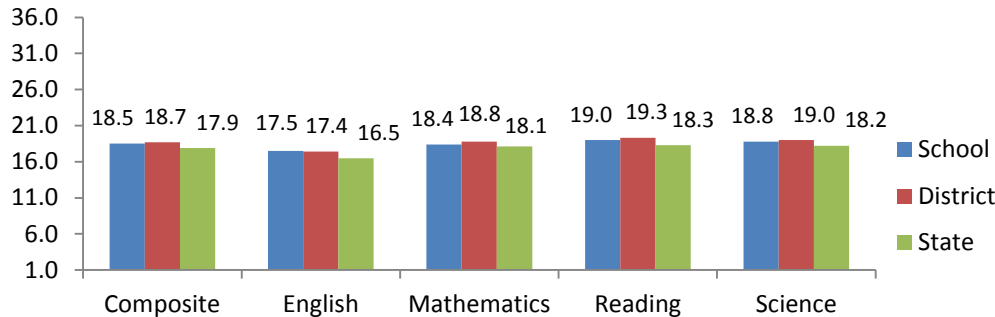
Our students have many opportunities to participate in extra-curricular activities. Over 600 students participated in one or more of our honors or service societies. In 2014-15, forty-seven world language students attained national recognition for excellent performance on the National Spanish and German Examinations. Our sports teams did an outstanding job this year with all but one of our Varsity sports making it to the playoffs. Our Varsity Boy's Golf team is the 4AAAA State Champion, and Easley High student-athletes won many regional and state awards. The Easley High NJROTC was named a Distinguished Unit for the 18th consecutive year. Their Academic Team placed first in the area and 14th nationally. The EHS marching band saw over 50% growth from last year to this year, and the Jazz Band saw enormous growth as well. Two of the concert ensembles received superior ratings at concert assessments.

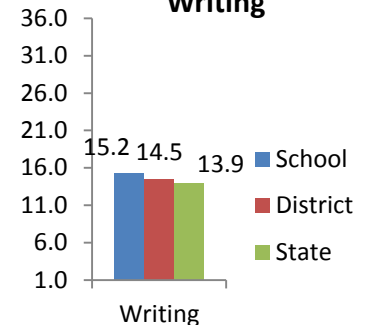

Average ACT Score Achieved by Students: Writing

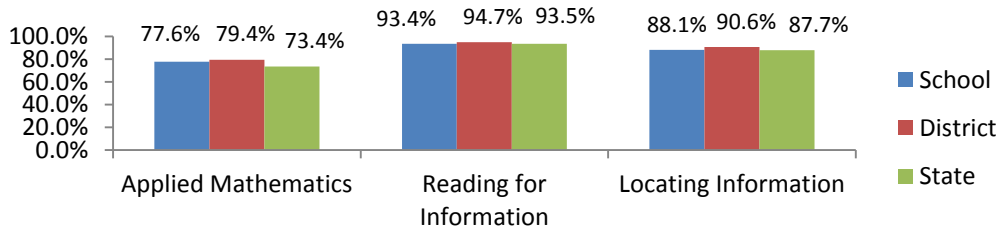

The district and state averages are included for comparison. State averages for ACT data are based on regular public schools and do not include private schools in the state.

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
