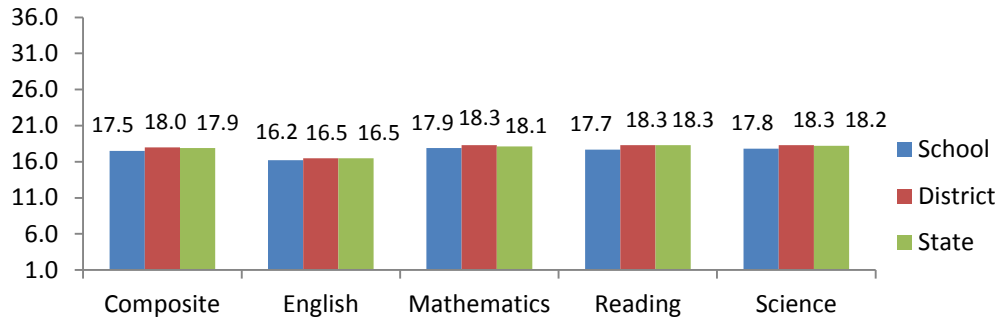

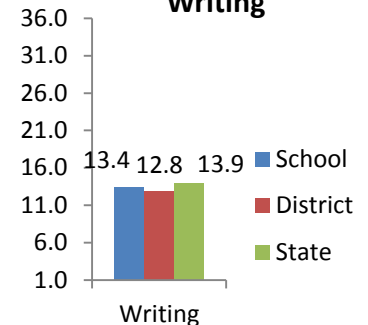
Aiken High School is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by creating an educational environment that is centered on building positive relationships, increasing academic rigor, encouraging extra-curricular activities, and promoting student responsibility. The Profile of the South Carolina graduate is evident in Aiken High's 2015 graduating class. Our 2015 graduates' world class knowledge earned them over \$14 million in scholarships. Our 2015 graduates demonstrated that they indeed possess world class skills along with the desired life and career characteristics. Aiken High School Class of 2015 included twenty one Palmetto Fellows, twelve recipients of the prestigious Watson Brown scholarship, a finalist in the South Carolina High School writing Contest, the DAR Good Citizen District winner, a Commended National Merit student, two National Army ROTC scholarships, a state winner of the PEO scholarship, a student who is first place winner in the National Geographic Photography contest and won the National Congressional Photography contest, a student won first in the state in the Skills USA Commercial Baking Contest and will compete nationally, two other students earned their Pro-Start Certificates of Achievement from the National Restaurant Association, a student passed nine ASE certifications for Auto Technology, two female welders to graduate from the Aiken County Career Center. Through encouraging extra-curricular activities and promoting student responsibility Aiken High has had many great accomplishments this year. The NJROTC Academic team won the North Carolina/South Carolina Academic team Competition and the Rifle team qualified to compete nationally. The school had the most students in the region qualify for the Region 2 Honor Band. The Jazz band received a Superior rating at the Carowinds Festival. The volleyball team was undefeated Region Champions. The Girls' basketball team were Region Champions. In Boys' Soccer, the team made it to the 3rd round of the State playoffs. Both the Aiken High School Boys' and Girls' tennis team produced the Region Players of the Year. They were selected to play in the State Singles Tournament. Average ACT Score Achieved by Students: Writing

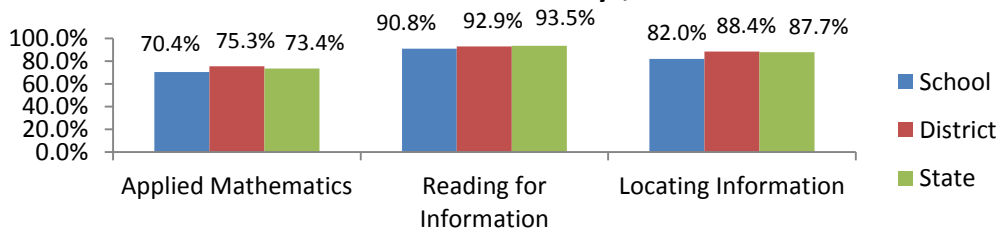


The ACT, a college readiness assessment, was given to every South Carolina 11th grader in 2015 with the exception of those eligible for alternate assessments. The ACT scores range from 0 to 36. The district and state averages are included for comparison. State averages for ACT data are based on regular public schools and do not include private schools in the state.

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
