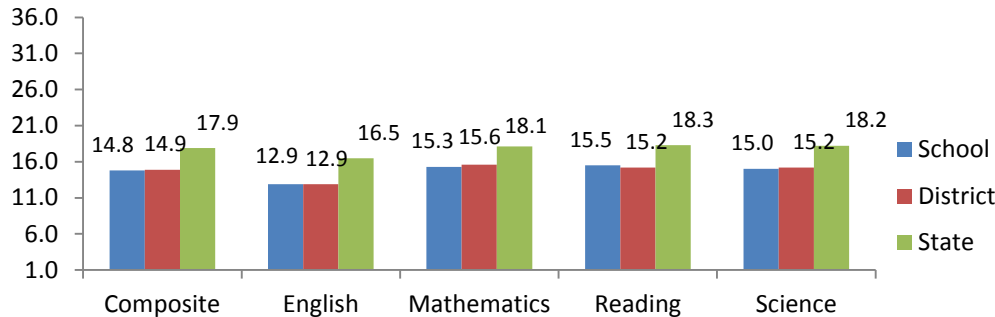
C.E. Murray High school is helping all students to develop world class skills and the life and career characteristics of the Profile of a S.C. Graduate by giving all students the opportunity to experience a high degree of academic achievement through their engagement in rigorous science, English language arts, mathematics, social studies, foreign language, and career and technology education curriculum embedded with 21st Century Skills which include STEM curricula. Students are enrolled in AP courses, honors courses, virtual courses (all subject areas), and dual enrollment courses. In order to ensure that all students are college and/or career ready, students and their parents select a major and along with the school develop a four year career plan which is tailored to each student's needs. The school provides every student with courses that will prepare them for all state and national assessments. Our goal is to ensure that all students, who graduate from C.E. Murray High School, are college and career ready by engaging each student in effective problem solving activities. In May 2015, 91% of our seniors graduated and all graduates completed at least one college application and student FASFA form. We have fully implemented the HSTW comprehensive academic programs and are accredited by AdvanceED until 2017. Since the school is a Race to the Top Carolina Consortium for Enterprise Learners Grant recipient, all students and staff members will receive one- to - one electronic devices. The goal of the grant is to provide the opportunity for students to become Enterprise Learners who will be able to develop, pursue, and attain rigorous learning and living goals that will assist them for college, careers, and citizenship. All administrators and teachers will continue to engage in professional development that will improve their skills in providing engaging and rigorous personalized standards-based curriculum, project based instruction, and relevant assessments to address the needs of each student. The school has developed partnerships with community based organizations such as Clemson Extension, Francis Marion (Science South Program) and Williamsburg Technical College. The school has consistently received the State Palmetto Gold and Silver medals for academic achievement since 2012. During the 2014-15 school term, C.E Murray High School was recognized by USA News and World Report as one of the best high schools in the nation. The school is in its fourth year of implementing a 21st Century Community Learning Center after school and summer transition grant. The school is also the recipient of the SC Higher Education Awareness Program (HEAP) and GEAR-UP grants.

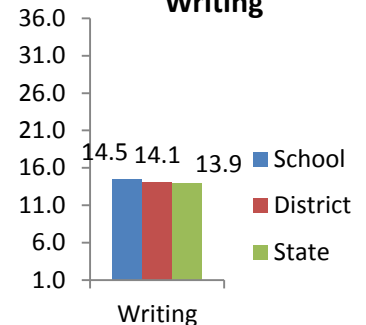

Average ACT Score Achieved by Students: Writing

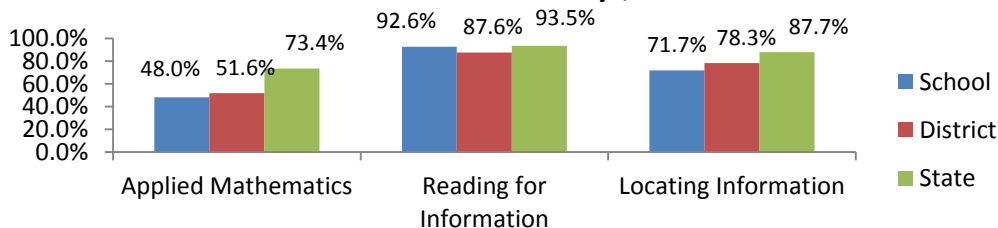

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
