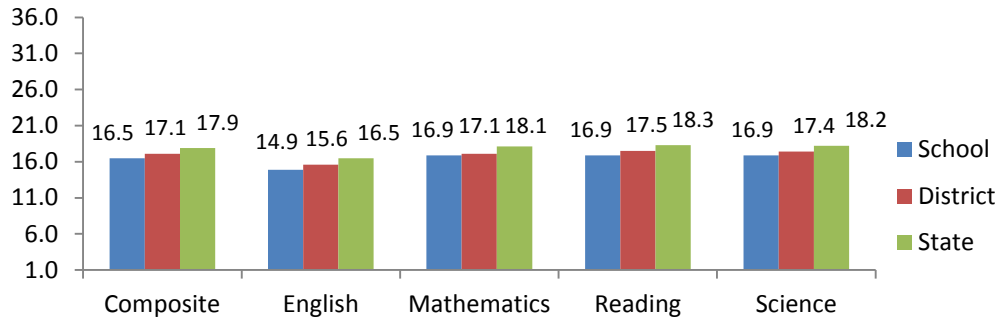
WORLD CLASS SKILLS & LIFE AND CAREER CHARACTERISTICS

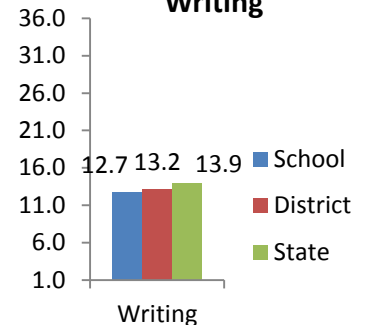
South Florence High School (SFHS) is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the profile of the South Carolina graduate. SFHS data indicate school commitment to building world-class knowledge in students. SFHS offered more Advanced Placement (AP) courses this year and increased the percentage of students passing AP exams, including a 94.7% passage rate of freshmen who took the AP Human Geography exam. The percentage of SFHS students passing AP exams exceeded the SC average and was on par with the national average. The 2015 graduating class earned over 8 million in scholarship monies, indicating a state-level and national-level respect for their accomplishments. One student received a full scholarship to Princeton. In addition, the school used an AIFS grant to develop an International Club. SFHS also hosted five international exchange students who presented to student groups, and a group from the school toured Europe this summer. SFHS initiatives cultivating world-class skills took many forms. Staff and student training continued related to the internationally recognized 16 Habits of Mind, thinking habits that help people know the “smart” thing to do when faced with challenges. Students used these thinking habits to produce a number of world-class products: a Chihuly-like art sculpture in the commons, an award-winning yearbook, an acclaimed literary magazine, a ropes course unique to the Pee Dee, a Jobs for America’s Graduates (JAG) conference display, and choreographed dance routines. In addition, the students committed to collaboration and won region championships in football and softball, an Excellent rating in band, and multiple NJROTC awards. Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics (STEAM) initiatives increased as the school received two grants related to STEAM. SFHS facilitated life and career success indicators in students through implementing eleven (11) different innovation grants this year. Collaboration with community partners created multiple service-learning opportunities promoting health and wellness, initiatives such as starting a school garden and conducting vision and hearing screenings. Students also spearheaded the SFHS academic and arts showcase, Simply the Best, presenting to peers and parents. SFHS initiatives like monthly advisories, JAG, Leadership Class, Graduate Florence Academy, after school tutoring and credit recovery encouraged student self-directedness and hard work. Carol C. Average ACT Score Achieved by Students: Writing

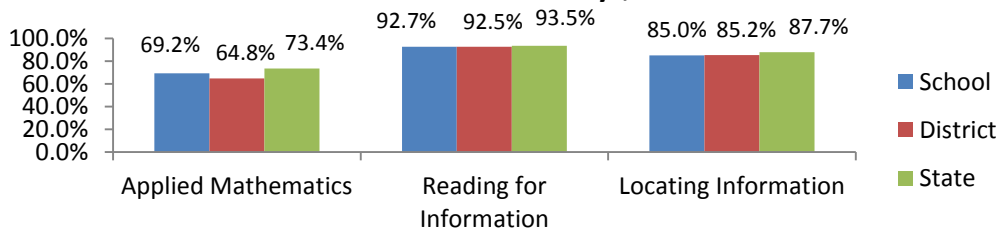


The ACT, a college readiness assessment, was given to every South Carolina 11th grader in 2015 with the exception of those eligible for alternate assessments. The ACT scores range from 0 to 36. The district and state averages are included for comparison. State averages for ACT data are based on regular public schools and do not include private schools in the state.

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
