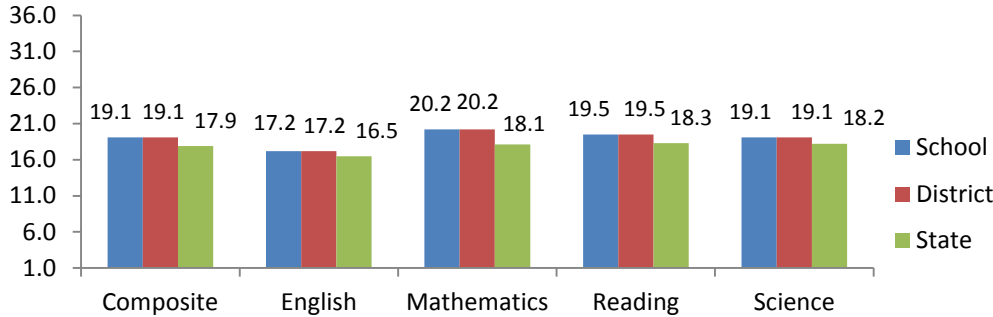

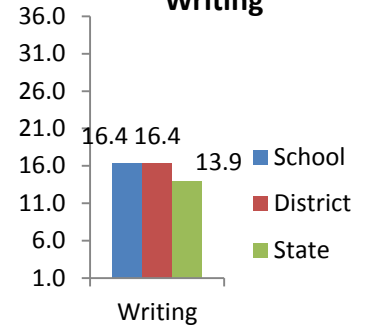
"EXCELLENCE EVERYDAY" was the theme for Woodruff High School during the 2014-2015 school year. Hard work, commitment, involvement, and communication are essential if we are to maintain the level of excellence established by years of outstanding Woodruff High School alumni. The students and faculty of Woodruff High are continually blessed by a generous community that supports academic rigor, co-curricular excellence, and facilities that are second to none. The goal of Woodruff High School is to ensure that every student is college and career ready upon graduation. Our foundational principles of academic rigor and strong discipline in a nurturing environment lead each student in acquiring skills necessary for life in the 21st century. In 2014-2015 the students of Woodruff High demonstrated college and career readiness in many ways. The senior class led WHS in receiving a cumulative total of \$2,023,525 in scholarships, one of the largest ever. Over sixty-five percent of the class received some scholarship award. Seventy seniors received LIFE Scholarships, ten seniors received HOPE Scholarships, and eight were named Palmetto Fellows. WHS ranked at the top in South Carolina in the percentage of students enrolled in AP courses. Woodruff High was named as one of the top 1600 high schools in the nation by The Washington Post. Moreover, Woodruff High School was ranked twelfth among all High School in South Carolina by U.S. News and World Report for College Readiness in English and Mathematics Proficiency. Additionally, Woodruff High School received an "A" rating on both the South Carolina and the ESEA Federal report cards. Woodruff High School students achieved great success in the arts during the 2014-2015 school year. The Regional Scholastic Arts Competition awarded eighteen Gold Medals, seven Silver Medals and ten Honorable Mentions to Woodruff High students. Additionally, one Woodruff High School was awarded a Silver Medal from the National Scholastic Arts Competitions. Two Woodruff High School students were the winner and first alternate in the prestigious Archibald Rutledge Visual Arts Competition, the highest visual arts award in South Carolina. Success was also achieved in the athletic venue. WHS produced twenty-three SCHSL scholar athletes. Three teams were crowned region champions and five were runners-up. Thirty-eight students were named All Region athletes. Woodruff High School had three All State athletes and reached the playoffs in eleven sports. Moreover, three Woodruff High School athletes were selected to a state All Star team. During the 2014-2015 school year, Woodruff High School continued to emphasize self-discipline, student involvement, communication and caring attitudes. Throughout the school year, the traditions of WHS remained steadfast because of the involvement and commitment of the community, students, and staff. Our goal in the 2015-2016 is to uphold the Woodruff High School tradition of leading the state of South Carolina in academic achievement, athletic accomplishments and artistic endeavors. Aaron D. Average ACT Score Achieved by Students: Writing

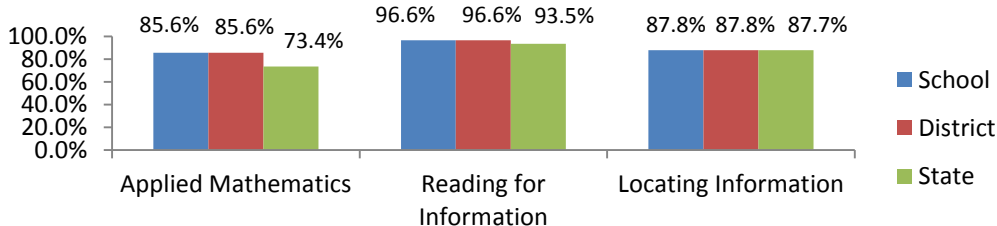


The ACT, a college readiness assessment, was given to every South Carolina 11th grader in 2015 with the exception of those eligible for alternate assessments. The ACT scores range from 0 to 36. The district and state averages are included for comparison. State averages for ACT data are based on regular public schools and do not include private schools in the state.

ACT benchmarks are scores on the ACT subject-area tests that represent the level of achievement required for students to have a 50% chance of obtaining a B or higher or about a 75% chance of obtaining a C or higher in corresponding credit-bearing first-year college courses.

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
