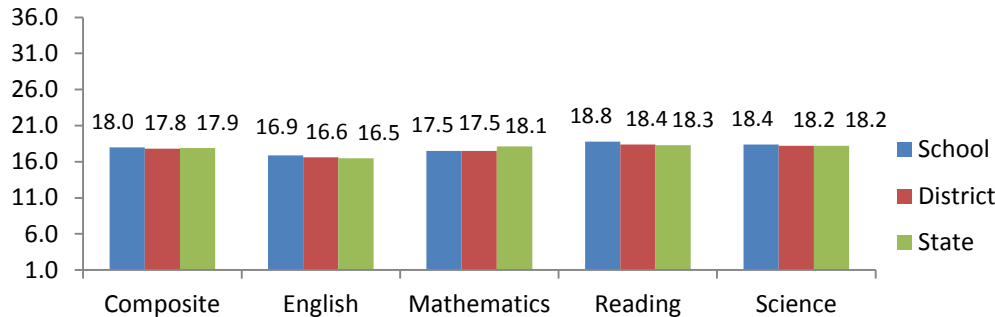
Our school is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the Graduate by ...

Lugoff-Elgin High School (LEHS) is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by providing World Class Instruction that focuses on a higher level of understanding of English, Social Studies, Math, and Science. We want our students to critically think about the subject matter and be able to communicate thoughts and solutions about complex problems through creativity, collaboration and the use of technology. Our 1:1 laptop program is instrumental in allowing our teachers to instruct in this manner, and it is a primary way for our students to be able to think and communicate in ways that mimic the global workforce. In addition, our teachers spend a great deal of time in professional development to make sure they are up to date in the latest instructional techniques. Another way that Lugoff-Elgin High provides World Class instruction is by making sure our teachers collaborate and plan for ways to teach across the curriculum. This is done by providing for common planning, looking for common ways to teach standards, and by promoting literacy across the curriculum. Literacy has common strands across all subjects, and our school ensures that all students are reading and writing on a daily basis. At Lugoff-Elgin High School, we not only believe that our instruction should be at its highest level, we believe that the content should be rigorous and challenging for all students. We provide students the ability to take the most demanding courses of study in all areas of Science, Math, English, and the Social Sciences by providing them college-level courses through Advanced Placement offerings and dual enrollment agreements via a partnership with Central Carolina Technical College. All of our course offerings are either college preparatory in nature or prepare our students to achieve certification in a field of study by taking courses at our partner school (ATEC). Lugoff-Elgin High School provides our students with the ability to participate in a vast array of extracurricular activities in the athletic arena and in the academic arena. We also provide many clubs that give students the ability to learn leadership skills while fostering a sense of community and philanthropy. Last year, led by our student government, Lugoff-Elgin High School raised over \$40,000 for United Way of Kershaw County. 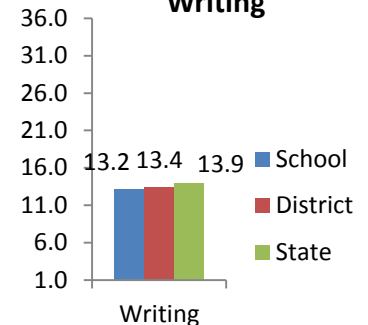

Average ACT Score Achieved by Students: Writing

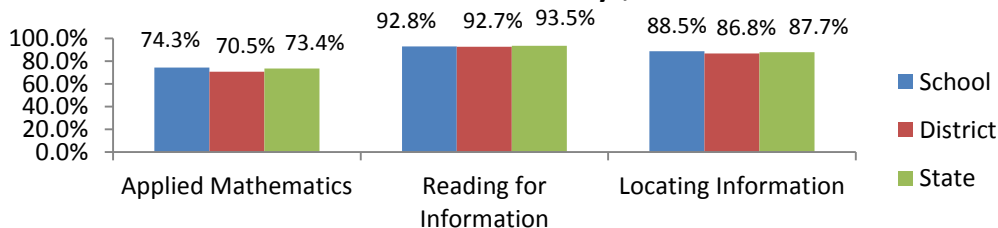


The ACT, a college readiness assessment, was given to every South Carolina 11th grader in 2015 with the exception of those eligible for alternate assessments. The ACT scores range from 0 to 36. The district and state averages are included for comparison. State averages for ACT data are based on regular public schools and do not include private schools in the state.

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
