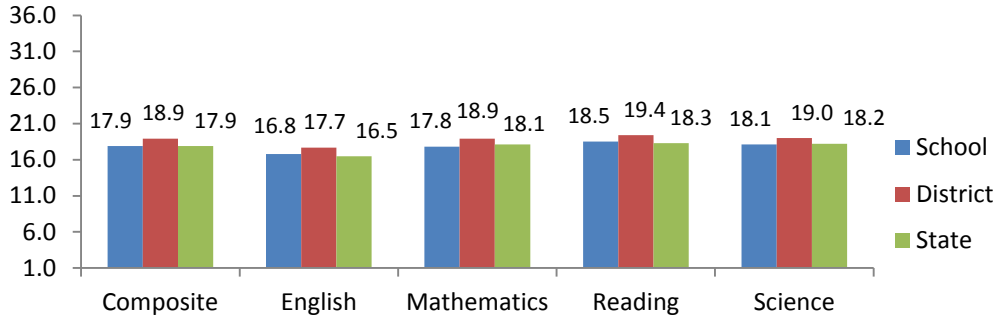
Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by ...

Blue Ridge High School is helping all students develop world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by providing high expectations for all its students and fostering a climate where learning is shared by the home, school, and community. Our community prides itself on its open and welcoming atmosphere and contains parents and businesses which are highly supportive of school's varied curricular offerings. The PTSA, SIC and various booster clubs have dedicated many hours and resources to help the school achieve its goals in fostering growth for all students in the areas of academic, athletics, and activities, and artistic endeavors. In the area of academics, our school offers 14 Advanced Placement courses and 4 foreign languages, along with a number of specialized classes in the fields of horticulture and technology. Academic assistance is available before and after school and a credit recovery program operates within and beyond the school day. Our recent graduates received nearly 8 million dollars in scholarship offers for the 2014-2015 academic year; 221 students have indicated plans to attend college. In the area of athletics and student activities, the school provides a complete menu of athletic programs for all students. Athletes were selected as the local players of the year. We also have an award winning Air Force ROTC program which annually leads the school in many service activities and regularly brings awards and honors to BRHS. The FBLA program competes at the national level as it allows students the opportunity to grow in expertise in business leadership. Many student organizations contribute to the school and community, as well as compete and are recognized for their excellence. The Fine Arts program brings students together in band and chorus competitions at district and state levels. The visual art program has grown and students have been awarded at district and regional competitions. Beyond the three A's, Blue Ridge High School students also focus on community service with events throughout the year to support community needs. Our character education program grew in opportunities for all students. We see our many programs as ways to develop the whole child into bright, committed, ethical, and caring citizens of the future. The students are the focal point of every decision. Our goal is that each student in the school will leave with a high school diploma and is prepared to successfully meet the challenges of the world. 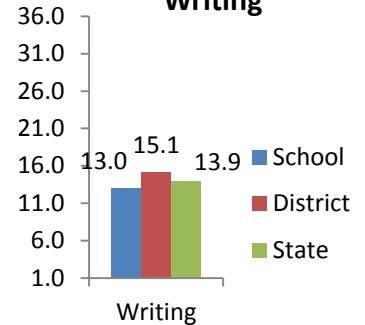

Average ACT Score Achieved by Students: Writing

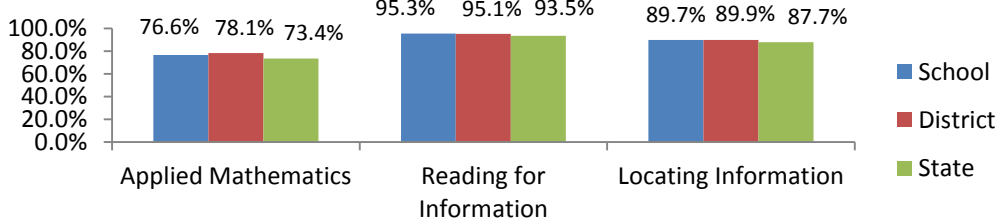


The ACT, a college readiness assessment, was given to every South Carolina 11th grader in 2015 with the exception of those eligible for alternate assessments. The ACT scores range from 0 to 36. The district and state averages are included for comparison. State averages for ACT data are based on regular public schools and do not include private schools in the state.

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
