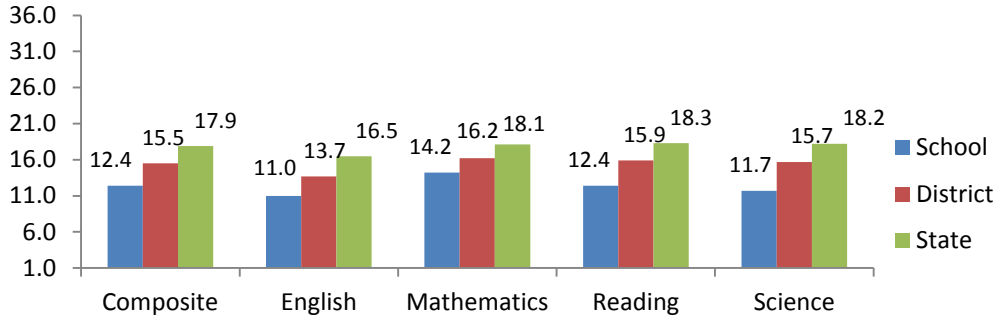

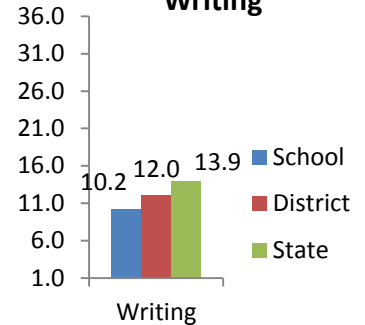

Phoenix is chartered by Clarendon School District Two to meet the needs of students who are unsuccessful in the traditional setting. Our mission is to empower students classified as divergent learners to become productive citizens and life-long learners by personalizing education in a small supportive environment. Phoenix serves students in grades nine through twelve in the rural area of Clarendon County. Our students benefit from a small environment in which they receive individualized instruction. We strive to build self-esteem, character and trust, address social issues, and enhance their confidence towards learning. Parents are supportive of our school as demonstrated in their attendance at conferences and school sponsored functions. Teachers vary instruction and challenge students through the use of technology in the classroom and the computer lab. Because of the small teacher/pupil ratio, teachers are able to individualize student activities as needed. Cooperatively, students begin to take ownership of their learning by becoming active participants. Students are given the opportunity for credit recovery to ensure on-time graduation. In order to strengthen the students' social skills, we have implemented mentoring and career programs. Average ACT Score Achieved by Students: Writing

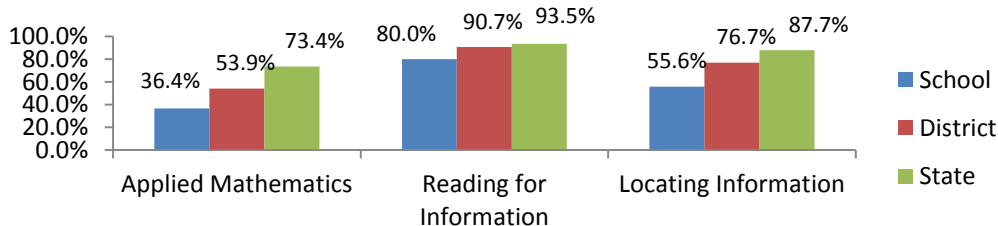

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
