stations. In addition, our fourth and fifth graders participated in a production of "Seussical" and provided our school with an excellent performance on the stage. Through rehearsals and extended school days for several months, cast and crew proved to our school that we can reach success by working as a team with all members contributing to the goal. We are proud of our students and their hard work. We know that the Arts are an integral part of education. During the school year, our teachers participated in a variety of staff development opportunities. The ACT Aspire assessment was given to students in grades 3-8 in Spring 2015. Students were assessed in the subject areas of Reading, English, Mathematics and Writing



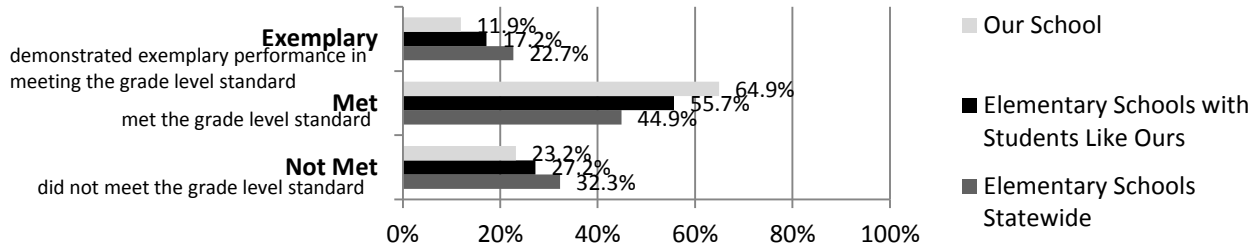

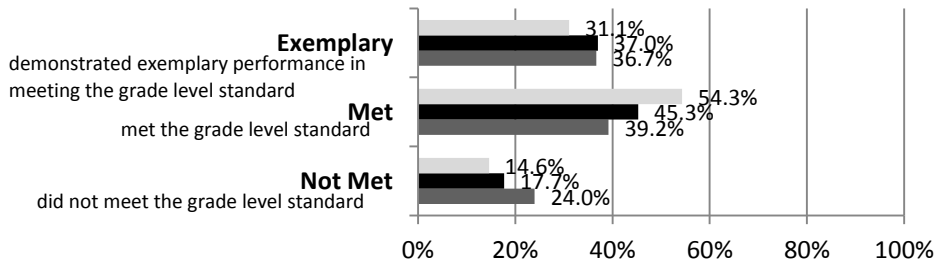
