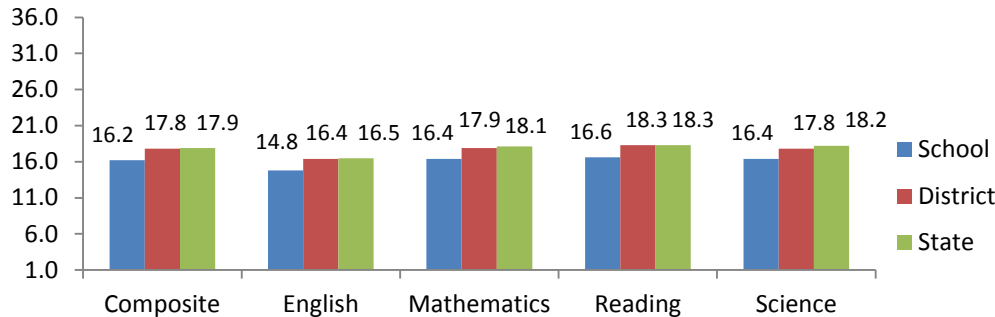

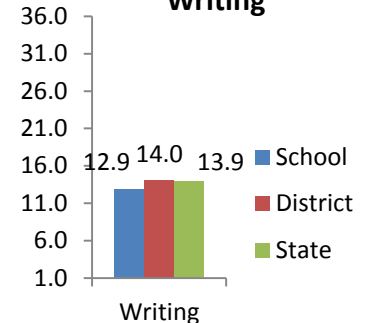
Westwood High School's Institute of Research, Engagement and Design (iRED) is a whole-school magnet where students are encouraged to explore career opportunities through courses in health sciences, sports medicine, business, convergence media, informational technology, computer science, engineering, firefighting, digital art, and marketing. In addition, the school offers a strong arts program that includes visual and performing arts, which was recently awarded a Distinguished Arts Program grant. The school's unique Renaissance Faire, held each April, is a collaborative effort that spans all disciplines at the school. A national kick-off for Globalize13, a service learning curriculum by the Frederick Douglass Family Initiative (fdi.org) celebrating the 150th anniversary of the 13th Amendment, was held at Westwood High School. Westwood's Modern Day Abolitionists organization has brought awareness to human trafficking both locally and around the world. London Allen, a Westwood student, created a public service announcement that won Honorable Mention in the White House Student Film Festival. The Westwood Way core values of Respect, Responsibility, Integrity, Empathy, and Community are lived in classrooms, extracurricular activities, and athletic fields. The 2014-15 Westwood High athletic teams continued to improve and experienced more success with five teams (football, girls tennis, volleyball, boys basketball, and wrestling) qualifying for the State 4A Playoffs. The wrestling team won its first ever region championship and we had another individual state champion in the State Strength Competition. Fifteen of our senior athletes signed letters of intent to continue their athletic careers in college, and our athletes continued to participate in numerous service projects throughout the community. Our Student Council was recognized as the AAAA Student Council of the Year (SC Student Council Association) and as a Gold Council of Excellence (National Association of Student Councils). Students contributed to the community with two blood drives, canned food collections, service at God's Storehouse and Harvest Hope Food Bank, sponsorship of Brett's Rainbow (camp for grieving children), and roadside clean up. FBLA, DECA and HOSA students won at their respective state competitions and advanced to the national level. The FIRST Robotics team competed at the Palmetto Regionals in Myrtle Beach, SC. The Westwood Actors Theater won a superior rating at the Palmetto Dramatic Association and was selected to represent the state at nationals. Three orchestras received Superior ratings. The Marching Band was a state finalist for the 2nd year in a row in Class AAA. In just three years of existence, Westwood has developed strong academic programs, as well as opportunities for students to develop leadership and to serve the community. Average ACT Score Achieved by Students: Writing

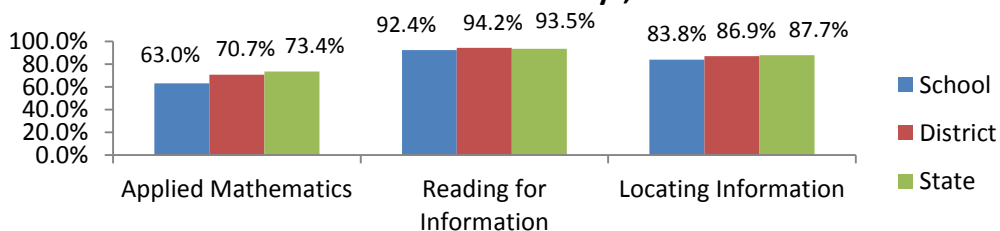


The ACT, a college readiness assessment, was given to every South Carolina 11th grader in 2015 with the exception of those eligible for alternate assessments. The ACT scores range from 0 to 36. ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
